Minutes

§ 1. Opening of the meeting

Mr. Eriksson welcomed all members to the second CB meeting of the year 2024 and informs that Mrs. Bakke is not able to participate for personal reasons and that Mr. Houman is participating remotely. Mr. Eriksson thanked for a splendid CB workshop on Friday and Saturday and congratulated the Swedish federation for setting new records for spectators in floorball matches for both Men and Women in the Super Final in the Friends Arena. Mr. Eriksson opened the meeting at 09:00.

§ 3 Minutes from the CB meetings: 01/2024 in Malaga, Spain (03.03.2023)

The minutes from the last CB meeting 01/2024 were scrutinized, approved and put ad acta. (**Appendix 1**)

CB decided: To approve the minutes of the IFF CB meeting 01/2024

§ 4. Financial questions

a) Financial report 2023 by 31.12.2023

Mr. Kratz presented the financial report and balance sheet by the 31.12.2023 (**Appendix 2a**).

The outcome per 31st of December is CHF 7,584 which is some CHF 16,192 (2022: CHF 23,776) lower than last year but slightly better than the preliminary report in the last meeting.

The liquidity per 31st December is CHF 419,195 some CHF 106,073 less than the same time last year (2022: CHF 525,268) partly due to the less income on marketing, sales and material approval income.

CB decided: To approve the report.

b) Financial report 2024 by 28.04.2024

Financial report 2024 by 28.04.2024

Mr. Kratz further presented the financial report and balance sheet by the 28.04.2024 (Appendix 2b). Even though it is still a bit early in the year a forecast is included in the report.

The outcome per 28th of April is CHF 216,970 which is some CHF 111,649 (2023: CHF 105,321) better than last year, partly due to earlier payment of WFC organisers fees.

The liquidity per 28th April is CHF 550,834 some CHF 162,827 better than the same time last year (2023: CHF 388,007)

The finances are continued to be monitored on a daily basis, and possible saves will be considered if and when we see signs of possible less income than now budgeted. The projected forecasts have been included, with the change of moving the IFF App costs and income to an own cost place.

Mr. Eriksson thanked the IFF administration of being 100% on track of the finances. Mr. King asked if the referee shared cost have been invoiced earlier, to which Mr. Kratz answered that this has been done to secure the income, before we have the costs.

CB decided: To approve the report.

c) Information on IFF claims – License system and WFC 2024 – status April 28th

Mr. Kratz reported on behalf of Mrs. Birdal that the claims situation by 28.04.2024 for Associations participating in the WFCs in 2024 and separately for those not participating in any of the IFF Events. (**Appendix 3 and 4**).

Since the last CB meeting Slovenia has made their last payment and cleared their debts. Contacts have been taken to the Latvia and Philippines to build new pay-off plans to solve their debts (**Appendix 5**). The new payment plans are being updated as soon as they are agreed upon. Latvia wants to have all their debts to be paid by the end of July, but IFF has raised the question in regard to their debt to the swiss company Gast, which needs to be fixed.

The status for registrations to the WFCs 2025 was presented (**Appendix 6**).

The administration has sent a letter to the countries having paid their registration late and informed them that they are confirmed for participation. The countries that hadn't paid the registration have been informed of the final deadline 31.05.2024 to pay the registration fee, otherwise their registration will not be approved.

Ms. Vuori asked about Great Britain and why we are not discussing with them, as they should also have a plan. Mr. Kratz answered that the IFF Office has now concentrated on the major problems. Mr. Liljelund stressed that we need to finalise the building of the new system and follow it without any deviations.

CB decided: To approve the reports, to continue to follow up on the pay-off plans for Canada, Cote d'Ivoire, Latvia, Malaysia, Philippines and Russia, to continue to follow up on the debts of the non-participating Associations and to monitor the debts situation of the teams registered for the WFCs 2025.

§ 5. **World Championships**

a) **Women's WFC 2023, Singapore**

Mr. Liljelund reported that the Quantum Analytics Event Report for the WFC 2023 in Singapore. (**Appendix 7**) has been finalised and published on the 18th of April. The delay in reporting was due to some feedback missing from the LOC and the other Singaporean parties. Mr. Eriksson felt that we have been able to measure the WFC's and their effects and asked that we should convey a thank you for the good work. Mr. Suman was surprised to learn there were only 4,300 sold tickets for the event but also wanted to highlight the success with the TV audience, even if we had the WFC outside Europe.

Mr. Liljelund informed that we will receive the IFF Strategy review done by Quantum Analytics.

CB decided: to approve the reports.

b) **U19 WFC 2024, Finland**

Ms. Vuori reported on the preparations of the U19 WFC in Lahti Finland. (**Appendix 8**) The preparations are proceeding well, with less than two weeks before the event, but some of the tasks are trailing a little behind timetables. The LOC has now two full-time employees and a person recruited as a bought service to handle the communications and social media. In addition, the LOC has engaged two trainees one person for contacting Finnish clubs and one person form the 3v3 tournament. A total of 16 employees of the Finnish Floorball Federation staff/team leaders will join the Event. There are a total of some 150 volunteers and the only lack is for the

security and the 3v3 match secretariat and rink staff, which will have to be purchased from the local club.

The original number of 200 tournament tickets have been sold out and an additional 50 have been released this week. The single day tickets have sold between 109 – 195 per day to a total value of some 38.000 EUR, with a ticketing budget of 99.000 EUR. In addition, there has been sold some 700 tickets to the sport clubs, through a special campaign. The LOC is still planning some actions to be taken to increase ticket sales.

The LOC has a special theme day for each of the Event days. The opening day is a School day, with over 1.000 students in the morning games. On Thursday there is a Sokos Family Day with outdoor activities and a Paw Patrol Meet & Greet (Finnish children's TV program). On Friday there is the National Club Day, with season ending program and then a memorial game FIN-NOR for a former U19 female player who passed away in cancer. On Saturday there is a Eurovision Song contest happening and on Sunday it is Mother's day and also the WFC lottery, where 6000 floorball balls are dropped from the ski jumping tower.

The 3v3 has caused extra work, but the IFF Office has been helping here a lot. The number of persons that have applied to become a volunteer is around 170 persons. The financial situation looks pretty good, if the lottery will give the budgeted income.

Ms Mitchell reported on the preparations of the U19 WFC 2024 where the organisation for the event is on track. The LOC has been working on all the tasks but has been a little bit slow in finalising a lot of the details. The team lists were published on Friday 12th of April. One concern regarding the teams is the size of the Team Canada delegation which has just 11 players (including only 1 goalkeeper) + 8 team officials, with no emergency players. This could be very problematic if they suffer any injuries.

Mr. Liljelund reported on the TV situation. The TV production is being done by PolarHD and the preparations for this are all in order. All matches will be streamed on the IFF media App and the Finnish matches will be broadcasted on the online platform of the Finnish National Broadcasting Company YLE Areena. Discussions are still ongoing concerning the possibility of a highlights package to be shown for the final game of Finland on Sunday the 12th on TV. The Danish matches will be streamed on the Sportway channel. Discussions are still ongoing with Czech Republic and Switzerland for possible broadcasts.

Mr. Suman asked about the marketing of the ball lottery, to which Ms. Vuori answered that the balls will be released and the former ski jumping world champion Janne Ahonen will jump from the ski jumping tower. What is the amount of volunteers needed for the 3v3 event? Ms. Mitchell answered that you need 2 persons for each match secretariat and having shared rink persons as we have nettings in between the courts. We are working with some 20 plus persons in the venue for each match. So you would need some 80 persons for the whole event. Mr. Suman hopes that in the future the LOC is able to secure the required number of volunteers to organise the 3v3 event, to which Mr. Beer confirmed.

Mr. Hidir asked about the announcement about the U19 WFC volunteers, to which Ms. Vuori answered that there were some suspicious applications, which were declined. Ms. Plechan asked if the Eurovision evening in the WFC venue is open for anyone, which Ms. Vuori confirmed.

3v3 WFC 2024 (Finland)

Ms Mitchell reported on the preparations for the first 3v3 WFC. There has been, as expected, a lot of tasks that have arisen with the organisation that were not considered in the original planning, especially to do with the basic logistics of running such an intensive competition with 5

courts in use at the same time. The amount of resources, both in terms of equipment and staff, has proved a little bit difficult for the Finnish Federation to plan for and provide, while at the same time maintaining a focus on the U19 WFC, however the IFF is confident that the event will be successful. Both the LOC & IFF have one dedicated person to manage the event full-time.

The number of volunteers has been particular problem. Staff from both the U19 WFC LOC and the IFF will be used, when available, to ensure that all the key tasks are covered for the 3v3. The impact of reduced volunteers will be most visible in the reduction of planned livestreams that can be provided. There will be one main show court that will be produced by PolarHD and the other courts will be streamed directly to the app using a single camera (mobile phone or tablet), and the number of games will depend on the availability of staff / volunteers.

The groups and match schedules (**Appendix 9**) were released in early April and all team lists have been published. The event will be played with 30 men's teams divided into 7 groups and 14 women's teams in 3 groups. Both a Championship Final and B-final will be played for both men & women. Originally, the plan was to have the final matches and medal ceremonies in the U19 WFC venue, however the logistics of this proved too difficult and it was decided that it was better to keep all matches & ceremonies in the 3v3 venue, especially considering the difference in venue branding as well as there being entrance fees for the U19 event.

Mr. Klabere feels very worried when Ms. Mitchell says that this will be a second Champions Cup in regards to the unexpected nature of the preparations. Ms. Mitchell says that one concern is there could be a flow of effects if there are some problems on one court that cause any major delays.

CB decided: to approve the reports

WFC 2024 Sweden

Mr. Klabere reported on the preparations of the WFC 2024 and the LOC report. (**Appendix 10a**) Tickets for all days/all passes have been released on March 27th in direct connection after the publishing of the first version of the match schedule. The ticket sales linked to the final weekend is still very positive. So far the fans from, mainly, Finland, Switzerland and the Czech Republic are still waiting to see how/when the quarterfinals will be played (on Thursday or Friday on Dec the 12-13th).

The school project "Little WFC" has so far reached over 8,600 pupils up to the age of 9 in 67 schools. A floorball instructor has visited their physical education lesson and they have been invited to a training session at a local floorball club afterwards. The goal is to visit over 20,000 pupils in the region.

The Region of Skåne will, together with the Swedish Floorball Federation, invite the Swedish Ambassadors of the qualified nations to a welcome ceremony in Malmö on June 18th. The purpose is to offer the participating nations to invite their national networks to the championships, to organize activities with their targets groups and the possibility to present themselves in conjunction with the world championships to promote tourism and business opportunities.

A TV site visit with production companies and some of the larger broadcasting companies is planned to be carried out on June 27th in both arenas.

The major implemented LOC sustainability activities in relation to the GAMES-project.

Both the Swedish floorball's internal resources and external resources work with the sale of the commercial rights. Currently, agreements have been signed with partners corresponding close to

40% of the target in the budget. The LOC has planned the following Marketing milestones
(Appendix 10b)

Ms Mitchell reported that the group ballot was held on Tuesday 5th March at the Turning Tower in Malmö. The groups were decided as follows:

The preliminary match schedule (**Appendix 11**) has been published and all tickets are now on sale. The IFF will organise, as discussed in the CB in advance of the WFC in Singapore, a meeting with the main TV takers in May or June, after the FIS meeting has been held to finalise the match schedule based on the TV needs.

The organisation of the AOFC qualifications in Philippines are on-track. The LOC has been very good in communicating with the teams and has made some good promotional material for the event. The LOC have been given the right to broadcast the Philippines matches on their Facebook.

The TV discussions have been finalised this week and the LOC has agreed to approve the offer from PolarHD and IFF will sign the agreement with them. The LOC and IFF will make a decision for what company to work with just before the CB meeting, so more details will be given in the meeting. The discussion with Protocol Sports marketing for the continuation of the TV right sales is continuing and IFF should receive an offer for a continued agreement before summer. The discussions with takers will start after the TV takers meeting in May or June.

Mr. Suman asked about how the expectation of the ticketing income is fairly low for the WFC 2024. Mr. Klabere explained that the lower ticketing income could still be easily be changed in a positive direction. Mr. Suman felt that it is good that IFF will now be motivated in the future to support ticketing sales.

CB decided: To approve the report

d) Upcoming Events

U19 WFC 2025 (Switzerland) + 3v3 WFC 2026

Mr. Beer reported on the plans that Swiss Unihockey has concerning the organisation of the Men's U19 WFC 2025 in Zurich and the project built around it and the idea to have a similar event for the Women U19 WFC in 2028. (**Appendix 12 a**) The SUHV has **received** support from the City, Canton and Federal government, which will give the possibility to play the finals in the Swiss Life Arena, providing an excellent environment for the young players.

Ms Mitchell reported that the contract with the Swiss has now been signed and the IFF Office has begun communications with the head of the LOC – Mr. Andreas Cadisch. There was a **CB** decision from the LOC to re-use the event logo from WFC 2022 for the U19 event as well as

several other future events in Switzerland, which neither the IFF competition or marketing staff were in favour of. It was the view of the IFF that a new logo should be designed for each event to give it an individual identity. The Swiss idea was that they could create more familiarity and visibility for the events through the use of a single logo. Discussions between the LOC & IFF have reached a compromise whereby a similar logo will be used for multiple events, creating a brand family which the Swiss are very happy with. CB decided for the logo. (**Appendix 12b**).

Swiss Life Arena has been confirmed for the final weekend, and other days will be at Saalsporthalle and Sporthalle Hardau. The original schedule CB decided for a 6-day event from the LOC was amended by the IFF and is still to be confirmed (**Appendix 13**). The introductory U19 WFC 2025 website (www.floorball.sport/u19wfc2025) has been launched and this will be redirected to the main event domain later in the year. Ms. Mitchell confirm that the match schedule still needs to be discussed, whether all the teams shall have the same rest day or it should be during two days. Mr. Klabere felt that it is up to the Swiss, when they want to execute the resting day. Discussions will be held during the next week.

A total of 26 teams have registered, which is one more than in 2023. Japan and Ukraine **are** back in the U19 WFC and Hungary has not registered. The Americas qualification will be played 02-04.08.2024 in Fredericton, New Brunswick, Canada. For the AOFC qualification there are discussions on playing in the Solomon Islands during mid-late September 2024. For the EUR qualification there is currently only one interested organiser (Poland) and discussions are in progress to see if it is possible to play the complete qualification with 11 teams in one place. Updated registration list (with updated payment info) (**Appendix 6**)

Ms. Mitchell confirmed that the cooperations with the LOC will begin more regularly after the U19 WFC in Lahti. Mr. Klabere and Mr. Suman congratulated the Swiss initiative, but stressed that the 6 days is an exception for the U19 WFC, as we need to have it as a five day event, otherwise we might not have organisers. Mr Suman made a similar comment about the use of Swiss Life Arena – it will make for a fantastic event but it cannot be the benchmark for future U19 WFCs. Mr. Klabere asked why the LOC could not reuse the logo, the IFF Office felt that the reusing of exactly the same logo benefitted swiss unihockey more than the IFF in creating branding awareness and that each event should have its own identity, but the family branding will work well.

Mr. Lopez asked if there are any updates for when the European qualifications will be played. Poland is not presently ready to have all the teams, so the IFF looking for other solutions. There are two other possible options but neither are favoured by the IFF Office unless absolutely no other options are available, but this must be fixed in the next two weeks.

CB decided: to approve the report

WFC 2025 (Czech Republic)

Ms. Mitchell reported that the communication with the LOC has begun earlier than expected, mainly due to the release of the event logo which was done in connection with the Czech league play-offs and Superfinal. The information on the proposed logo and the release was received very late by the IFF which caused significant issues in the approval process, not just with the logo itself but also with associated products that the LOC had already prepared such as a temporary website and event merchandise. The IFF is happy with the logo and branding, however, it has been made very clear that providing sufficient time in the approval process must be given in the future. Mr. Suman thanked the IFF administration for the flexibility to solve the issues so quickly.

The contract negotiations are in the final stages, after a meeting was held on the 12th of April, but this has also been a rather drawn-out process with the first draft of the contract being with Czech

Floorball for over 5 months before coming back to the IFF. The agreement was signed in connection to the IFF CB meeting in Sweden. Mr. Suman reported that the LOC has already had their first meeting and the work is already running at full speed. The target is to enhance the total number of the female players in Czechia.

A total of 29 teams have registered, which is one less than in 2023 and the Ukraine is the one missing. Discussions with possible organisers for the qualifications have begun. There is needed 2-3 in EUR, and one in each of AOFC & AMER. The possibilities for AOFC could be India, Japan or Singapore to organise and the AMER will be in the USA. Updated registration list (with updated payment info) (**Appendix 6**)

Mr Suman said that the problem with the late presentation of the logo / branding information to the IFF has been addressed internally. He is confident in the experience of the LOC members and trusts that this situation will not happen again.

CB decided: to approve the reports.

European Championships 2026

Ms Mitchell reported that no communication with these organisers has begun yet. For European Championships there is still the need to create Competition Regulations & Organiser Regulations. Mr. Suman felt that it will be very important to create the competition regulations closer to the U19 regulations, to have conditions enabling a broader number of organisers. The European Floorball Championships will be played in the 1st to 6th of September.

Ms Mitchell asked for confirmation of the official name that should be used for the European Championships, which was agreed as Euro Floorball Championships, as this was the event name that was presented to, and approved by, the IFF General Assembly in Zurich 2022.

3v3 WFC 2026

The IFF Competition Office would like to propose that the 3v3 WFC 2026 could be held in conjunction with the U19 WFC 2026 (Italy) and possibly played as an outdoor event. If CB is in favour of pursuing this proposal, then discussions with the Italian Association should begin as soon as possible so that they can secure venue & accommodation space.

CB decided: to approve the reports

§ 6. Club competitions

a) Champions Cup

Mr Liljelund reported on the CCSG Meeting held on the 22nd of March to discuss the feedback from the season 2023-2024 Champions Cup, the preparation time-table for the edition 2024 – 2025, needed changes of the CC regulations, updating the Broadcast/Streaming guidelines, suggestions of possible changes for 2024-2025 and the financial analysis from a club level. (**Appendix 14**) The CCSG discussed the financial outcome of the Champions Cup 2023-2024 and the outcome for the clubs, based on their reports (**Appendix 35ab**)

Ms. Mitchell reported that the CC Competition & Organiser Regulations have been updated for 2024-2025 through consultation with the IFF, CCSG, RC, and RACC. (**Appendix 15**). There are

still two open questions in regard to the CC Regulations, namely the number of team officials on the bench and the way the match clock will run.

The IFF Marketing function has prepared the CC Marketing Guidelines (**Appendix 16**), which the IFF CB is to approve on a principle level, as the countries are still in the process to approve it finally. The Broadcast/Streaming Guidelines (**Appendix 17**) have also been updated and all stakeholders has now finally approved them. All teams apart from the Finnish Men's teams have been cleared, which will be settled later on Sunday the 28th of April and now ready to send out the invitation earlier than planned.

b) Euro Floorball Cup & EuroFloorball Challenge

Ms Kratz reported that discussions with possible organisers will begin once league finals in the eligible countries conclude and national champions are known. The competition office proposes that a decision on whether to hold either or both of these events must be made no later than 15th June to allow the necessary time for the event planning or for teams to make alternative arrangements for participation in other club events during summer.

CB decided: To approve the reports

c) AOFC Club Championships

Ms Mitchell reported that the IFF was informed on the 7th of April, of the planning of the 2nd AOFC Club Championships, which are scheduled to be played in Hohhot, Inner Mongolia from 9th – 15th July. This was via an email sent from the organiser directly to the AOFC National Associations. A huge amount of organisation has already been undertaken (**Appendix 19**) with no communication at all with the IFF.

After the same event last year, where the IFF was also not informed of any of the planning until the very last minute, the AOFC was advised that they must seek approval from the IFF for all events, so it is unacceptable that this has happened again. While the IFF is fully supportive of this event, it must be run according to IFF Guidelines and event protocols.

The IFF informed of the need for IFF competition & media staff to be present at the event, as well as IFF political representation. The development of Floorball in the AOFC region, and particularly in China, is very important, especially with TWG 2025 coming up and the IFF must be informed of all AOFC activities to ensure that we are supporting their efforts and that it is following the strategic plans of the IFF.

A request for more information from the organiser (Mr Ching) was sent on 7th April and was received on 22nd April. From this information the IFF Competition Department has advised to the AOFC that the event should be categorised not as an IFF event, but as an International Club Tournament organised by China Floorball and AOFC. The event will be open to any club teams from the AOFC region, including non-IFF members, so the reference to the event being the AOFC Club Championships must be removed, as this event title of AOFC Club Championships should be reserved for a future official IFF event for the regional club champions (similar to the current EuroFloorball Cup). By being run as an International Club Tournament there is no need for any official reporting of the matches &/or involvement of IFF in the organisation of the event.

Ms. Siriwat informed that AOFC was not communicated on the matter either, so the matter will be discussed internally for the name change. Mr. Eriksson asked Ms. Siriwat to convey to the AOFC that more information are needed and things can't happen without a consultation with the IFF. Mr. Houman finds it very positive that such an event will be organised, but is this behaviour a mistake. Ms. Siriwat explained that it is maybe more about having the advantage of the AOFC name. Mr. Eriksson concluded that all initiatives for regional club tournaments are positive, but they have to be handled in accordance with the IFF regulations and guidelines.

CB decided: To approve the reports

§ 7. ExCo, Strategy Implementation and Ad Hoc group reports

a) ExCo reports

Mr. Eriksson reported on the activities of the ExCo since the last meeting. The ExCo has worked on a few separate topics, namely the preparation for the SportAccord convention and the meeting with the Swiss Unihockey.

The IFF president Mr. Eriksson and Mr. Liljelund had a meeting with the leadership of Swiss Unihockey in Zurich on the 4th of April, to receive information of the Swiss federation idea for an continued Event stream until potential WFC in 2032, including a number of international events. The idea is to organise the following Events in the coming eight years: the Men's European Floorball Championships 2027 (possibly in cooperation with Germany), Women's U19 WFC 2028 – Zurich & Winterthur, the Women's WFC 2029 and the Men's WFC 2032. In addition to this the Swiss federation is participating in the organisation of the Special Olympics Winter World Games in 2029.

For the U19 WFC 2028 the LOC needs to build the event as a duplication of the Men's U19 WFC. The event would be a major promotion of women's Floorball, with a kick-off meeting in connection to the Super-Final 2024, with 120 women keen to work on developing women's Floorball. There are three concrete targets for this, namely: Push development in women's floorball, Expansion of the community and a Tournament of a top standard. The SUHV has received extremely positive feedback from the Swiss government for an excellent organisation of the WFC 2022, which they find to be a benchmark for how events should be organised, not only a 9-day event, but a two year process with a lot of side projects.

In addition to this the SUHV is in discussions with the body organising the European Championships in Switzerland in 2030 to include Floorball to the Event. In the event there are the following secured sports: Triathlon, Table Tennis, Beach Volleyball, Rowing, Sport Climbing, Cycling and Canoe Sprint and then there are the sports that can choose to participate Athletics, Aquatics and Gymnastics. There are spots for 5 para sports (Rowing, Canoe Sprint + 3 other) and three spots for new sports, where potentially Floorball and orienteering + some other are on the table. The Swiss NOC is presently conducting a feasibility study to be ready for the Autumn in

2024 (**Appendix 20**) Mr. Beer asked the IFF CB to have the authorisation to continue the lobbying work with this matter.

Mr. Liljelund felt that it is very important to follow-up on the process, as this is a major opportunity for us, so we need to be flexible in this. Mr. Eriksson felt that this is very important and we should support this, in conjunction with the ongoing discussions with the calendar. Ms. Vuori asked if this is for both Men and Women, which is the case, but it is only a once-off participation in the event because it is being held in Switzerland. Mr. Suman felt that this is very important from both a calendar scheduling and political aspect to be present and have the possibility to showcase the sport to all these International Federations. The CB felt that we have to be flexible towards this initiative.

The IFF CB discussed the next steps of the Future of Floorball process, based on the CB workshop evaluation. (**Appendix 21**) and the work will continue as planned based on the result of the CB workshop.

Based on the positive feedback received from the Good Governance webinar held by the ETC interim chair held in Ukraine, the ETC plan to hold a new open webinar for all IFF member federations in May. The invitations will be sent out in the beginning of May. The work to find new members for the IFF Ethics Commission has continued and interviews has been held with a potential new member.

The IFF Office has further been managing two cases of Sporting National applications, which have had some administrative mistakes in the handling of them by the National association. The associations in question have now when the administrative errors have been corrected and the Sporting nationality applications have been approved, be sanctioned in accordance with the IFF Juridical regulations.

CB decided: To approve the report and authorised Mr. Beer to continue the lobbying towards the inclusion of the European Championships in Switzerland.

b) Strategy Implementation

Mr. King reported on the work of the IFF Strategy Implementation, where the Strategy Working Group (SWG) chair has prepared the Strategy Status Report (**Appendix 22**). The IFF Committees and the Office is working with the Suggestion Actions table and updating that ongoingly, in accordance with the decision taken earlier that the updates have to be taken in time for the IFF CB meeting. The next step is to start the preparation of the Phase 2 Implementation plan and the report of the Phase 1 Implementation outcome

CB decided: To approve the report

c) CB Member responsibilities

Mr. Houman reported about the Six Nations cooperation and next Six nations tournament will be played in the city of Wolsztyn in Poland and will continue with 3x15min playing time, to ensure that all teams can play against all the teams in three days.

Mr. Lopez reported that nothing much has happened with the situation in Latin America, except that an on-line meeting with Floorball4all has been held and how to cooperate better, which will also effect the activities in Latin America.

Mr. Lopez further reported about the development in regard with the EuroPower and their meeting held on the 17th of April and the next steps. **(Appendix 23)** The meeting discussed and analysed the problems the EuroPower group is facing and to adjust the competition calendar for the group for 2024 – 2025. In the first 12 months of the project there has been six tournaments played. Mr. Klabere was very happy to have new organisers for the events, with Belgium in this case. Mr. Hidir felt that there are more countries could be interested to join.

Mr. Suman reported on the progress of the Czech Erasmus+ project Floorball - Fit for Future continuation and the transformation to an IFF Program Fit For Future and how it has been organised **(Appendix 24)**. The program is run as an IFF operation, coordinated by Mr. Frederik Dilger, working four days a week for the program, based on the financial support provided by the EFT countries.

The program had its official launch on the 17th of April with a Teams meeting and the second meeting will be held on the 24th of April. In the meeting the program was introduced and an invitation for the interested member federations for a bi-lateral meeting will be organised to help the federations to move forward and enrol in the program and start the process for the evaluation of the maturity level of the federation. **(Appendix 25-26)**. Based on the first introduction meeting held, already eight one-to-one meetings about the program has been scheduled (Austria, Belgium, China, Kenya, Mexico, the Netherlands, the Philippines and Ukraine)

Mr. Dilger visited the IFF office on Friday the 19th of April to discuss the practical coordination and connection between the Fit4Future program and the general IFF operations. Mr. Suman thanked the IFF for the support for the launch of the program.

Mr. Hidir reported on the situation in East-Europe and in the Middle East **(Appendix 27)**. On the 16-17th of March the Temirtau Open 2024 was organized in Temirtau in north of Kazakhstan. Adult teams participated from different regions of Kazakhstan. Also the annual tournament Taraz Open is planned for 25-26 of October, with plans to secure participation from neighbouring countries Kyrgyzstan, Uzbekistan and Tajikistan. Three new regional branches were opened during this year. For National recognition at least branches in half of the country's 14 regions are needed.

On the 6th of April the Moldovan Floorball Championship was played in Chisinau, Moldova, with the categories for men, adult, junior and girls. In the beginning of May a floorball camp will be organized together with floorball4all with participation of Swiss and Swedish coaches. In Moldova the current President of the Federation Danil Opinca has decided to focus more on Floorball4all projects in Eurasia while the President of the biggest club Meteor will be in charge of development in Moldova.

The Ukraine federation is planning to hold its annual meeting to the 17th of May, followed by the . playoff weekend on the 18-19th of May in Lviv for Men's Highest League, Men's first league, Junior U16 and U14. The competition calendar is also set for next year and the Championship will be widened with 2 first leagues divisions, women's league and U12 junior Championship. The Ukraine Open will be played in Lviv 6-9 of June.

A meeting was organised with Floorball4all and Mr. Hans Peter Koller, president and Mr. Benjamin Lüthi CEO to discuss about the concrete cooperation between IFF and Floorball4all. IFF was represented by Mr. Hidir, Mr. Lopez, Mr. Halonen and Mr. Liljelund. It was agreed that both organisations would increase the level of communication between the organisations and write a letter to both organisations members inform about the signed MoU and the need to

cooperate on the national level. Also the possibility to organise a common American competition with Floorball4all and IFF nations, with for example a 3v3 event in 2025.

CB decided: To approve the report

§ 8. International Sports

International Olympic Committee/IOC

Mr. Eriksson reported that the IOC has sent out a Declaration Against the Politicisation of Sports (**Appendix 28**), which was a topic that reoccurred in a number of Thomas Bach's speeches during the SportAccord convention.

During the IPACS (International Partnership Against Corruption in Sport) Good Governance session it was indirectly said that IPACS, which has run the Good Governance review of ASOIF and WOF, will also run it for the ARISF and AIMS IF's. In relation to this IFF needs to update some of its policies and take action to be prepared to meet the 50 IPACS recommendations (**Appendix 29**)

The IOC informed during the SportAccord that the process for the application for the IOC development support for 2024 will be sent out latest in May.

The IFF Secretary General and a number of the IFF staff have participated in the IOC's Webinar on Good Governance series. The first webinar, held in March was 'Transparency & Checks and Balances/ Control mechanisms', while the next to be held in May will be 'Focus on Organisational Integrity'.

SportAccord

Mr. Eriksson reported that the SportAccord Convention was held in Birmingham, Great Britain in beginning of April. The SAC in Birmingham was a first test for SportAccord. It seemed that most of the International Sport Federations have rejoined the event after five years since the last, but a lot of the business participants for the congress and fair were still missing. Now there was mostly Cities and federations presenting. There were around 1.500 delegates participating in the Event.

It can be concluded that SportAccord is still in a transition period, after the dissolution of GAISF and it is a little unclear exactly what tasks SportAccord will have, apart from organising the SportAccord Convention and the IF Forum. The process of defining the SportAccord goals and tasks is still ongoing.

The SportAccord recognition process is still being re-constructed, but the idea is to control the process of the new members better. The new applicants are to participate in the SportAccord convention to showcase their sport and the observer status will be valid for two years, to fulfil the requirements and the documents for approval. The criteria are the same that was used to becoming GAISF members. AIMS wants to have the responsibility to welcome any new sport organisations to community, as the accepted members will become AIMS members. There will be a group consisting of the umbrella organisations and IOC and the rivalry issue will be handled in cooperation with the umbrella organisation member federations.

Association of IOC Recognised International Sport Federations/ARISF

Mr. Eriksson reported that ARISF has informed that the ARISF AGM 2024 will be held during the IF Forum during the 21st to 23rd of October. The original idea was to have it during the SportAccord convention, but due to time constraints was changed. The plan is to bring the ARISF AGM back to the SportAccord convention in 2025.

There has happened a lot with ARISF during the beginning of 2024. The rebranding of the ARISF logo and visual elements has gone very well: logo, website and the arisf.sport has all been updated. The New Strategy Plan, New Statutes, opening of an Office in the MSI and the office has been populated by Ms. Eva Orellana, as the office coordinator. The registration with the registrar of commerce has been made and now working on the registration for VAT. The Integration of the bylaws mentioned in the new Statutes is ongoing. Future there is an ongoing discussion that IOC wants to make a good governance assessment of the ARISF and AIMS federations, probably after the Paris 2024 Olympics. The work with what ARISF will do for its member will continue during May and June.

During the SportAccord convention ARISF organised the following workshops and meetings:

- ARISF Sustainability Workshop, presented by: Alibaba Cloud & Green Future Project
- ARISF & WADA Clean Sport Workshop, presentations: World Anti-Doping Agency (WADA), Lacross and American Floorball
- WADA is planning to remove ARISF from the list of signatories!
- Official Meeting ARISF EB/IOC Meeting
- ARISF /AIMS Executive Boards Meeting
- ARISF/IPACS Good Governance Workshop
- ARISF /AIMS Executive Boards Meeting

In the meeting with the IOC, it became evident that all processes are more or less put on hold until after the Paris Olympic games and the discussions with IOC concerning the cooperation will happen in the later part of the year.

International World Games Association/IWGA

Ms Mitchell reported that direct contact with the TWG 2025 Sports Department has begun. The first meeting between the IFF and the Floorball Competition Department in Chengdu was held on the 7th March. Initial discussions were to do with the competition venue, official equipment required, the need of a training venue, and the match schedule. Since the meeting we have received confirmation of a training venue which is located next to the competition venue.

A first list of equipment has been sent to the OC as well as the first plans for the venue. TWG use an online software tool – Sword Venue – for the venue layout and equipment planning. Ms Mitchell and Ms Kraus participated in an online training session for this tool during April. A meeting between the IFF and the IWGA Sports Director is planned for the beginning of June.

The IFF had an online meeting with the TWG host broadcaster, ISB, to discuss the broadcast plans for Floorball, including the preliminary requirements for camera numbers and camera positions. Based on the initial broadcast plans, there should be coverage of all days of the Floorball event. ISB provided further details on their new media platform which will provide free streaming as well as other media material from TWG.

Mr. Liljelund reported that the German Olympic Sports Confederation (DOSB) has nominated the city of Karlsruhe as a candidate for hosting The World Games 2029. Earlier this year, two cities from Germany, Karlsruhe and Hanover, had expressed their interest in hosting the 13th edition of the multi-sport event in 2029. Karlsruhe is the first city to apply for a second edition of the Games: the city organised the third edition of The World Games in 1989.

The IWGA has in its Executive Committee meeting confirmed that the IWGA will next year have its AGM at the SportAccord Convention. The discussion of the organisation of the SportAccord Multi-Sport games are continuing, as both ASOIF and WOF prefer to have the same body to organise any Multi-Sport Games. The calendar for the different multi-sport games has to be clarified in coordination with IOC, SportAccord. The issue is not to have multi-sport games in between the Olympic games and the World Games.

The IWGA AGM will be held in Esslingen, Germany on the 1st of May.

University Sport/FISU

Mr. Liljelund reported that after the conclusions of the 3v3 World Floorball Championships IFF will again take contact with FISU. During the SportAccord convention it became clear in discussions with the FISU secretary general Mr. Eric Saintrond that Mr. Delgado was no longer working for FISU and therefore the contact with FISU had ceased. One option would be to run a specific series for University teams in the 3v3 WFC.

Multi-Sport Games

SEA GAMES 2025 Thailand

Ms. Siriwat reported that Floorball is in for the next three upcoming SEA Games – Thailand 2025, Malaysia 2027, & Singapore 2029. The host city contract for Thailand will be signed in early June. Ms. Mitchell informed that the SEA Games (9th -20th of December) clashes directly with the WFC, but discussions between the IFF and Floorball Thailand has ensured that Floorball will be played at the end of the SEA Games. Teams playing in both the WFC and SEA Games will have to go directly after the WFC to the SEA Games.

Asian Indoor and Martial Arts Games 2024, Bangkok, Thailand

Ms. Siriwat reported that the AIMAG preparations have really progressed in recent months after funding was secured. The Floorball venue has been confirmed, flooring has been secured and it is now agreed that Taishan Sports will provide all the FOP equipment.

Ms Mitchell reported on the 1st Technical Delegates Meeting that was held in Bangkok from 2nd – 3rd March. Ms Mitchell and representatives from Floorball Thailand attended the meeting which included a presentation of the general planning of the event, an inspection of the Floorball competition venue (Thai-Japan Bangkok Youth Center), as well as meetings with event providers such as Taishan Sports who will be responsible for the venue equipment.

The preparations for the event have been very problematic (it was originally scheduled to be played in 2021) but the organisation now appears to be well advanced for the event which will be held from 21st – 29th November 2024. The team registration was extended until the end of May, with a maximum of 8 men's & 8 women's teams to be included. The event will be played with the teams divided into two groups in each gender, according to ranking, and will use a 3 x 15minute playing format. A 2nd Technical Delegates Meeting is scheduled for the end of August.

CB decided: To approve the reports

§ 9.

Committees and Commissions

a) Rules and Competition Committee (RACC)

Mr. Klabere reported from the RACC meeting held 09.04 (**Appendix 30**).

An update of the text regarding the release of players has been worked out based on the comments from the last CB meeting and Czech Floorball (**Appendix 31**). The wording of the regulation is agreed by everyone, but the way how to implement this has to be worked upon and a guideline has to be created, where the responsibility has to be with the National association in question to inform the Player and the respective Club/National Association who has been selected.

Further Mr. Klabere reported on the first meetings with the Rules Reference Group regarding the Rules of the Game edition 2026 and the proposed changes of the rules. The proposals have been sent to Member Associations, IFF RC, IFF RACC and IFF Athletes Commission for feedback until 31.05.2024 (**Appendix 32**).

The IFF CB workshop discussed about the need to ask the National Associations for the opportunity to come up with their own proposals for how an activity rule could be included in the rule book, still without making the Gap bigger. The Rule Group will be given the task to prepare a letter to the member associations.

Based on the feedback from the Associations Meeting as well as the last CB meeting the IFF Office and RACC have now made new international calendar proposal (**Appendix 33**), which the CB discussed in their workshop. These CB proposals reflect the need to have major events spread throughout the year, playing of events in periods where we believe we can get the most TV exposure, the distribution of major events for the benefit of the players as well as the National Associations. Based on the CB workshop it was discussed that the RACC should build a proposal considering the advantage and disadvantage of a change from a bi-annual to a WFC every four years based on the following factors: Multi-City solution, Different time of participation for the teams, Bigger Media visibility, Possibility for more sponsor investment, Higher Revenue on Investment, Number of Days and the number of Teams, Number and What type of levels of the groups, What type accommodation system and shared accommodation costs and When to change the system.

The process looks like the following:

- => Agreeing for an a) or b) solution for the WFC option
- => RACC to build a proposal
- => Analyse of the proposal by the CB in a Teams meeting
- => SWOT Analysis on the effect and Strategy relevance
- => Asking feedback from the membership groups
- => Analysis of the feedback
- => Preparation for the September CB meeting

Mr. Liljelund proposed, in accordance with the decision of the previous CB meeting, an addition to the Organisers Regulation, concerning the inclusion of a share of the ticket revenue for IFF from the major events. A general update of the Organisers Regulation will be done later in the year. The changed article 2.6.1 Ticket Revenue would be like this:

"The IFF grants the Host the revenue from the sales of entrance tickets, from which 10 percent of the net revenue (direct ticket sales costs excluded) belongs to the IFF. This applies to all IFF Events (as per 1.1) except for qualification events and club tournaments."

CB decided: To approve the report and to update the text for the release of players in the competition regulations and the text in article 2.6.1 in the Organisers Regulation concerning the Ticket revenue according to the CB decided.

The CB also approved the proposal of the IFF Reference Group proposal for the Rule tests. The CB further decided to give the RACC the task to start the process to look at the calendar process. The Rule Group is asked to ask the member associations for proposals of how an activity rule could be included in the rules.

CB decided: To approve the reports.

b) Referee Committee (RC)

Mr. Lopez reported that the IFF Referee Committee is working on the updates of the referee and referee coach nomination criteria which will be sent out to the IFF member associations in the beginning of June. The criteria are created for the upcoming new nomination period 1.1.2025-31.12.2026.

The work to plan the officiating system for the upcoming 3v3 events has also started. The main objective being to secure a cost-efficient way to secure proper officiating for the WFC level events and not to increase the costs for the participating teams. For the 3v3 WFC 2024 all the referees will come from the host country, Finland. After the initial 3v3 WFC tournament we will have more practical information to work with in order to see how this can be dealt with in the future in conjunction with the organising country and the IFF.

Mr. Klabere asked who will educate the referees for the 3v3 WFC. Mr. Halonen answered that this is handled by the Finnish referee committee. There will be 14 referees on Saturday and 4 referees on Sunday. They will be paid 85 CHF per day and the costs will be shared by the LOC and the IFF. After the 3v3 WFC in Lahti, the RC will build some referee education material for future 3v3 WFCs as well as for the National Associations to adopt in their own 3v3 events.

The RC is organising webinars for the referee and referee coaches about Leadership and Communication on the 14th of May 2024 for the AOFC region and 22nd of May 2024 for the other continents.

CB decided: To approve the report and the nomination criteria

c) Medical committee

Mr. Halonen reported on behalf of Mr. Varecka that WADA following their review of the IFF Corrective Action Report (CAR) related to the Code Compliance Questionnaire (CCQ) - IF CCQ 2022-2023 and our responses to address the required Critical / High Priority / General corrective actions, WADA has concluded that on 03 April 2024 IFF has appropriately completed all needed corrections and has therefore received the full WADA Code compliance. (**Appendix 34**)

Mr. Varecka has continued to work on, the already earlier indicated needs to have a renewal of the IFF Medical Committee composition. Discussions have been started with a candidate from Switzerland, which will continue in June and the Mr. Varecka has had discussions with one potential candidate from Ukraine. As a result of these discussions the Ukraine Federation has on the 26th of April nominated Dr. Rostyslav Yuzkiv as a member for the IFF Medical Committee.

At the same time, the present IFF Medical committee member Mr. Jonathan Koo has handed in his resignation from the committee, with immediate effect. The IFF CB needs to look for solutions to this, as we need to have a functional Medical Committee.

Mr. Houman informed that also Dr. Bartels is looking to resign.

CB decided: To approve the report and accept the nomination of Mr. Rostyslav Yuzkly as a member of the Medical Committee and the resignation of Mr. Koo from the medical committee.

d) Athletes commission

Ms. Plechan reported on the activities of the ATC. The ATC has been working on preparing the agenda for the upcoming meeting during the U19 WFC in Lahti.

The ATC blog article written by Yui Takahashi was published in March and the April blog article is being written by Josefina Eiremo, to be delivered and published soon.

The ATC are preparing a video from the ATC members to the athletes participating in the upcoming U19 WFC and 3v3 WFC, to raise awareness about ATC during this event, as well as being present during the U19 WFC. If the video turns out as planned, it will be shown during the captain's meeting and in the arena during the breaks.

CB decided: To approve the report,

e) Development Committee (DevC)

Mr. Houman reported that there has been only a few federations that have submitted any inputs, to the Development Committee question to the smaller IFF member associations. After the pervious CB meeting the IFF Development Committee sent an email to all IFF member associations with less than 3000 members/licensed players and asked for their opinion how to attract new players and how would they do it and how have they done it so far. Eight member associations replied, and the outcome is that the DevC is scheduling some online meetings with the associations to discuss further of their ideas and to share experiences of best practices.

All inputs which have been received though, have many good thoughts. Based on the inputs, next step can be decided on the topic to Attracting new players. From the input one of topics is to get more awareness of the sport.

Mr. Suman stressed that it would be good to communicate to the members of the Development Committee of the activities taken

Mr. Halonen reported that before summer there is a plan to run a clinic for the Asian referees in conjunction with the WFCQ 2024 in Philippines and also to have development discussions with certain AOFC countries regarding the administration and development of administration. Certain AOFC nations have also registered for the Fit for Future program launch meetings.

CB decided: To approve the report

f) Entourage Commission (ENC)

Mr. Hidir reported on the work in relation to the IFF Entourage Commission and the actions that has been taken.

CB decided: To approve the report

§ 10. Functions**a) Communication & Media function**

Mr. Halonen reported on behalf of Mr. Kihm that the daily business of the IFF Media department runs normally. The cooperation with the LOC media team for the U19 WFC 2024 and the 3v3 WFC in Lahti has been very close and really good.

CB decided: To approve the report

b) Marketing function

Mr. Beer, reported about the current sales and marketing situation. (**Appendix 36**)

The good cooperation with the Swedish Federation continues, we have some potential companies to offer the mid-circle to (and some other elements which belong to the IFF). We will follow up on the leads started with the Finnish Federation once the U19 WFC 2024 is over. Currently there are no active cases by the sales agency Red Carpet Brand Alliance (RCBA) but the outlook with the 2026 and 2027 events taking place in Finland creates a good base for sales activities towards Nordic companies.

The IFF is continuously in contact with companies that have been sponsors in past events (Dachser and Fisherman's Friend) and pushing for new ones. Recently we have had good meetings for example with Vitamin Well (drink) and DHL (courier service) and are discussing the elements on which to base a more concrete offer. The sustainability angle is an on-going approach angle to find common value-base for discussions (Kuusakoski (Nordic recycling company (mainly metals), Swappie, (serviced 2nd hand phones), Oatly (oat-based products), Korkia (renewable energy investment fund)). Further, we also looking at functional consumer goods such as smoothies, protein bars and isotonic/vitamin drinks. Based on the concept developed for WFC 2023 (Goal of the Day / App promotion / Fleurop) we are also trying to close deals with a smaller value but positive income approach. This concept has been offered for example to Foodora (food delivery platform).

The IFF is still evaluating the continuation of the Protocol Sports agreement as we are approaching the end of the agreement (August 2024). If the decision would be to continue the partnership a new contract would need to be formulated to change some of the agreement clauses for example contract term, termination, sales process and potentially any new contracts that have been primarily negotiated directly by the IFF: Mr Liljelund has meet with Mr. Khaled Abdalla during the SportAccord convention and we are awaiting a CB decided for a new agreement from him.

Cooperation with the existing IFF sponsors is working well. For the U19 WFC 2024 Gerflor has agreed to deliver a new floor (in the new BLUE colour) since the IFF does not yet have two own floors of the new colour. Gerflor is posting a series of floorball related posts on their LinkedIn and Instagram channels. PUMA Nordic is going to propose to deliver some additional material for the WFC 2024 referees. Further, depending on WFC schedules in Malmö there would be the opportunity for stakeholders to visit the PUMA Nordic facilities in Helsingborg. PUMA is thinking of creating selected IFF-products as an own "product line" which might also be partially connected to the 40th IFF anniversary in 2026. There is also a preliminary discussion of a possible web shop integration into the IFF website (white label web shop solution with selected referee and IFF items). IFF has also been able to facilitate two negotiations for PUMA (Floorball Canada and Floorball Denmark).

Planning for the next CCMNG meeting in Malmö 29th of August is on-going. The agenda will consist of sales and marketing related topics, success cases and development ideas/possibilities. A meeting and mingling of national federation sponsors attending the WFC 2024 is being prepared together with the LOC / Swedish Federation.

The graphic image for CC2025 has been updated. For a cost-effective solution it was decided to use the same theme as for 2024. The available material has been distributed to the four national federations and CC2025 will be promoted during the final events and/or series of each respective country. The clubs which qualify will receive the material once confirmed. As the CC concept in its new format does not have an LOC the IFF media team has been posting material on the CC and IFF channels. The IFF has prepared a suggestion to the CCSG about the sales model going forward.

During the first quarter of 2024 the IFF has also orchestrated the creation and launch of the 3v3 brand. The plan is to use the same logo also for future 3v3 events but leave some room for the LOC to adapt the colour. A guideline for this has been prepared for LOCs. Once we collect the experience from the inaugural event the IFF will also investigate the commercial elements and possibilities of the 3v3 event. In the existing IFF sponsor agreements only the one for PUMA includes this event.

The IFF has revised the Player of the Year concept for the CB to discuss, develop and possibly decide on (**Appendix 37**)

CB decided: To approve the report and decided to discuss this in the IFF CB workshop in September.

c) **Material function**

Mr. Liljelund report that IFF has held the annual meeting with Mr. Lars-Åke Henriksson from RISE on the 4th of March, to discuss the cooperation with RISE. (**Appendix 38**). As the RISE Floorball expert Mr. Lars-Åke Henriksson will retire in the end of September and RISE has not yet made any plans, there is a little concern for how to continue. Mr. Henriksson will then work some 35-40 per cent until the end of 2025, to finalise the present years Material Approval reporting and finances some 40 % until end of February 2025.

IFF is at the same time continuing the discussion some Floorball material manufacturers to discuss the way forward concerning the testing and approval system for the Floorball Material on the 26th of April, as there has been a number of serious issues with especially the certification unit of RISE. The discussion is what kind of system should be in force in the future.

Mr. Halonen reported that he participated in the creditors meeting of the bankruptcy estate of E-Sports Group (EXEL) on the 16th of April 2025. The old debts of E-Sports Group to the IFF directly is roughly around 3200 € and the debts to RISE, which is basically also a debt to the IFF, is more than 20.000 € (some 17.000 EUR for IFF). The new debts E-Sports Group has are some 309.824 SEK to IFF, but through RISE and then directly to RISE is 24.365 SEK. Based on the Finnish legislation both the IFF and RISE are not primary creditors, which are considered to be

the ones with set collaterals, which means there's only a very small possibility to get anything back from the Bankruptcy estate.

The outstanding debt of E-SG/Exel is neither booked as an income, nor is it in the present balance sheet, and hence the final outcome will have a limited financial effect to the IFF balance, as it is only the Chapter 11 IFF part. This is due to the fact that most of the debts are debts E-SG has to RISE, which RISE then pays us.

If some operator is planning to take over the Exel Floorball brand, they need to cover these old debts to RISE/IFF, before the certificates for the approved materials can be moved to the new operator. IFF had an agreement with E-Sports Group of a payment plan and we have informed that to be able to move forward Exel needs to provide a new payment plan and a bank guarantee for the outstanding sum.

CB decided: To approve the report

d) Equality function

Ms Mitchell reported on a meeting between IFF & the Swedish Floorball Federation on 8th April to discuss the future of the Fifty/Fifty project. The Swedish Federation has funding for the project for 2024, however if the international model is to continue to be promoted then additional funding will be required &/or the IFF will need to take over responsibility. This would include providing an updated English materials (such as videos) as well as an English support / FAQ function.

The Fifty/Fifty project will be part of the IOC Sustainability Case Studies and it is possible that after this exposure there may be interest in the project from outside of Floorball. There would then be the possibility of 'selling' the concept to other sports or even businesses for their own HR education. The main issue that needs to be resolved first is to do with the ownership of the project material. As it was developed by one of the Swedish regional organisations then it is not clear whether either the Swedish federation or the IFF would have the right to monetise the material. The IFF & Swedish Federation will work towards WFC 2024 in promoting the platform and a decision should be made later in the year about how it will continue after that.

The IFF CB will in the September meeting run the Fifty/Fifty education as a part of the CB workshop. The IFF Office staff will also complete the Fifty/Fifty education in the coming months.

CB decided: To approve the report

e) Parafloorball function

Mr. Houman reported that the preparations for the World Winter games in Sestriere (Torino) 2025 are continuing. As there has been a lot of interest for floorball from many countries, but since the WWG is unfortunately affected by some financial cut, this means that far fewer teams can participate than there would be willing to. The Special Olympics International is therefore discussing the possibility to organise some regional competitions to provide the opportunity for all programs to participate.

The IFF and SOI met during the Birmingham SportAccord. Floorball is the sport with biggest growth in percentage with 25% within Special Olympics in the latest census report, having now 50.000 players. Floorball is now offered in 78 programs (Nations) which is a growth from zero in just some 10 plus years. The focus for the future is to work on the American continent in order to

keep the growth and within 5 years time to surpass 100 programs and 100.000 players. IFF was also informed that the SOI Winter World Games will be held in Switzerland in 2029.

In mid-April an online seminar has been held with the programs in the Asian region, in order to keep the growth. This is part of the legacy from WFC 2023 in Singapore, where Special Olympics Asia Pacific was present at the WFC 2023 and was impressed with the work from IFF. In Japan, former IFF ATC Member and Japanese international player, Yui Takahashi, is leading the development of SO Floorball.

Mr. Liljelund reported that the discussions with the Swedish Floorball Federation Parasport section, which has been leading the group of different Para Floorball disciplines (Special Olympics, Manual wheelchair, Volt Floorball and Power hockey) have continued. The para-floorball group is still looking on the best way for them to apply for membership in IFF, whether it is as one ParaFloorball organisation or on their own, based on the IFF statutes affiliated memberships option. The ParaFloorball group will discuss internally and then come with their CB decided of how to solve it, in advance of the IFF General Assembly in Malmö.

Mr. Suman stressed that the process of including para sport under the umbrella of the national sport organisations is very important.

CB decided: To approve the report

f) Sustainability function

Mr. Halonen reported on behalf of Mr. Kalsta that the next reporting cycle (year 2023) for Sports for Climate Action network members will not be due until third quarter of the year, but preparations to collect needed data is an on-going process (for example office (waste/heat/energy), employee travel (office/home-office/flights), procurement (paper/cartridges)).

The IFF will continue to promote the FairFloorball initiative in all events. The 3v3 World Floorball Championships will also be added to events where it will be promoted. FairFloorball is visible in all possible channels (venue, stream, social media, captains, referees). We are planning on environmental sustainability awareness raising campaigns for U19 WFC 2024 and WFC 2024 which will also feature FairFloorball. During the U19 WFC 2024 there are theme days: Kids, Family, Students, Eurovision Diversity and Mother's Day which all will also include sustainability elements (all of these have been developed by students from the local University of Applied Sciences).

The IOC has recently not replied about the final status of the Sustainability Case studies (we did deliver more picture material on request early March) however the expectation is that they should be very close to finished. The cases are Green Goal initiative at the WFC 2022 and the Fifty/Fifty equality online training module (original concept by the Swedish Federation but fully translated into English).

The GAMES project is progressing well under excellent guidance of project lead Sant'Anna. The project mid-term conference was held on the 28th of February 2024 in Oslo in cooperation with the Norwegian School of Sport Sciences which was a success. The third GAMES webinar (in a series of six) was held on the 9th of April with around 40 people participating. The topic was about integrating sponsors in the sustainability programmes of World Floorball Championships. The feedback was good, and we received good questions during the Q&A session. Floorball, and the other sports organisations in the project are working towards their six official goals for the project (**Appendix 39**)

The IFF organises a Sustainability Seminar which is held in connection with the U19 WFC 2024 in Lahti on the 8th of May 2024 (over 30 registered participants). The IFF periodically publishes news about our participation in the GAMES project and the results thereof.

Several elements of the WFC 2024 LOC is going to implement are to be found in the GAMES roadmap appendix. To increase awareness building in and around the event the LOC and IFF are working closely together. The plan to organise a used floorball equipment collection is progressing and might extend from being a local project in the Malmö to an all-Sweden project. The LOC is also negotiating with several sponsors to include sustainability elements in the sponsorship package (inspired by WFC 2022).

CB decided: To approve the report

§ 11. IFF Office

Mr. Liljelund reported that the process of defining the different tasks for each person in the IFF Staff has continued and will be finalised in beginning of May. IFF will make Ms. Blanka Benyo, the current trainee, an offer for a full-time position later in June, when her tasks have been defined.

Mr. Liljelund to further inform that a meeting has been held with the Finnish Ministry of Education about the hosting of the IFF office in Finland and a continued support from the Ministry. The present agreement ends in the end of the year 2024 and it needs to be solved before the summer break in Finland (July). The Finnish government is presently cutting the support of Sport with approx. some 20-25 %, but despite this the Ministry has given the green light to support the IFF Office in the future, but we are still waiting for a final confirmation from the ministry. After this negotiations will start with the Finnish federation on the agreements on the IFF Office and the IFF secretary general.

CB decided: To approve the report

§ 12. Members

Membership questions

Mr. Halonen reported that the IFF office has received all the needed documents for the change of the membership in Cameroon. The new association is also called the Cameroon Floorball Association and they have the official recognition from the authorities in Cameroon. The association is run by the President Ms. Elise Kana. The association already participated to the Africa Cup in September 2023. The problematic situation in Cameroon has been going on for almost six years and now finally the IFF office can propose to change the representation in Cameroon. The present member is aware of the change.

Mr. Hidir and Mr. Houman asked if the new organisation has been active, to which Mr. Halonen answered that they have been very active in the last 6 months and participated in the Africa Cup in Cote d'Ivoire.

CB decided: To approve the report and the change of the membership of the Cameroon Floorball Association

New Member applications

Mr. Halonen reported that the process with the Moroccan Floorball Association is ongoing and they want to apply for a recognition from their ministry of sports and youth before they fully apply for the membership within the IFF. The IFF office has delivered a support letter to Moroccan Academy Sports Association - AIN SEBAA, which was addressed to the ministry of sports and youth. As soon as they finalize all the documents the membership application will be brought to the IFF CB.

ANNOUNCEMENT OF THE 18th IFF GENERAL ASSEMBLY 2024

Dear Ms./Mrs./Mr. President,

The IFF Central Board hereby invites the member associations of the IFF to participate in the 18th General Assembly of the International Floorball Federation in Malmö, Sweden on Saturday the 14th of December 2024.

The IFF 18th General Assembly 2024 will be held **on Saturday the 14th of December 2024, starting at 08.30 in the Malmö Arena Hotel**. The detailed information of the meeting system will be provided in the Final Announcement of the IFF General Assembly in November 2024.

1. Regarding participation in the General Assembly

All member Associations are welcome to participate in the General Assembly with two representatives each. If an interpreter is needed, the association may use one. Each member federation needs to inform which delegate will use the vote of the association. Please remember to register the name of the representative of the member associations who can vote in the General Assembly no later than the 22nd of November 2024 to the IFF Office, at the mail address halonen@floorball.sport

All member Associations are entitled to make proposals to the General Assembly, but only the ordinary member Associations are entitled to vote, see § 29.1. IFF Statutes. Nota bene that the ordinary members must have fulfilled all their obligations towards the IFF in accordance with the IFF Licence System, i.e. amongst other things have no debts to the IFF unless an IFF approved payment plan is followed. See § 29.2 IFF Statutes.

ARTICLE 29 VOTING STATUS

- 29.1 Each member Association is allowed to participate with two persons (delegates legitimated by the National Association) at the General Assembly. A person can only represent one Association.
- 29.2 Each ordinary member Association which has fulfilled its obligations to IFF is entitled to one vote at the General Assembly. The CB informs the voting roll and distributes it together with the documents of the General Assembly latest 30 full days before the General Assembly.

2. Regarding acquisition of ordinary membership

Presently the IFF consists of 45 ordinary members and 35 provisional members. The CB may only grant provisional membership for a period of four years. After a maximum of 4 years from becoming a provisional member, the Association will, automatically, become an ordinary member, after a decision at the IFF General Assembly. A provisional member association can also choose to apply for ordinary membership earlier.

The IFF CB strongly urges the provisional members to consider their situation to apply for the ordinary membership in accordance with the § 13 IFF Statutes below:

ARTICLE 13 ACQUISITION OF PROVISIONAL MEMBERSHIP

- 13.1 The Association can be a section of another Sports Federation which is a member of the National Sports Confederation.

- 13.2 If the statutes and regulations correspond to the statutes of the IFF and the conditions for membership are fulfilled.
The provisional membership shall be granted by the CB.
- 13.3 Provisional membership shall only be granted for four years. After a maximum of 4 years from becoming a provisional member the Association will, automatically, become an ordinary member, after a decision taken at the IFF General Assembly, if the Association in question is fulfilling the requirements of article 14.

ARTICLE 14 ACQUISITION OF ORDINARY MEMBERSHIP

- 14.1 The Association shall be a self-ruled Floorball Association or a self-ruled Floorball section in another Association.
- 14.2 The Association shall consist of at least 10 Clubs. Exceptions can only be granted by the CB.
- 14.3 The Association shall be the Organizer of National Floorball Championships.
- 14.4 The Association shall be member of the National Sports Confederation (Exception: if there are justifiable reasons).
- 14.5 An application for ordinary membership can also be handed in to the IFF according to article 12, paragraph 1, earlier than the four years.
- 14.6 Ordinary membership is granted by the General Assembly.

3. Regarding nominations:

The IFF Central Board invites its member Association to make nominations, motions and proposals according to the IFF statutes concerning nominations, see § 27 as follows:

ARTICLE 27 NOMINATIONS, MOTIONS AND PROPOSALS

- 27.1 Candidates for election to any office in the IFF shall be nominated to the official address of the IFF at latest 60 full days in advance of the General Assembly. Only persons of an ordinary member are eligible for elections.
- 27.2 All proposals and motions of the member Associations shall be sent in to the official address of the IFF at latest 60 full days in advance of the General Assembly.

The position that the IFF invites to nominate candidates for the period 2025 - 2028 are:

- IFF President
- Nine members of the IFF Central Board
- Chair of the Disciplinary Committee (DC)
- 2 members and 2 substitutes of DC
- Chair of the Appeal Committee (AC)
- 2 members and 2 substitutes of AC
- Chair for the IFF Ethics Commission (ETC)
- 3 members of ETC

IFF, Alakiventie 2, 00920 Helsinki, Finland, or by email office@floorball.sport , to be IFF by hand
no later than 60 full days before the General Assembly (Monday 14th of October 2024).***

Summons to the 18th IFF General Assembly together with the agenda, CB reports, the financial reports for the years 2022 and 2023 with the related auditors' reports, budgets for the years 2025 and 2026, a proposal for updates of the IFF Statutes and possible other motions and proposals will be sent to you latest 30 full days in advance (Thursday 14th of November 2024) of the IFF General Assembly.

1.6. Digital marketing report

U19 WFC 2024 channels were Instagram, Facebook, X and IFF Floorball TikTok. The most used channel was Instagram, since the targeted audience uses the most Instagram.

Social Media marketing started 1st September 2023 and the last post was published 31st May 2024. In total, on Instagram, has been published 136 posts, which 46 were Reels and 90 pictures, in addition to these numbers it has been published hundreds of Stories.

On Instagram Reels has gotten all together 2 296 662 (46 videos) views. Instagram pictures have gotten altogether 98 214 likes (90 posts), where the most liked one: 4979 as Miisa Turunen "how it started vs how it is going now".

On TikTok, it was published in total eight videos which gained in total 2 345 965 views. TOP three: 2 300 000 views (what to do with the stick), 41 640 (Finja x slow motion video) and 32 954 (xmas edition). Paid advertising budget was 2000€ and 97% was used. The focus was for TikTok non-followers. The strategy was to achieve young Finnish people, who are not naturally following floorball.

For the other ads, 1 the final game ad: picture, reach 23 967, commitment 945, the average price for one person 0,10€. Audience: mostly 25–44-year-old men from Uusimaa. 2 the "we go to the finals" picture: reach 26 822, commitment 706, average price 0,31€. Audience: mostly 25–34-year-old men from Uusimaa. 3 Janne Saarinen video: reach 11 617, link click 456, 3 sec 40%, Average price 0,13€. Audience: mostly 25–34-year-old men from Uusimaa.

A lot of marketing was done on Finnish Floorball Federation social media channels (IG, YT, FB, TikTok, X, LinkedIn, website). The following numbers are daily results from the WFC week (6.-12.5.2024). On FB, the daily reach was 72 000 (195,5%) of which 23517 were followers and 48 779 non-followers. On Instagram, daily reach was 257 400 (132,90%), content interaction 79 000 (466,9%) and link click 1 600 profile (446,50%).

The successes of digital marketing were cooperation with Janne Saarinen (radio and salibandy channels), brand-understood posts as players my days and how it started vs how it's going as well as 2,3m views on TikTok with what to do with the stick.

This analysis has not taken into consideration Stories, FB, website or X (U19 WFC) or the long-term view of Salibandy .fi channels. Lahti city, MLL, IFF, radio or other relative channels.

Object: In the match of Norway v Germany on Saturday 11th May 2024 at the Women's U19 WFC 2024 in Lahti, Finland, the IFF Referee Management of the event reported an incident for review by the Event Disciplinary Function, involving Mia Osterbo Nilsen, #21 from Team Norway. The incident under review happened at 29:56.

Close to the German goal, the Team Norway player Osterbo Nilsen had possession of the ball behind the goal line and attempted to move past the goalkeeper into a scoring position. The German goalkeeper and two defenders blocked the player's movement. After losing possession of the ball Osterbo Nilsen intentionally first pressed her stick to the upper body and neck of the German goalkeeper and then ripped it loose and swung her stick at the goalkeeper, making direct contact with the helmet, with the hit being strong enough to completely knock the helmet off the goalkeeper's head. The incident was not penalised by the referees.

It was the opinion of the Referee Management that Osterbo Nilsen should have received a match penalty for violent physical play, according to Rule 614:3 - When a player is guilty of violent physical play (909). According to the Rules of the Game 2022 (Rule 613:2): Match penalty shall lead to suspension for the rest of the match and from the following match in the same competition and possible further punishment according to the conditions and routines set by the administrating authority.

Case Facts: The incident was reviewed by the IFF Event Disciplinary Function (EDF) and it was their opinion that Mia Osterbo Nilsen made a direct contact with the head of the opponent player, with a movement of the stick that was intentional and with force. The preliminary decision of the EDF was that the player should have been penalised with a Match penalty, which is an automatic suspension from the next game in the event. The player was given the opportunity to enter a statement about the incident but decided not to.

The final decision of the EDF was that Mia Osterbo Nilsen was suspended from Team Norway's next and last match in the Women's U19 WFC 2024, being the 7th place match against Denmark on Sunday 12th May 2024 at 10:30 EET. The EDF is limited to applying decisions only to the matches in its specific event, which in this case was only one remaining match. However, due to the seriousness of the action – direct contact with a stick to an opponent's head – the EDF will refer the situation to the IFF Disciplinary Committee for further review and possible further suspension.

The IFF Disciplinary Committee (IFF DC) asked for the statements of the Team Norway player Mia Osterbo Nielsen and the referee pair Igor Ivanchenko and Danylo Abeliashchev from Ukraine.

The referees stated that in that situation, the referee Ivanchenko was placed behind the goal and says he saw that the Norwegian player Nr. 21 with the ball tried to pass an opponent, from the side of the goal, but the ball was knocked out and she made a body contact with a player from

German team. In this situation the attention of Ivanchenko went to the ball and then he saw that the Norway player Nr,21 was blocking the goalkeeper and whistled for a free-hit. He noticed that the helmet came off from the goalkeeper and saw the movement of the Norwegian player's stick at waist level, but not the hit itself. He stopped the game and warned the player that she must be careful and she must be sure when she take out her stick that it is safe for other players.

The referee Abeliashev was situated by the mid-line. From his position, the situation at the goal could not be clearly seen because the field players from both teams blocked his view to the goal. The defender near the goal also had her back to the referee and covered the actions of the Norwegian player. Mr. Abeliashev commented that "After the whistle of my colleague, I saw how the goalkeeper's helmet flew off, but I could not see what contributed to this".

The Norwegian player Mia Osterbo Nielsen gave the following statement: My action in the heat of the moment in our match against Germany is something I regret. I have learned from it and will be working hard to prevent this in the future. My intension was never to hit or hurt the goalkeeper.

Consideration: The IFF Disciplinary Committee finds that the incident has fulfilled the criteria for the DC to take it under consideration.

The Norwegian player Mia Osterbo Nielsen clearly first pushes her stick to the upper body of the Team Germany goalkeeper and then after drawing it back violently hits the goalkeeper.

As the referees in the match, didn't see the actual situation clearly, they only gave a free-hit for Team Germany and warned the Norwegian player Osterbo Nielsen.

As the IFF Event Disciplinary Function has defined in its final decision, the player should have been awarded a Match Penalty for a violent physical play, in accordance to the IFF Rules of the Game. A player must always take responsibility of her stick in all situations and in this case the player violently struck the opponents goalkeeper.

Decision and applicable provisions:

The IFF Disciplinary Committee decides to sanction the Team Norway Player Ms. Mia Osterbo Nielsen with a suspension of participation in three International Matches. As it is unsure, if the player will have any International Matches in the near future the sanction is changed for a suspension for a period of three first games served in the national series of her club of the season 2024-2025.

Reasons: The IFF Disciplinary Committee finds that the Team Norway player Ms. Mia Osterbo Nielsen has breached Rule 614:3 for violent physical play, according to - When a player is guilty of violent physical play (909).

As the referees didn't award the player with the Match Penalty, the IFF EDF According to the Rules of the Game 2022 (Rule 613:2) awarded the player the Match Penalty and forwarded the case, as it was felt to be more serious than just a Match penalty to the IFF DC:

The decision is made based on the IFF Juridical Regulation (Art 33.4.c, 54.4. & 54.10. and 72.5.)

Decision

Procedure: The decision was unanimous

Appeal

procedure: The directions for an appeal according to the IFF Juridical Regulation Chapter V, Article 93-100.

An appeal may be lodged to the Appeal Committee against any sanction passed by the Disciplinary Committee, the Jury or the Central Board, unless the sanction pronounced is a warning, reprimand, suspension of less than three matches or up to two months or a fine less than 5.000 CHF. (Juridical Regulation Art 94.1 a-d.)

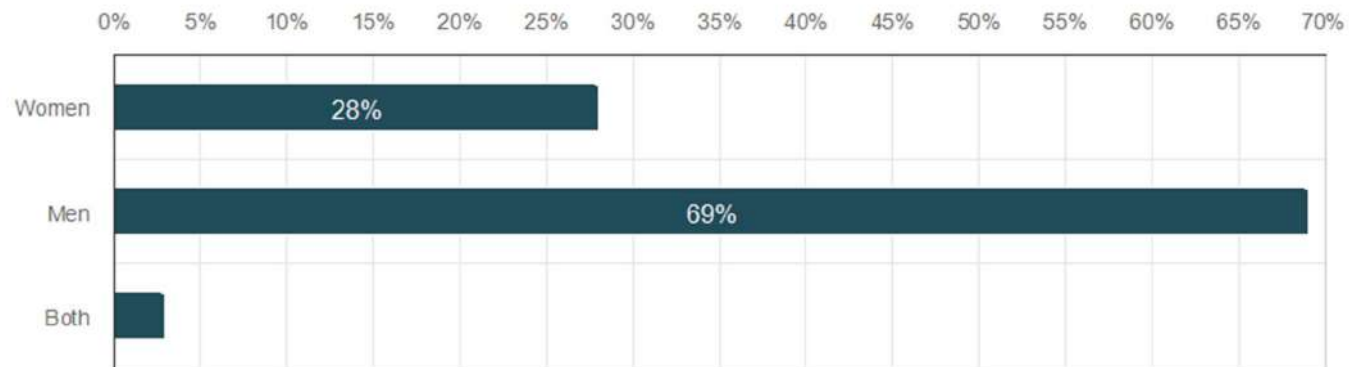

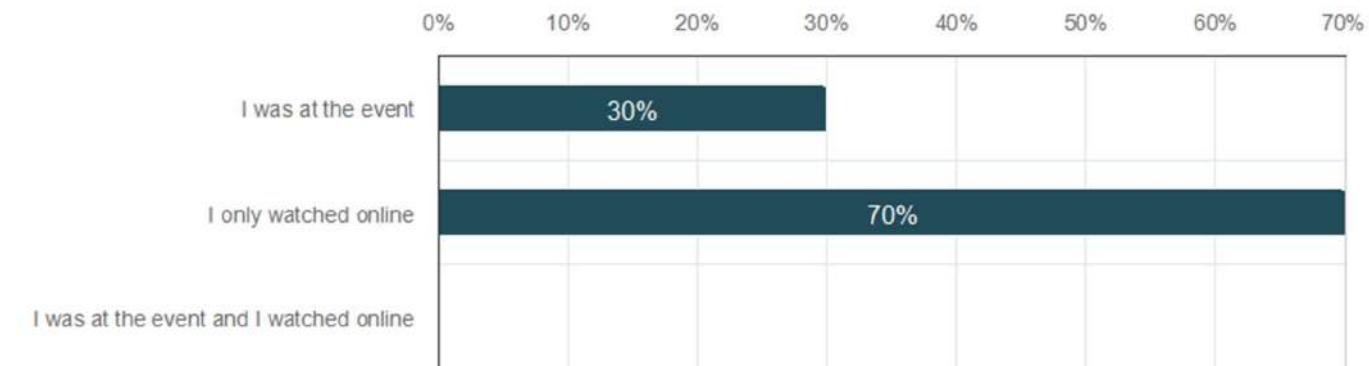

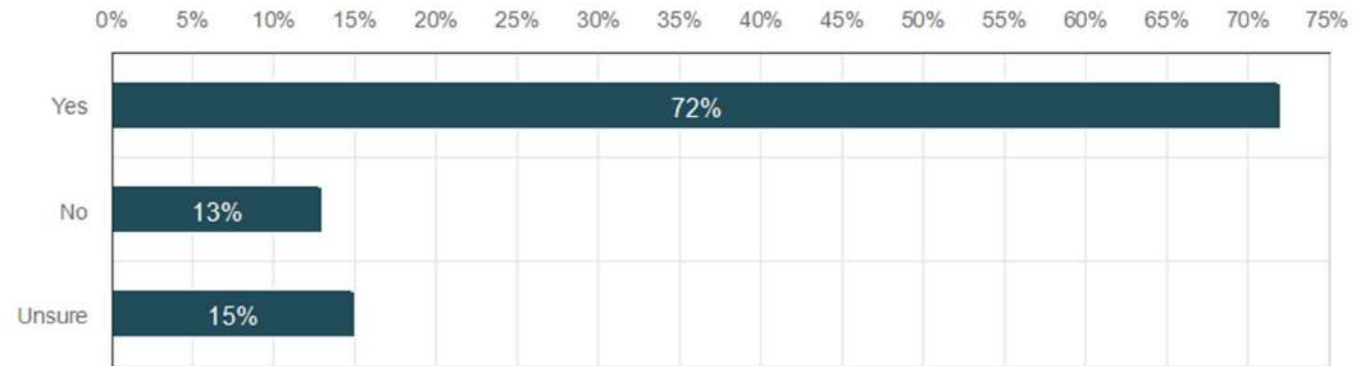

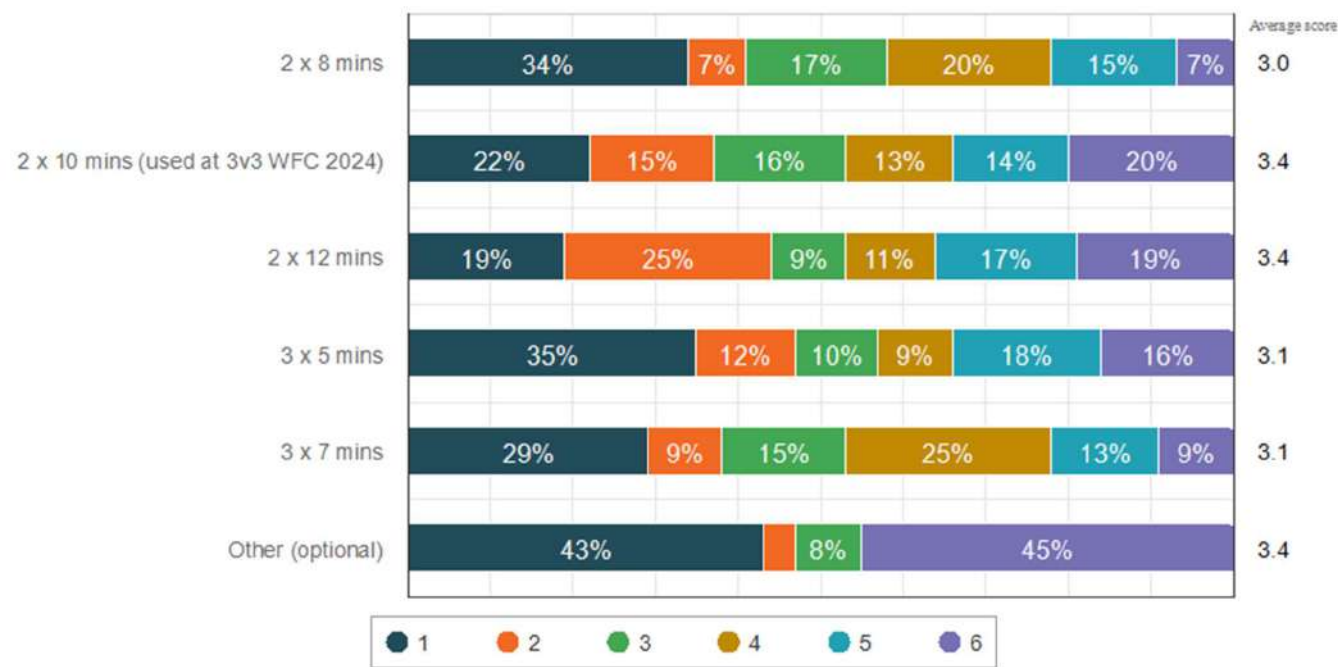

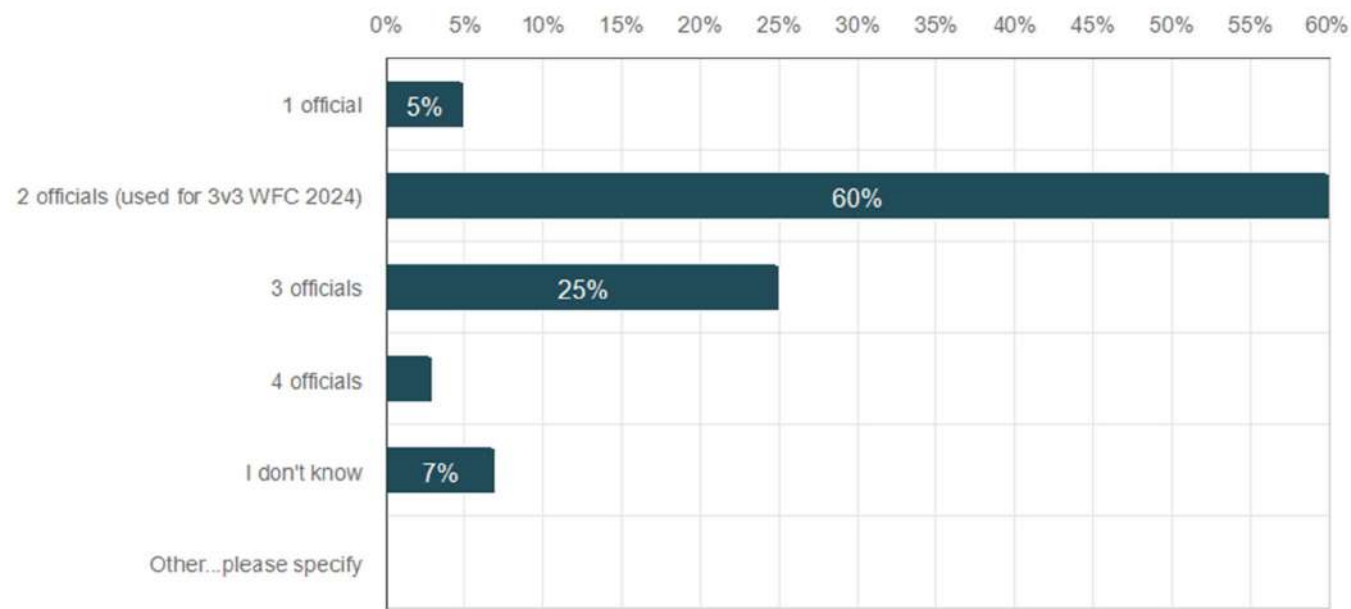

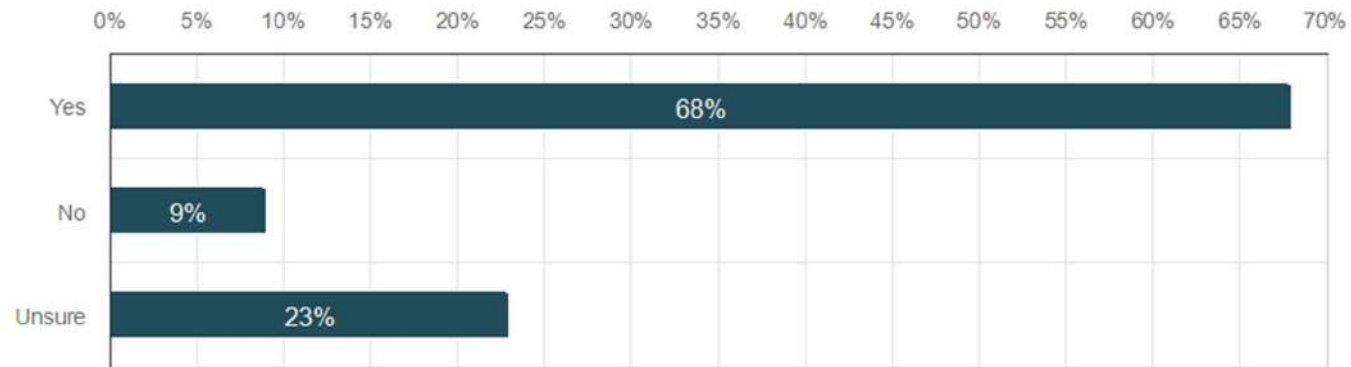

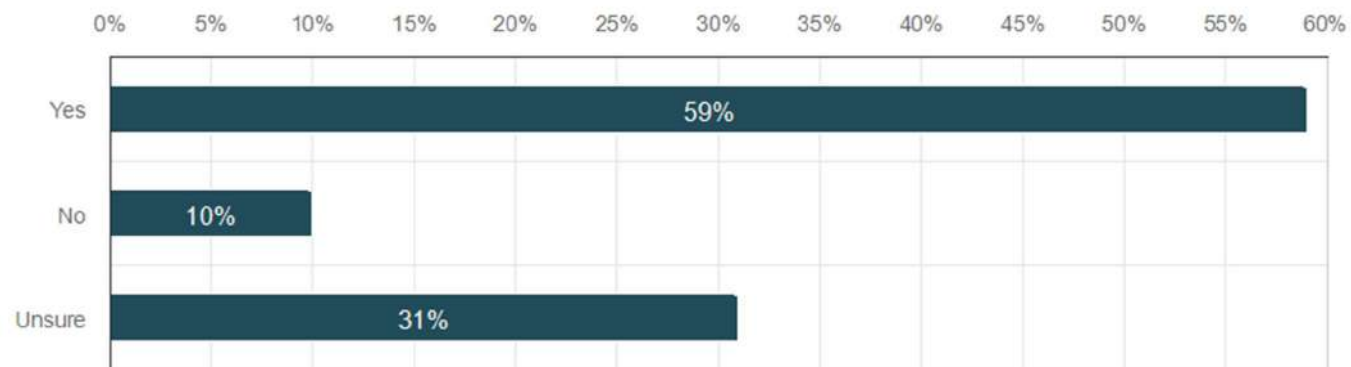

It would help if the opening of the bag is large and stable, e.g. with a ring/wire and the bag must be well filled.
This look like of a fun game. Please use the rules of 5 v 5
There were sometimes issues grabbing the ball fast because of the shape of the opening on the bag. For example a more rigid bag or container or even a rail-like slot running across the back bar of the goal with balls ready for pickup
It would be nice to have it more shaped as a bin. It will be easier to grab balls from the bag. Also for short goalies it is difficult to get the balls at the bottom of the bag.
High behind, forcing the goalkeeper to always get up to be able to take a ball, which prevents the restart from being even faster (<i>Haut derrière, obligent le gardien à toujours se relever pour pouvoir prendre une balle, se qui empêche la relance d'être encore plus rapide</i>)
If you try to get a ball it took long to get one out of the bag - especially if there weren't many balls in anymore.
When it was full of balls, it was ok, but when it was pretty empty, the goalkeeper sometimes had a "rough" time to get the ball. It just took longer than normally.
For short goalies it was hard to reach. It should be easily reachable for every size of goalies.
An easier bag that can be open all the time, faster and easier to catch the ball than a basic bag, not on the roof of the goal but just behind the top iron to hang somehow (<i>Helpompi pussukka joka voi olla koko aika auki, nopeampi helpompi napata pallo kun perus pussukka, ei maalin katolle vaan just taka yläraudasta roikkumaan jotenkin</i>)
A shallower bag would make it easier to recover the ball.

FEEDBACK REPORT SUMMARY

RESPONDENTS

Total number of responses was 161

Majority of respondents were players – 64.6%

Majority of respondents were male – 69% (which is equally reflective of the event participants being 68% male)

Of the respondents who were spectators, 70% of them watched the event only online

The respondents were from 23 different countries

The largest number of responses came from Switzerland (48), followed by Finland (15), Netherlands (13), France & Poland (9), Sweden (8), with the rest having 5 or less responses.

The average experience rating for the event was 7.9/10

PLAYING TIME

72% were happy with the playing time of the matches (2 x 10mins)

The main reason giving for being dissatisfied with the playing time was that it was too short

The preferred playing time (chosen from a given selection) was:

- 1) Alternative playing time (43%)
- 2) 3 x 5 mins (35%)
- 3) 2 x 8 mins (34%)
- 4) 3 x 7mins (29%)
- 5) 2 x 10mins (22%) (*used at 3v3 WFC 2024*)

The most common other suggestions for alternative playing times (freely suggested) were:

- 1) 2 x 15mins
- 2) 2 x 20mins*

**NOTE: 2 x 20mins is the format used in Swiss 3v3 competition so the high preference for this may be impacted by the large number of Swiss respondents*

NUMBER OF PLAYERS & OFFICIALS

The preferred number of players (chosen from a given selection) was:

- 1) 9 players + 2 goalkeepers (50%)
- 2) 8 players + 2 goalkeepers (33%) (*used at 3v3 WFC 2024*)

The preferred number of officials (chosen from a given selection) was:

- 1) 2 officials (60%) (*used at 3v3 WFC 2024*)
- 2) 3 officials (25%)

FIELD SIZE

The preferred field size (chosen from a given selection) was:

- 1) 20x19m (39%) (*used at 3v3 WFC 2024*)
- 2) 22x11m (29%)
- 3) 24x12m (28%)

BALL BAG

68% of respondents were satisfied with the placement of the ball bag (attached to the back of the goal)

The most common reasons for being dissatisfied with the placement of the ball bag was the difficulty of getting balls when the bag was getting close to being empty, or the difficulty of reaching the bag (which was often explained in relation to the shorter height of female goalkeepers)

59% of respondents were satisfied with the shape & size of the ball bag

The most common reason given from the 31% of respondents who chose 'Unsure' as their answer about the shape and size of the ball bag, was that having a larger opening that made getting the balls out easier / faster would be better

PLAYING FORMAT

The average rating of the playing format was 7.8/10

Some of the most popular features of the format (based on open answers) were:

- The possibility for smaller nations to participate
- The speed and intensity of the games
- The possibility to play against lots of different countries
- Teams getting a 'second chance' with B-finals
- The atmosphere with multiple courts under one roof
- Penalty shot
- Goalkeepers being more involved in the game

Some of the features of the format that were NOT liked (based on open answers) were:

- No bronze medal matches
- Countries being able to have multiple teams
- Games not spread over two (or more days)
- With only 1 referee many things were missed & play was more physical
- Penalty shot

By far the most popular suggestion for a change to the playing format (based on open answers) was to have more days. Other suggestions were:

- Playing overtime before a penalty shootout in play-off matches
- National anthems before finals
- 2 referees for all games
- Being able to replace the goalkeeper with a field player
- A larger goalkeeper area

OTHER FEEDBACK

The most common other suggestions for the future (based on open answers) was:

- Having every match streamed
- Food / drink options for the teams
- Locker rooms located within the venue
- Warm-up area
- Match speaker, especially for the finals
- More media coverage
- Matches & medals for 3rd place

Ticket sales

With 100 days to go on August 29, LOC announced that 4,000 final weekend packages remained for sale in Malmö Arena. The LOC also only has 10 boxes left to sell on the final day. Close to 5,000 tickets have currently been ordered by floorball clubs for group stage matches.

So far, over 8,600 pupils up to the age of 9 in 67 schools have been visited by a floorball instructor in a physical education lesson and have been invited to a training session at a local floorball club afterwards. The goal is to visit over 20,000 pupils in the region to before the WFC in December. As part of the project, the possibility for schools in the southern part of Sweden to order free WC tickets was opened at the beginning of September. During the first day, 500 tickets were ordered. The project is financed by Visit Skåne and the City of Malmö, with the support of friends such as Gerflor and OBOS.

The LOC has produced custom marketing materials for several countries (and more to come) – see Appendix 1.

Sustainability

Sustainability is a focus area for the championships. WFC 2024 is now close to get a sustainability certification.

The GAMES project will hold its sixth steering group meeting and "Final Conference" (a public seminar) on December 9-10th during the championship in Malmö.

Ticket sales

Appendix 3: WFC 2024: Report from LOC February 2024

Organization

The operational work from the Swedish Floorball Federation is led by Magnus Nilsson as event director, together with Amanda Emet as event coordinator and Tobias Linderöth as event project manager. On March 1, Maja Wijkström starts as responsible for WFC's communications. The local work is, on part time, led by Henrik Paulsson from the Skåne Floorball Association, with Ellen Tillman as responsible for the "Little WFC" project.

The WFC 2024 is organized in close cooperation with the City of Malmö, Visit Skåne and Malmö Arena.

Venues

The WFC 2024 will be played in Malmö Arena and the Baltic Hall, easily accessible by train from Copenhagen Airport in Denmark. Scandic Hotels is the official hotel partner of the championships.

Sustainability

Sustainability is a focus area for the championships. Through participation in the Erasmus project GAMES, together with IFF, the event's sustainability work is made visible to all target groups. WFC 2024 is also intended to be sustainability certified.

Through the Swedish lottery organization Folkspel, a WFC-designed scratch card has been produced which from 1 April will be sold by the floorball clubs in Sweden and thereby contribute to the marketing of the championships. A total of 1 million lottery tickets are available for sale at SEK 50/lot, of which SEK 20 goes to the selling club.

Organization

- The Steering Committee of the Men's U19 WFC 2025 has been founded in autumn 2023
- The WFC Organization Committee is run by swiss unihockey
- Project Leader Andreas Cadisch has started in January 2024
- A project assistant will be hired from 1st of October
- Close cooperation with the office of swiss unihockey is running
- The operation at the venues in Zurich is run by the local club GC Unihockey
 - o Responsible for the Saalsporthalle will be Lea Riesen from swiss unihockey
 - o Responsible for the Sportshall Hardau will be one person from GC Zürich
 - o Responsible for the Swiss Life Arena (Final Weekend) will be Daniel Kasser
- GC Zürich is in charge to recruit about 90% of the needed volunteers
- For the upbuilding & rebuilding of the arenas we can count on help of civil defence
- The booking of the teams will be handled like at the WFC 2022 and Gast Reisen SA will be in charge.

Finances

- The budget is CHF 1.5 Mio
- The goal is a break-even result with inclusion of investments of CHF 350'000.- for activities to help floorball growing
- The budgeted revenue from the public authorities (state, canton, host cities) is CHF 900'000 Tsd, an mostly secured.

Sponsoring

- U19 WFC OC was able to sell 1 Leading Sponsor package (Die Mobiliar) and 1 Main Sponsor package (GAST Reisen)
- We have verbal declarations of intent from 3 more companies to buy either a Leading package or a Main Sponsor package
- Further negotiations are in progress

Marketing and Communication

- The goal is to attract about 15'000 to 20'000 spectators in the arenas
- Swiss unihockey is in negotiations with TV24 as a broadcaster of the swiss games as well as the final weekend in the Swiss Life Arena.

Agenda

1. Opening

Mr. Eriksson welcomed the members of the ExCo to the first meeting of the year and opened the meeting at 13:00 CET.

2. Approval of the Agreement for the IFF Office in Helsinki and the Secretary general with the Finnish Floorball Federation

Mr. Eriksson informed that, as discussed in the last IFF CB meetings, the IFF have now received the confirmation from the Finnish Ministry of Sport for their continued support for the IFF Office in Helsinki, Finland for the period of 2025-2028. In connection to this, there have been discussions with the Finnish federation about moving the IFF Office up to the Finnish federation offices on the 2nd floor in Myllypuro.

The previous CB meeting gave Mr. Eriksson and Mr. Liljelund the task to prepare the agreements for the hosting of the IFF Office in Helsinki and the employment system for the IFF Secretary general. Both agreements are to be signed with the Finnish federation and we have sent these to the Finnish federation and waiting for their comments, which have been promised during the week starting on the 10th of June. The proposed agreements have been built based on the valid ones.
(Appendix 1 and 2)

In order to secure the IFF Office placement in Helsinki and to avoid any unnecessary issues, the IFF ExCo would need to approve these agreements, so that they can be signed, as it will be too late to have them signed only after the CB meeting in September, especially if there would occur some questions.

Mr. Suman asked if there are any changes in the agreements. Mr. Liljelund explained that there has been some small changed in the agreement for the IFF Office and for the secretary general agreement the sum has been raised to 175.000 CHF from 171.000 CHF. Mr. Liljelund also

informed that he will bring a proposal for the IFF CB for his employment contract in the meeting in September.

ExCo decided: To approve the agreements

3. IWGA Women's Leadership course

Mr. Eriksson to report that in the IWGA Annual General meeting in Esslingen in May, IWGA Vice President Tom Dielen presented IWGA's inaugural women leadership course which will be organised in November 2024. The Women Lead Sports Programme offers a distinctive mix of practical tactics and expert theory, with a track record of proven success, empowering women to pursue leadership roles and foster gender equity. The online course shall target women actively involved in the leadership pipeline of International or National Federations.

A second workshop has already been approved for a similar period in 2025. The IWGA Executive Committee decided to offer this programme for free to its members. Particularly members of the ARISF and AIMS group are targeted, considering that ASOIF has been offering this programme successfully to its member associations for several years. Each IF can nominate up to two (2) participants.

The education is built, to answer the concern raised by IWGA member that there are far too little women in the leadership of the IWGA and its members, to increase the number of female leaders within the IWGA IF's. There is a need to be able to bring more females also to different roles in the IWGA organisation. The programme has 22 slots and already there has been over ten nominees proposed, so even if we can nominate two persons, we might end up with just one.

The online workshop will start on Monday, 4 November and will be held in four (4) consecutive sessions on the exact same time and day each week. Each session takes two (2) hours. In addition, five (5) hours of web-based content will be offered to the participants. The participants are expected to dedicate 30 - 60 minutes between sessions, with 90% of the content delivered online, to qualify for certification. We are to nominate this persons latest on the 30th of June.

The IFF President and the IFF Office have short-listed a number of candidates that could be possible for this, and they are: Agata Plechan, Zuzana Svobodová, Pakkamol Siriwat, Lara Heini and Helen Wiklund-Wårell.

Mr. Eriksson and Mr. Suman felt that it is a good initiative and would like us to nominate two candidates. Mr. King asked if the nominee needs to be a member of the IFF CB, to which the general feeling was that the candidates doesn't need to be CB members.

ExCo decided: To nominate Ms. Agata Plechan and Ms. Zuzana Svobodová candidates for the IWGA Women's leadership program

4. Renewal of the TV Sales agreement

Mr. Liljelund reported that the agreement with Protocol Sports Marketing will end in the end of August and will automatically continue for another five years if we don't cancel the agreement at

least a month before. IFF met with Mr. Khaled Abdalla during SportAccord in Birmingham and was offered a proposal for the future, which we have not received despite having been promised for May.

As Protocol Sport has been able to provide some exposure deals, they have not brought too much deals with revenues, we have been looking for other solutions. We have contacted two companies (SpringMedia and Icarus) to ask for their interest to work with IFF.

Spring Media has informed that they are interested but have not yet provided any ideas and Icarus has promised to provide an offer next week. **(Appendix 3)**

Mr. Suman felt that it was a good initiative to discuss with also other companies. It would not be in the interest of the IFF to sign a five-year agreement, which Mr. King fully agreed to. In the discussions with Protocol Sports, The basis for the discussions with Protocol Sport must be conducted so that a decision can be made later than in the end of August.

ExCo decided: that IFF shouldn't sign too long agreements and revert to the topic in beginning of August.

5. Agreement with FICS (Federation of International Chiropractic's in Sport)

Mr. Liljelund to inform that IFF has discussed with FICS about starting a cooperation, which would include the use of the FICS services during the Major IFF Events, based on the positive experience from The World Games in Wroclaw 2017 and Birmingham 2022.

The idea is to have a team of FICS chiropractic's for the WFC 2024, providing services in both venues for the accredited persons. The FICS works on voluntary basis and IFF would have to cover the board & lodging for the doctors. The IFF Office proposes that we would make this investment to help the athletes during the event. The FICS doctors do not deal with the athletes during the games, but can provide services both before and after the games.

FICS has prepared an agreement for the cooperation **(Appendix 4)**, which would need to be signed before the IFF CB meeting in September so that we could start the preparations for the WFC 2024.

ExCo decided: To approve the agreement

6. Any other business

The ExCo decided to have a ExCo meeting on the 27th of August at 12:00 CET to prepare for the IFF CB meeting and CB workshop.

1. Opening

Mr. Eriksson welcomed the members of the ExCo to the second meeting of the year and opened the meeting at 11:00 CET.

2. Approval of the Agreement for the IFF Office in Helsinki and the Secretary general with the Finnish Floorball Federation

Mr. Eriksson informed that the Finnish Floorball Federation has approved and signed the agreements for the hosting of the IFF Office in Helsinki and the employment system for the IFF Secretary general.

ExCo decided: To approve the report

3. IWGA Women's Leadership course

Mr. Eriksson reported that IWGA has informed that a total of 40 applicants had been nominated for the IWGA's inaugural women leadership course which will be organised in November 2024 by the IOC. The Women Lead Sports Programme offers a distinctive mix of practical tactics and expert theory, with a track record of proven success, empowering women to pursue leadership roles and foster gender equity. The online course shall target women actively involved in the leadership pipeline of International or National Federations.

The IFF ExCo decided in its previous meeting to nominate Ms. Agatha Plechan and Ms. Zuzana Svobodová for the course. As there was a large number of candidates, IFF was only awarded one place, which went to Ms. Agatha Plechan. IWGA has already agreed with IOC to organise a second course next year.

Ms. Plechan has been informed about the approval.

ExCo decided: To approve the report

4. Renewal of the TV Sales agreement

Mr. Liljelund reported that based on the discussion held in the IFF ExCo, the IFF Office contacted the Protocol Sports Marketing and asked again for the new offer, which we hadn't yet received, based on the discussions held during the year. Protocol sports came back with a statement that as the sales target of 50.000 USD has been achieved (total sales 51:000 USD, out of which IFF has sold and dealt with most companies), the deal would automatically be renewed. In addition Protocol Sports felt that IFF should pay a retainer fee, for the work Protocol is doing and that IFF should provide the present deals we handle directly with the TV's into the hands of Protocol.

Based on this the IFF Office consulted Mr. Philippe Renz for legal advice and Mr. Renz recommendation was that we would terminate the contract in writing. This was done on Monday the 19th of August, in which we said that we are still willing to discuss a new contract, for a three year period, but not with such terms as they proposed. Protocol Sports Marketing on Tuesday the 27th for a meeting to clarify the situation.

Depending on their response, we will continue negotiations with them or seek contact with a potential new partner.

ExCo decided: To approve the report

5. Freeing of Players for National Teams

Mr. Liljelund reported that in the last CB meeting the wording of the regulation was agreed upon by everyone, but the way how to implement this had to be worked upon and a guideline had to be created, outlining the responsibilities of all parties (National Association, Player, Club). The text worked out by the competition office and then agreed upon by the RACC is 4.1-4.4 & 4.11 (market red). The articles 4.5-4.10 has only been renumbered.

The IFF Event manager Ms. Mitchell has asked the IFF ExCo to take the decision in this matter, so that the change of the regulation can be taken into force by the 27th of August, so that it is in place for the Friendly Internationals for the International weekend.

Competition Regulations – National teams & Friendly international matches

§ 4 RELEASE OF PLAYERS

- 4.1. A player officially nominated for representation in a national team for an international event and/or national team training camp is obliged to represent. The player is obliged to inform the club to which they are bound of their nomination within 3 days of notification by their National Association.**

- 4.2. The club is obliged to release the player who has been officially nominated for the needs of the national team, according to 4.5, 4.6, and 4.7.
- 4.3. It is up to each National Association to set their own rules regarding the selection and informing of players of their nomination to a national team, however those rules must align with the IFF rules regarding participation in national team events.
- 4.4. It is up to each National Association to set internal rules for its own competitions to resolve any conflict from the selection of national team representatives (postponement of matches, etc.).
- 4.5. For the final round of WFC and U19 WFC players shall be freed for participation in their respective national teams starting the Saturday in advance of the event and at least one day after.
- 4.6. For the final round of multi-sport events, as well as the qualifications for WFC, U19 WFC, and multi-sport events, players shall be freed for participation in their respective national teams at least three days in advance of the event and at least one day after.
- 4.7. For Friendly Internationals and training camps during IFF International weekends (1st full weekend of February, 4th weekend of April, 1st full weekend of September, 3rd weekend of October and 2nd weekend of November) players shall be freed for participation in their respective national teams at least three days in advance of the event and at least one day after.
- 4.8. A National Association who selects a player who plays in a foreign league club (at any level) for participation in a national team in an official international event, is required to inform the foreign club's National Association of the selection, and confirm the availability of the player, prior to the submission of their official team list to the IFF.
- 4.9. A National Association who selects a player who plays in a foreign league club (at any level) for participation in a national team training camp, is required to inform the foreign club's National Association of the selection, and confirm the availability of the player, no later than 14 days prior to start of the training camp.
- 4.10. Any player who is selected by their National Association for an official international event &/or training camp and informs they are not available to play in the respective event &/or training camp, shall not be entitled to play a club match held at the corresponding time as the event &/or training camp. If the player does play for their club at this time, then the National Association of the club team for which they play shall be fined.
- 4.11. **Players who have, before the submission of the official team list to the IFF, announced that they have withdrawn from the national team, in accordance with the internal rules set by each National Association, should not be included to an official team list for an IFF event.**

Mr. Suman felt that the decision should not be made to become in force without a pre-information. Mr. King asked what the players responsibility is. The ExCo discussed how the issue if the nominated player is not telling their own club will be handled, but the responsibility in the end is still with National Association nominating player

ExCo decided: to approve the changes in the regulations and to publish the information that they will become valid from the 08.09.2024 and to present this to the CB for confirmation.

6. Change of IFF Juridical Regulations, due to the change of the Freeing of Player rules.

Mr. Liljelund to report that the IFF Office has prepared also the relevant addition in the IFF Juridical Regulations, by adding a point in Article 25 Breach of Competition Regulations.

The ExCo discussed the formulation of the new Article in the Juridical Regulation 25.2., to clarify the time the player needs to be freed. The new point would be as follows:

25.2. If a player, having advised their National Associations of not being available for a national team event to which the player was nominated, then participates in a club match during the same period as the national team event dates, in accordance with the Competition Regulations – National teams & Friendly international matches Art 4.5-4.7, the National Association of the player's club will be sanctioned as follows:

First time (1-2 players)	1.000 CHF
First time (more than three players)	10.000 CHF
Second time (regardless of the number of players)	15.000 CHF
Third time (regardless of time period)	Suspension from International Floorball activities for up to two years

ExCo decided: to approve the changes in the regulations with the additions made by the IFF ExCo and to publish these as valid from 08.09.2024 and to present this to the CB for confirmation

7. Preparation of the IFF CB workshop 3/2024 in Winterthur

Mr. Eriksson informed that he has with the secretary general prepared the program for the IFF CB workshop based on the decision of the previous CB meeting and the input received. The program and the plan looks like this, after some small changes made by the ExCo:

Organisational Development Tasks & Targets (1/2)

1) A system for mentoring and exchange of knowledge (Kaarina & Filip + Veli)

- Building a long-term sustainability and effectiveness of the national federations.
- Mentoring is a powerful tool for personal development and knowledge transfer. It's a strategic investment in human capital
- Use the Fit4Future Structure platform (Organisational educational material)
- TARGETS:
 - => Create an "easy starting guide" to start and develop. Light version of the Maturity Matrix tool.
 - As the even smaller countries don't have problem with the Evaluation tool using system
 - => All members associations should do the self assessment (4F step 1 – maturity matrix).
 - All 80 countries will eventually do it, but 15 countries to work with the Fit4Future Tool
 - => Based on that we will have to redo the License System Tier levels.

Rule Changes Tasks & Targets (1/3)

1) Finetuning the rules to enhance skilful play and get better spectator understanding and experience (Rules Group & Reference Group + Stefan)

- Changing the minor rules to improve the general understanding
- Modify the present rules to clarify the infringements hindering players to play
- Care must be taken to ensure that the changes of the rules do not complicate understanding for spectators.
- Simplifying rules to reduce stoppages to makes the game fluent and more enjoyable to watch.
- => Reduction of the Rule book – if the rule is not totally necessary it could be removed, to make it more understandable for people outside – Need for new texts, so it should be a little easier.
- => Create a Focus group of non-floorball viewers to research when they are lost and to understand how people are looking at Floorball. Prepare a form for the evaluation
- => TV graphics should have the explanation for the bench penalties
- => The signs of referees are confusing and even funny – is there a way of simplify them or group them by offences (stick, body, leg)
 - More could be taken away if we are just interested in the direction.

Rule Changes Tasks & Targets (2/3)

2) Enforcing of present rules with referee education to get a more flowing game with less obstructions (RC & Carlos + Veli)

- To increase the flow of the game, which will be better for viewership as well as potential broadcasting.
- Ensure that the skilful play is protected
- One game all over the world → helping close the gap
- Work with the federation to enforce this
- => Start a process for a better level of education of the interpretations of the Game Rules.
- => The responsibility for the education must be with the national associations
 - => No International Referee/Referee Coach nominations will be approved until the Federations have held the education for the first level of the national referees.
 - The problem is that federations have come up with their own Rules.
 - => Have a meeting with Political representatives and Referee persons of the Top nations (WFC Sun 15.12.)

3) Start testing different activity rules (Rules group/Referents group + Stefan)

- The target is to avoid "dead/static" moments
- Not to make the gap bigger
- To be understandable and technically easy to start using
- Better for viewership, making the game more dynamic and attractive
- => The value is in the testing of the activity rule in practise.
- => Ask federations for their proposal of activity rules and these will be tested. (PoA Game Rules)

Increased Visibility/Awareness Tasks & Targets (1/2)

1) Leverage using influencers (Marketing function + Tero+IFF Media)

- Social Media Influencers are nowadays very strong ambassadors of anything they do and they are very followed by youngsters.
- The influencers will create content through which we can reach new spectators and introduce new ways to consume Floorball
- Community building can be facilitated through interactive platforms like streams and podcasts, leveraging influencers, and organizing social media events.
- Use the floorball strength – easy to play
- Create successful case studies
- => External influencers to be used if possible in their social media
- => Celebrity type events
- => Measurement of impact of having the Events
- => Pinpoint the new micro influencers
- => Events outside floorball championships, like showgames in different other Events.
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- => Ambush marketing

Increased Visibility/Awareness Tasks & Target (2/2)

2) More Free-to-air TV productions (not stream) & adding technology to TV productions (TV channels + John)

- To reach spectators who do not know floorball well
- Change the attitude towards the way the TV product is produced (product for teenagers not for „old“ people)
- => The Cost Benefit has to be analysed – do we need the influencers to get TV time
- => Production if not good can be detrimental
- => Utilise Influencers
- => AI to reduce costs, produce clips, short or even whole matches
- => AI to produce commentary in local country language

3) Venue entertainment: (WFC LOC + Tero)

- Enhancing the in-venue experience with entertainment ensures that attending matches is a memorable event, encouraging repeat attendance.

- It is necessary to understand that the leagues are products to be sold; not just matches to be played.

- => Use two MC's with new local and English during the event.
- => Ambassadors/Star Players
- => Street Floorball etc as used last few years at WFC
- => WFC is good level, next leagues below are not doing event entertainment to same level. IFF develop rules/guidelines etc around entertainment at National League Games

Marketing/Promotion Tasks & Targets (1/2)

1) A better entertainment level of our broadcasts (Clips, highlights, studios) (Jörg + IFF Media)

- High-quality broadcasts with engaging clips and highlights are essential to capture and retain audience interest.
- Studios can provide in-depth analysis and stories that enrich the viewing experience, making it more informative and entertaining.
- => Incorporate AI into the broadcasting – eventually the price will come down (for the technology that Basketball uses etc)
- => Disparity between the regional and the European tournaments – we need to establish a certain criteria that can be flexible, but baseline requirement so the quality is not too different. Baseline at each level – i.e. World Championships
- => Use of AI to create “reels/live shots” for social media as well as inside the arena etc.
- => Players from outside the sport but at the professional level – to promote the sport on social media (Tiktok, Instagram etc.)
- => Learn from other professional sports to see what they are doing to develop their visibility
- => How to use the Player tags in the WFC

2) Stronger player brands - Promotion of Star players (CCMNG/ATC + Tero)

- Promoting individual players helps to create a connection with fans and can draw more attention to the sport.
- Strong player brands can lead to increased marketability and commercial opportunities for the sport. It is a necessity for the awareness of the sport
- Stars and key players can serve as the face of the sport, attracting media attention and inspiring future generations.

Welcome

- The IFF has been working with Good Governance for the last 6-7 years, with the introduction of Code of Ethics, Conflict of Interest and a number of other policies to guide the governance of the IFF activities.
- This webinar is a start to enlarge this also towards the IFF member associations, in order to have enhance the level of governance within the Floorball community.
- The webinar is presented by the IFF Ethics Commission

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Introduction to Good Governance

- Overall Importance:
- The focus on the way of how the Sport organisations have increased a lot during the last few years – for obvious reasons.
- For the International Federations (and the National federations) the issue is that if there are some issues in the governance of the federations are run, it will seriously harm and take a lot of time to correct and fix
- Creating the rules and the regulations will help to plan and work with the issues and making it clear for the membership how the federation operations are working. Clarity makes it easier to work and saves a lot of time.
- In this webinar we will try to give you a first peak how to move forward and start working on these questions.

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Expectations within the Olympic Movement

- The guidelines and rules for the Olympic movement are set by the IOC.
- The IOC is in 2024 giving a lot of focus on the education of the Good Governance, running a series of webinars for the ARISF (Association of IOC Recognised International Federations) and AIMS member federations.
- IOC is working based on the 50 IPACS Good Governance recommendations and the IOC has been making an evaluation (3 times) of the Olympic federations and planning to make this also for the ARISF and AIMS federations later in the year. The previous one was made in 2019.

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What has IFF done so far

- The Good Governance work started already some 10 years ago, partly because the IFF receives support from the Finnish Government, through the Finnish federation
- IFF established an Ethics Commission in 2016 and it has created a number of policies and guidelines:
 - IFF Code of Ethics

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Why turn towards the member federations

- The fact that the IFF has the Good Governance policies and procedures in place, doesn't make the International Floorball community stronger, if the IFF members don't have the basic governance structures in place.
- This concerns at least the following aspects of your activities:
 - Organisational structure
 - Code of conduct
 - Conflict of interest
 - Harassment policies
 - Rules on betting

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Expectations towards national federations

- The IFF ETC is now starting the Good Governance webinars and is also going to create some guidelines and materials to help for the member federations
- If needed IFF can organise more webinars.
- The National associations can and should use the Iff policy documents as basis for their own Good Governance, to have it easier to start.
- The IFF also has some GG-education in the Organisational stream of the Floorball Development Seminars

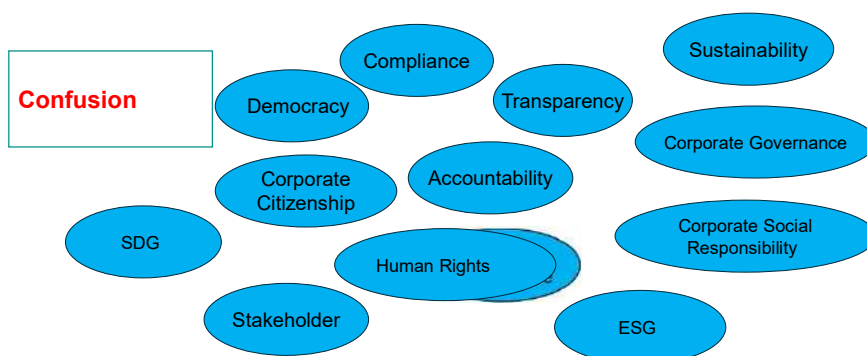

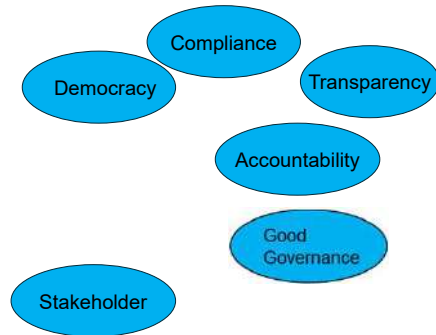

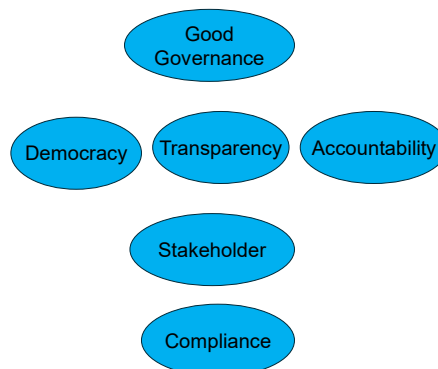

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What is a Conflict of Interest?

- A conflict of interest occurs when an entity or individual becomes unreliable because of a clash between personal (or self-serving) interests and professional duties or responsibilities.
- Such a conflict occurs when a company or person has a vested interest—such as money, status, knowledge, relationships, or reputation—which puts into question whether their actions, judgment, or decision-making can be unbiased.
- It also includes a conflict between a Board Member, Employee or Volunteers duty to Sport Matters and another duty that the member has (for example, to another organization).
- A conflict of interest may be actual, potential or perceived and may be financial or non- financial.

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Conflict of Interest in Sport?

- Conflicts of interest exist in all organizations including sport and sports administration.
- A conflict of interest is any situation where a personal interest could, or could appear to, prevent an individual from making a decision only in the organization's best interests.
- All persons involved in the management, administration, coaching and playing of a sport have a lawful, moral and ethical obligation to act in the best interests of the organization and sport.

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Is it Wrong to have a Conflict of Interest?

- It is not wrong or unethical to have a conflict of interest or potential conflict of interest, it is wrong and unethical to fail to declare a conflict or potential conflict of interest.
- Once declared, the conflict or potential can be managed to avoid a negative impact on those that might be affected.
- If a person directly involved in the management, administration, coaching and playing of a sport perceives that a conflict of interest might exist, then the situation must be managed to ensure that the conflict or perception is managed to avoid ill-feeling or a negative impacts.

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Example – Coach/selector and player

- A team coach who is also part of the selection of the playing team has a child, sibling or other close personal association with a member of the training group.
- This situation can be avoided by the coach in declaring the conflict of interest to the club administration group. Strategies to manage a potential conflict might include a selection process by a panel but must include transparency and good communications with the entire team.
- Awareness and openness is the key to this situation.

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Example: Sponsor demands

- Another example might be a major club or organization sponsor has a child that plays in one of the teams. As the season approaches the finals, the club sponsor tells the club or organization that if their child does not get selected in the playing team for the finals, the sponsorship will be withdrawn the following season.
- A very difficult situation to manage, however the club would need to be brave. The President or other appropriate person in the management of the club would need to have a firm conversation with the sponsor outlining the selection process for the finals and be very clear that their sponsorship is important but cannot affect the selection of the team.

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The effect of poor sponsor management

- The effect of not managing this conflict gives the sponsor power over team selection and may result in players being unsatisfied with team selection and club management resulting in players leaving the club or not being fully committed to the club.
- Clubs and Associations must make sure they have a very clear policy around the role of the sponsor and that policy forms part of any sponsorship agreements or contracts.

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Board/Committee meeting conflicts

- At board and committee meetings the agenda must be circulated well in advance to provide an advanced opportunity to declare conflicts of interest. This would then provide the opportunity to withhold any documents relating to the agenda item from the person declaring a conflict of interest.
- There must be an opportunity provided by the meeting chair to allow for any participant to declare a conflict of interest prior to addressing any agenda items.
- The chair may highlight the need to do so as relevant to the agenda, and participants are expected to use their judgement based on the content of the meeting, likely discussions and impact of decisions when deciding whether to declare a conflict. The secretary or governance lead may also raise the issue if they think that a board member has forgotten to do so themselves.
- The most effective means of managing conflicts is to ask the conflicted board member to leave the room while discussions take place and decisions are made. If the person with a conflict of interest remains in the room for discussion, it is possible that they can still influence others through non-verbal cues or failure to refrain from participating in the discussion.

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Other possible conflicts or potential conflicts

- There is no definitive list of possible connections that could be interpreted as potential conflicts of interest for board members, however the following influences are common:
- Current employment and any previous employment in which the individual might continue to have a financial interest
- Appointments (voluntary or otherwise), including trusteeships, directorships, sports body roles, local authority membership or tribunals
- Membership of any professional bodies, special interest groups or mutual support organizations
- Investments in unlisted companies, partnerships and other forms of business, major shareholdings

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Conclusions

- Managing conflicts of interest is important to the integrity of your sports organization, and if done well, can enhance stakeholder trust and confidence.

As the complaint was sent anonymously, the ETC has no ability to ask the complainant any questions to clarify or seek any further details. There also appears to be no reason why the complaint was sent anonymously.

In the absence of any detailed allegations, the ETC cannot examine whether

- It has jurisdiction to act or
- Any infringement of the IFF Ethics Code occurred.

Being active on social media is helpful to promote the sport of Floorball. In the absence of any specific details in the complaint, the ETC is unable to proceed with an investigation.

The case is closed.

INTRODUCTION

The IFF Women's World Floorball Championships held in Singapore in December 2023 (WFC 2023) was the fourth WFC (men's and women's) to take place following the release of the IFF Strategy 2021-2032.

Quantum conducted an extensive evaluation of the WFC 2023 as part of the IFF WFC Event Evaluation Programme 2021-2024 to assess the impact of the event on local economies and communities. The perception of WFC host destinations and of the sport of floorball, as well as the commercial growth of the sport, was also assessed.

The aim of this document is to build on key data and insights that have been gathered and reported from past evaluations in the context of the IFF Strategy 2021-2032.

Specifically, this document represents the third edition of the annual review process that aligns the evaluation findings with the priorities, targets and KPIs set out in the strategy.

As part of its suite of services, Quantum provides this annual update to help the IFF monitor the development of its flagship events based on a range of evaluation parameters.

The analysis reflects key data and insights from all editions of the WFC analysed as part of the IFF WFC Event Evaluation Programme and has been broken down into two parts:

I. Fulfilment of strategic goals.

20 KPIs from the IFF Strategy 2021-2032 have been considered and corresponding metrics from the WFC evaluation have been presented to showcase how the WFCs contribute to achieving floorball's strategic goals.

In reference to one of the IFF Strategy priorities relating to sport presentation and appearance, the summary of the athlete and spectator feedback from the post-event surveys has also been provided within this document.

II. Benchmarking analysis.

Key data indicators from the WFC 2023 have been compared with data available from previous world championships to facilitate the longitudinal assessment of the development of the Men's and Women's WFC.

BRIDGING THE GAP – MEN’S VS. WOMEN’S WFC

The IFF puts a strong focus on the development of women’s floorball, as evidenced in the IFF Strategy 2021-2032 and through programmes such as GoGirls! Floorball. Following the WFC 2023, Quantum has studied the key indicators relating to the men’s and the women’s World Floorball Championships to understand the gap between IFF’s pinnacle events for both genders.

ATTENDANCE

- The average attendance at the men’s WFCs between 2012-2022 was 112,183, 3.4x the turnout at the women’s WFC 2011-2023 (32,543)
- During that period, the highest attendance for the women’s WFC is 44,513 at the WFC 2019 in Zurich, Switzerland, while for the men’s WFC the record was set at the WFC 2018 in Prague, Czech Republic (181,518).
- There is also a substantial difference between the two events when it comes to ticket sales. On average, 4.7x more tickets are sold for the men’s WFCs (36,586) than for the women’s WFCs (7,796). Ticketing data has been recorded since 2016.
- It is worth noting that the attendance at the WFC 2020 and WFC 2021 (both hosted in 2021) was affected by the pandemic, while three of the WFCs in the analysed period have been held outside the most traditional floorball markets (Czech Republic, Finland, Sweden and Switzerland): WFC 2016 (Latvia), WFC 2017 (Bratislava) and WFC 2023 (Singapore) which also had an impact on spectator turnout.

FINANCIALS

- In 2018-2023 the local organisers of the men’s WFCs generated €4.68 million of income on average vs. €1.13 million for the women’s WFCs.
- All three editions of the men’s WFCs in the analysed period recorded a profit (€0.35 million on average) while the organisers of the women’s WFCs reported a deficit of €0.26 million on average.
- The women’s WFCs rely far more on public funding as the source of income. Since 2018, the contribution from local and national governments accounted for 45% of the total revenues for the women’s WFCs and 33% for the men’s WFCs.
- In turn, the men’s WFCs generate a significantly higher income from ticket sales. The average revenue from ticketing totalled €2 million in recent years (WFC 2018 to WFC 2022), or 43% of the overall income, while for the women’s event it was €0.25 million (WFC 2019 and WFC 2023, no data is available for WFC 2021).

BRIDGING THE GAP – MEN’S VS. WOMEN’S WFC

QUANTUM OBSERVATIONS

The data shows that while the gap between men’s and women’s events in terms of media and social media interest is relatively small, there is a significant discrepancy in the financial budgets and attendances between men’s and the women’s WFCs.

#2

Even with a smaller budget and lower attendances, much could be done to improve the spectator experience at the women’s WFCs. If savings can be made on e.g. venue rental costs through making the decision to play in smaller venues, additional funds could be allocated to event presentation and entertainment, generating positive memories for fans in attendance. This would improve the overall event atmosphere, in turn aiming to cultivate an entertained and engaged live event audience for future events.

#3

It appears that in most cases the opportunity to drive the development of women’s floorball through hosting the WFC is not being capitalised on by local organisers. Concrete development/promotional programmes should be initiated by local hosts to reflect the growing focus on the women’s game. Organisers can further support the hosting of WFCs by engaging and securing more commercial partnerships, using the story of the growth of the women’s game.

BRIDGING THE GAP – MEN’S VS. WOMEN’S WFC – CONTINUED

EVENT EXPERIENCE

- Post-event surveys which have been conducted at the WFCs since 2018 (with the exception of WFC 2019) demonstrate that fans attending the men’s WFCs have a more positive experience than spectators attending the women’s WFC.
- The average spectator satisfaction rate (% fans who described their experience at the event as good or very good) stands at 96% across the last three editions of the men’s event and 84% for the two most recent editions of the women’s tournament.
- In general, fans attending the men’s WFCs have been more complimentary about sport presentation, atmosphere at the event and event promotion – factors which in the case of the women’s WFCs may be affected by lower attendances and tighter event budgets.

BROADCAST AND SOCIAL MEDIA ENGAGEMENT

- Both the men’s and the women’s WFCs have enjoyed strong broadcast viewership in recent years. In the four key floorball territories (Czech Republic, Finland, Sweden and Switzerland), for which viewership data has been collected consistently, the cumulative audience for the women’s WFC was 3.59 million on average from 2017-2023, while for the men’s WFC the average total audience was 4.7 million (2018-2022).
- Across the last four editions of the tournament for each gender, the number of broadcast hours averages 405 and 401 for the men’s and the women’s WFCs, respectively.
- The social media following for both events has also been broadly similar – since 2016, on average the men’s WFCs have had 8.1 million impressions and 0.3 million engagements, while for the women’s tournament the averages are 7.2 million impressions and 0.2 million engagements.

The overall attendance and ticketing outcome of the WFC 2023 was similar to the interest generated by the WFC 2021. However, attendances at the WFC 2023 were lower than the average turnout at the previous six editions of the tournament (21,628 vs. 34,257). While most of these tournaments were held in the more established floorball markets, the total attendance in Singapore was still 32% lower than in 2017 when the event was held for the first time in Slovakia.

Despite reaching less territories than in 2021 with TV broadcasts, the number of broadcast hours and the overall viewership of the WFC 2023 were significantly greater than at the WFC 2021. Meanwhile, the social media reach and engagement data demonstrates consistency in spreading the message about the WFC on digital platforms.

There were significantly more volunteers engaged at the WFC 2023 than at the previous edition of the tournament, but the volunteer support at the WFC 2021 was limited due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

On the following page, Quantum has provided a historical overview of WFC event impact measures to support the future development of the event and to ensure progress is targeted and achieved at future editions.

- **REFEREE BASIC EDUCATION ONLINE COURSE**

In conjunction with a referee course that is being held for Spanish new referees this educational material has been offered to the Latin America countries and three persons from Ecuador and Peru are doing it.

The referee course is basically a presentation of the Rules of the Game and basic situations.

- **COLOMBIA**

From Floorball Colombia a letter of recognition has been asked to try to join the next General Assembly (by Colombia Gral Secretary).

Done by the Office and sent.

- **CHILE**

Very little advances in terms of the first Club recognition in the country.

- **PERU – ECUADOR – BARSIL – FLOORBALL4ALL**

I have been invited to an online meeting next 3rd September to talk about next steps towards official recognition and join IFF.

To be informed in the CB meeting.

- **MEXICO**

Internationally:

- Contact continues to be established with Mexicans who practice floorball abroad and are interested in supporting the Federation to integrate a national team. There was a conversation with the Presidency of the Swiss Federation of Floorball, with the support of the Spanish Association.

- Still pending collecting the material provided by the IFF is, standing in Madrid, Spain.

- Taken part in various IFF meetings with different topics and It is giving continuity to the issue of the administration system.

Nationally:

The institutional image is being changed to make an attractive Floorball brand nationwide.

Close to open an office.

The presidency of the Mexican Floorball Federation met the Presidents of the Kickboxing, Muaythai, Basque Pelota Federations, Flying Disc, Korfball, Bridge, Orienteering Sport and Bandy, which are Mexican Sports Federations whose International Federations are members of ARISF with the aim of creating a collaborative national project that allows recognition by the

Mexican Olympic Committee of all related sports that lack of official recognition. Consequently, they have participated in the creation of AFR Deportes, A.C. which is in talks with the Mexican Olympic Committee to obtain official recognition from the National Olympic Movement, that eventually will benefit Floorball. The leadership of this issue is brought by the Mexican Floorball Federation.

Various meetings of the CB continue to implement the actions to be developed and the respective programs.

The House of Floorball is being consolidated at the Polytechnic Institute National.

Talks are being finalized to establish Floorball project in the States of Nuevo León and Yucatán.

Other meetings are being held with the General Secretary of the National Council of Sports in Education (CONDDE) which is a member of the International University Sports Federation (FISU) to be able develop floorball as a university sport in Mexico.

In general, doubts have been clarified by people who have come to ask about the practice and development of floorball in Mexico, taking into account their concerns to strengthen the programs that are they are elaborating.

APPENDIX 24

IFF Floorball:FitForFuture Development Program: Status report (September 2024)

Overview

The Floorball:FitForFuture (4F) program was officially launched on April 17, 2024. Since its inception, **25 IFF Member Federations** have actively participated in the program. Following two online launch meetings in April, the weeks and month that followed were filled with various activities, as detailed below:

- Registration Process:
 - The registration process was created and in addition to the “original” nine 4F-countries, 20 IFF Member Federations have registered for the development Program.
- 1:1 Meetings:
 - At least two 1:1 meetings (with some federations 3-4 meetings) were conducted with 17 new federations
 - Program philosophy introduction
 - Access to the 4F IT software was provided
- Evaluation Phase:
 - **25 federations are actively involved in the evaluation phase** (stand: August 16, 2024)
 - 4F – Countries (9)
 - Finland, Sweden, Switzerland, Czech Republic, Denmark, Germany, Poland, Slovakia
 - New Countries (16)
 - Austria, Belgium, Italy, Kenya, Netherlands, Ukraine, United Kingdom, China, Canada, México, France, Australia, Philippines, India, Japan, Burkina Faso
 - The federations were intensively supported throughout the process, ensuring they received the necessary guidance and resources to successfully evaluate the current state of the federation
 - Additional nations participating in the World Floorball Championships (WFC) were contacted twice regarding their participation in the program
- Contractual Matters:
 - Three essential contracts have been drafted and signed:
 - Agreement between EFT countries and the IFF
 - Contract between IFF and Floorball Germany
 - Contract between Floorball Germany and Frederik Dilger
- Digitalization and Further Developments
 - The first phase of the program, based on matrix evaluation, has been released

- Preparation for second phase Development Action Plan is currently underway
- Current Work with the 4F Project Group
 - Regular meetings with the mentee countries: Spain, Slovakia, and Poland. In Germany, regular exchanges occur with the board and general secretary.
 - Federations are working on the DAP and Plans of Execution.
 - First federations are working on their second evaluation
- Work with Documents:
 - The matrix has been revised. Numerous wording changes were made, and two new activities were included.
 - Additional documents, such as the glossary and guidelines for the IT software, are being adjusted
- Exchange 4F group
 - An intensive exchange with the 4F group is planned for October during a live meeting, focusing on building a network for experience exchange between two federations

This report outlines recent activities and upcoming events in Kazakhstan, Moldova, and Ukraine.

Kazakhstan

In July, six coaches from Kazakhstan participated in a summer camp all-star mission in Jönköping, Sweden, which provided valuable experience and exchange opportunities with their Swedish counterparts. Furthering their development efforts, Kazakhstan is planning

the IFF International Development Seminar, which will be held in conjunction with the Taraz Open in south Kazakhstan on the 26th and 27th of October. The seminar, would then be scheduled for the 25th and 26th of October, aims to provide training for both referees and coaches. The goal is to attract participants not only from across Kazakhstan but also from neighboring countries such as Tajikistan, Kyrgyzstan, Uzbekistan, Georgia, and Armenia. Additionally, there has been growing interest from China, following the participation of a Kazakhstani team in a club tournament held in China.

The 3 vs 3 format has also inspired the NFFK to start their own development . For example the IFF 3 vs 3 rulebook is now being translated.

Moldova

In Moldova, the growth of floorball has been marked by international collaboration. In May, the Moldovan Floorball Federation, in cooperation with the Allstar mission from Sweden, organized a development camp. The event brought together coaches from Sweden who contributed to a series of productive training sessions and workshops.

Ukraine

On the 17th and 18th of August, the Academy of Floorball was held in Kyiv, where over 20 coaches participated in workshops and training sessions for coaching level 1 and 2. The Ukrainian Floorball Federation (UFF) has also during summer completed the Fit for Future questionnaire and are planning the next steps forward in their development strategy. In early August, the UFF signed cooperation agreements with the Ukrainian National Anti-Doping Center, the Klitschko Foundation, and United by Sports. Additionally, the UFF has started collaborating with Ukraine's largest physical education university to allow sports management students to complete internships at the UFF.

The UFF has also initiated a partnership with the Swedish company Spintso to provide referee equipment. The new season's competitions are in full swing, with the Ukrainian

Ukrainian Youth Cup scheduled for the 14th and 15th of September, and the adult Ukrainian Cup following on the 28th and 29th of September, both in Uzhgorod. The Ukrainian Floorball Championship will begin in October.

The Ukrainian national teams are continuing to participate actively in the EuroPowerLeague. The men's team is set to compete in France in October, while the women's team will head to Italy in November. The U19 national team is awaiting their qualification details, while the U19 girls' team participated in the Prague Games this July, gaining valuable international experience.

Also worth mentioning that Ukraine had 3 teams participating in WFC 3 vs 3 in Lahti.

Russia and **Belarus** are left out because of the current suspension.

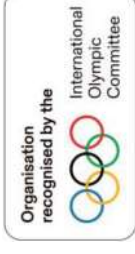

TWG 2025 Chengdu LOC and Chengdu ExCo

2.1 The Organising Committee of The World Games 2025 Chengdu (TWG 2025 Chengdu LOC)

On 1 November 2023, TWG 2025 Chengdu LOC was established, with Minister of the General Administration of Sport of China and Governor of Sichuan Province as the Presidents, leaders of the General Administration of Sport of China, Sichuan Province and Chengdu Municipality as Vice Presidents, and Mr WANG Fengchao, Mayor of Chengdu, as the Vice President and Secretary General.

2.2 The Executive Committee of TWG 2025 Chengdu (Chengdu ExCo)

In March 2024, upon the approval of TWG 2025 LOC, Chengdu ExCo was established as its executive entity, with Mr WANG Fengchao, Mayor of Chengdu, as the President, executive leaders of Chengdu as Vice Presidents, and Mr XU Xingguo, Vice Mayor of Chengdu, as the Vice President and Secretary General. Chengdu ExCo consists of the following 10 departments in charge of the preparations for TWG 2025 Chengdu: General Affairs Office of Chengdu ExCo, Department of Discipline Inspection, Auditing and Legal Services, Department of Workforce Management (Volunteer Services), Department of Logistical Support, Department of Sports (Doping Control), Department of External Liaison, Department of Media (Opening and Closing Ceremonies), Department of Transportation and Security, Department of TWG Village, and Department of Urban Affairs and Services.

2.3 Venue Clusters and Venue Operations Centres (VOCs)

According to the venue distribution and the administrative divisions of Chengdu, eight Venue Cluster Committees have been established, the Tianfu New Area Venue Cluster Committee, Eastern New Area Venue Cluster Committee, Hi-

tech Zone Venue Cluster Committee, Jinniu Venue Cluster Committee, Wuhou Venue Cluster Committee, Longquanyi Venue Cluster Committee, Xindu Venue Cluster Committee, and Jianyang Venue Cluster Committee. Under these Venue Cluster Committees, there are a total of 22 VOCs set up, namely, the Xinglong Lake Hubin VOC, Xinglong Lake Beach VOC, Tianfu Park VOC, Chengdu Sport University Ball Games VOC, Chengdu Sport University Water Sports and Flying Disc VOC, Chengdu NO.7 High School Eastern Campus VOC, Sancha Lake Water Sports VOC, Eastern New Area Foot Orienteering VOC, Tianfu International Hotel Billiards Sports VOC, Hi-tech Zone Wushu and Powerlifting VOC, Hi-tech Zone Ball Games and Flying Disc VOC, Chengbei DanceSport VOC, Sichuan Softball VOC, Sichuan Gymnasium VOC, Dong'an Lake Indoor Sports VOC, Dong'an Lake Outdoor Sports VOC, Qinglong Lake Archery VOC, Longquan High School Korfball VOC, Xiangcheng Floorball VOC, Chengdu Roller Sports VOC, Jianyang Polo VOC, and Jianyang Cultural and Sports Centre Gymnasium VOC.

3.1 Logo

On 17 May 2024, the International World Games Association (IWGA) and Chengdu ExCo officially released the logo of TWG 2025 Chengdu. The logo design is inspired by the Chinese giant panda, hibiscus flower and Chinese knot, with Chinese Red, Jinsha Yellow, Park Green, Panda Black and Snowy White as the main colours. As an important symbol of TWG 2025 Chengdu, this logo effectively conveys the Olympic spirit and highlights the traditional Chinese elements and the characteristics of Chengdu, highlighting the values of “Unity, Inclusiveness and Diversity”.

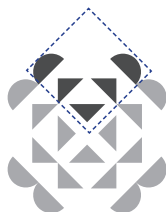

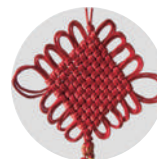

The unveiled logo boasts vibrant hues and a minimalist design: the semicircular perimeter intertwined with a pattern of triangles elegantly frames a blooming hibiscus flower. Five colourful geometric blocks ingeniously form the faces of four cartoon pandas.

The Logo's composition draws upon the form of the Chinese knot, an ancient hand-made craft that symbolises unity, prosperity, and good fortune with its myriad shapes, akin to a Rubik's Cube woven from cords. The semicircles mimic panda ears while also serving as geometric hibiscus petals. Each of the four symmetrical sections presents a panda's face.

In early April, the review and selection meeting was convened in Chengdu, where 23 renowned designers, senior experts, scholars, and researchers, including HAN Meilin, senior professor of arts from Tsinghua University, and QIAN Zhe, BIL Division Chief of Beijing 2008 Summer Olympics, assessed the shortlisted designs and narrow down to ten finalists. Following further professional refinement, five candidate logos were chosen for a public vote.

The five-day voting campaign attracted over 100,000 participants, with a total of more than 220,000 likes. The logo, which was inspired by the hibiscus flower, the giant panda and the Chinese knot and designed by John Fairley, secured the top spot with 55,679 votes, making it the crowd favourite. After joint review by TWG 2025 Chengdu LOC and IWGA, the logo was officially unveiled.

3.2 Slogan

The slogan “Boundless Sports, Countless Wonders” implies that in Chengdu, a land of promise, tradition and modernity coexist in harmony, the fast pace of a metropolis and the slow life of the residents form a delightful contrast, the leisure and easiness on every street and lane and the competing essence of sportsmanship echo each other, and sports, like a dazzling spark, ignite the infinite potential and possibility of this city, making happiness prevail in this land of countless wonders.

Among the 3,749 designs solicited from home and abroad, we found evident similarity. Many designs integrate the fighting spirit of sports with the charm of Shu culture. Some designs share the same vision and inspiration. Taking “sports vibes, Chengdu flavours, and international communication” as the key idea, upon the agreement with the IWGA, the Executive Committee of TWG 2025 Chengdu finally selected “Boundless Sports, Countless Wonders” as the slogan of TWG 2025 Chengdu after several rounds of review and discussions, with input from parties of interests and experts. This slogan is widely representative and highly accepted by the public.

“Boundless Sports” implies the infinite possibility of sports spirit, which encourages every athlete to challenge themselves and transcend the limit, and “Countless Wonders” shows the harmonious integration of “fast and slow” and “traditional and modern” lifestyle in Chengdu,

hoping that guests from all over the world can also feel for themselves the unique life philosophy and human care of Chengdu in their spare time.

The slogan of TWG 2025 Chengdu embodies the world's love for sports and recognition and affection for Chengdu. It represents not only collective wisdom, but also shared perception and aspiration. It is a thriving force supported and accepted by the public, vividly interpreting Chengdu's passion for sports and attitude towards life.

3.3 Mascot

The mascots of TWG 2025 Chengdu are “Shu Bao” and “Jin Zai”, with the two treasures of Sichuan, i.e., the giant panda and Sichuan golden snub-nosed monkey, as the prototype. The giant panda is the best-known animal of Chengdu, and the Sichuan golden snub-nosed monkey is full of vigour and vitality. These two treasures are expected to showcase the image of Chengdu as a liveable and hospitable city and call on everyone to cherish rare animals and protect biodiversity.

The names of the mascots are inspired by “Shu Jin” (Shu brocade), with “Shu” and “Jin” as the first word of the names, respectively. The second word of each name captures the nature of giant panda and the Sichuan golden snub-nosed monkey. The giant panda is known for its loyalty and integrity under its cute and fluffy look and is therefore named “Bao” (meaning “baby”). Sichuan golden snub-nosed monkey is smart, brave, and bouncy. So, it is named “Zai” (meaning “young child”).

“Shu Bao” and “Jin Zai” give expression to Chengdu's unique charm. As the ambassadors for cultural exchange, these two treasures will start from Chengdu, and embark on a journey to tell the story of Chengdu worldwide and make the message from Chengdu heard by the world. They will bridge Chengdu and the world, so that the spectators from across the globe can enjoy the sports festival held in Chengdu while savour the city's infinite vigour and boundless glamour.

4.1 TWG Twelve Monthly Fairs

TWG Twelve Monthly Fairs, launched in January 2024, focusing on the 35 sports of TWG 2025 Chengdu and aiming at diversified experience activities participated by all people, multi-channel popularisation of TWG sports, and multi-aspect promotion of Chinese culture. So far, six Monthly Fairs covering experience activities of 14 sports of TWG 2025 Chengdu have been well planned and conducted, and a fair in the shape of TWG Logo has been organised in the combination with elements of intangible cultural heritages and folk customs, attracting nearly 300,000 visitors. These activities have been reported by more than 60 media at all levels, including People's Daily, Xinhua News Agency, and China Media Group (CMG), and IWGA's official website, and the related topics have been viewed for more than 20 million times on the Internet.



The Monthly Fair of January, titled with “Friendship Fair”, was held in Guixi Park on 27 and 28 January, providing experience activities on the sports of tug of war and archery, and an exhibition match of korfball participated by the invited national beach korfball team and the citizens.





The Monthly Fair of February, titled with “Joy Fair”, was held at the 53rd Chengdu International Panda Lantern Festival in Tianfu Joy Park from 10 to 24 February, i.e., the 1st day to the 15th day of the first month in the Chinese lunar calendar, providing experience and science-popularisation activities on the sports of sambo, kickboxing, and powerlifting, and inviting visitors to enjoy the TWG lantern groups and guess the TWG lantern riddles.



The Monthly Fair of March, titled with “Challenge Fair”, was held at Danjingtai on 24 March, recruiting citizens to participate in foot orienteering as experience officers. Along the orienteering routes, participation-recording sites were set with interesting experience activities of boules sports, disc tug of war, Cuju (ball-kicking), and kite flying provided.





The Monthly Fair of April, titled with “Running Fair”, was held in Chengdu SKP on 21 April, inviting parkour world champions to support the Parkour experiencing adults and children, and providing experience and exhibition activities involving TWG sports such as FPV drone racing and boules sports.





The Monthly Fair of May, titled with “Dance Fair”, was held under Jiaozi Twin Towers on 25 May, staging dancesport show with Latin dance and standard dance, providing open dancesport classes for the citizens, inviting trampoline world champions to lead the Trampoline experience activities and assessment experts to interpret the logo of TWG 2025 Chengdu on the site, and providing experience activities on TWG sport of floorball, as well as intangible cultural heritage activities such as the ball game Budaqiu and lacquer fan making.





The Monthly Fair of June, titled with “Boat Fair”, was held in Huanglongxi Ancient Town on 1 and 2 June, providing experience activities on TWG sports of Canoe (including dragon boat and kayak), and powerboating (motosurf), organising a fair in the shape of the TWG Logo and inviting citizens to participate in intangible cultural heritage and folk experience activities such as sachet making and paper dragon boat folding. On the occasion of Children’s Day, entertaining activities such as water gun archery and mini billiards and interactive performances such as puppet shows and clown magic shows were presented to all children.





The Monthly Fair of July, titled with “Water Fair” was held safely and orderly in Chengdu Polar Ocean Park and closed at 16:00, 28 July 28, providing exhibition, performance and experience activities on the sports of freediving, life saving (pool) and freestyle-inline, as well as a fair in the shape of the TWG logo, TWG 2025 Chengdu themed exhibition, ancient-style handicraft bracelet making, and colour-filling of TWG 2025 Chengdu logo on umbrella.



4.2 Publicity and Media Coverage

Since October 2023, nearly 100 media outlets at all levels, including People’s Daily, Xinhua News Agency and China Media Group, made intensive interviews and reports on major events and milestones of TWG 2025 Chengdu, such as the 1st Competition Managers Meeting and CoCom Meeting, the Global Promotion and Fun TWG Experiences for All Campaign, TWG Twelve Monthly Fairs, and the solicitation and release of the logo, slogan, and mascot of TWG 2025 Chengdu, producing a total of nearly 15,000 relevant reports, thus creating a favorable atmosphere of public opinion.

On 2 February, the headline news entitled “Sports Economy Stimulates Consumption Potential” was released on the Business Column of the People’s Daily, covering the friendly matches under the Fun TWG Experiences for All Campaign and other warm-up activities as the starting point. Spotlight news titled “TWG is Coming”, “Logo of TWG 2025 Chengdu Officially Released” and so on were reported in Evening News, Sports World, Sports Express and other brand columns of CCTV. In addition, Xinhua News Agency, China Daily, China News Service and other media released a number of news, coverages on the Friendly Matches under Fun TWG Experiences for All Campaign Launched in Chengdu, Embracing the New Year with Sports, Attracting Visitors by Friendly Matches under Fun TWG Experiences for All Campaign.

Short videos such as “TWG 2025 Chengdu, Leap to Infinite” have been produced and released. The official social media matrix of TWG 2025 Chengdu has launched a series of TWG themed posters. A series of interactive activities on the theme of New Year Greetings from Panda, as well as themed posters and WeChat red packet covers, have been launched on domestic and foreign social media platforms, with more than 20 million participants in total.

4.3 One-Year Countdown Ceremony

A series of celebrations of the one-year countdown of TWG 2025 Chengdu were held from 6 to 11 August 2024 in Beijing, Hong Kong, China, and Chengdu.

On 6 August, the Press Conference of One-Year Countdown of TWG 2025 Chengdu was held in Beijing. At the conference, representatives of Sichuan Province and Chengdu Municipality updated the preparations in terms of sports organisation, venue construction, and cultural activities and released the slogan, mascot, official apparel, and licensed products of TWG 2025 Chengdu, which were covered by nearly 30 media at the central, provincial, and municipal levels. On the same day, The World Games Chengdu-Hong Kong Tour themed train bound for Hong Kong West Kowloon Railway Station was launched from Chengdudong Railway Station, carrying Sichuan-born Olympic champions, Roller Sports athletes, entrepreneurs from Sichuan and HK, Sichuan Opera artists, intangible cultural heritage inheritors, Sichuan cuisine business owners, and museum exhibition guides to HK for the promotion of TWG 2025 Chengdu on occasion of the one-year countdown.



On the afternoon of 7 August, Chengdu-Hong Kong Tea Party, an activity under the One-Year Countdown of TWG 2025 Chengdu, was hosted at sky100 Hong Kong Observation Deck. At the Party, the Executive Committee of TWG 2025 Chengdu signed a strategic cooperative agreement with the Sports Federation and Olympic Committee of Hong Kong, China, a sponsorship agreement with Xtep Group Co., Ltd., and a low-altitude economy intention agreement with FYUAV (Shenzhen) Co., Ltd. The marketing plan of TWG 2025 Chengdu was also published, inviting domestic and overseas companies to join TWG 2025 Chengdu as TWG partners, to share opportunities afforded by TWG 2025 Chengdu, and to seek industrial growth.



On the evening of 7 August, the One-Year Countdown Ceremony of TWG 2025 Chengdu was staged at the International Friendship Pavilion of the main venue of the International Horticultural Exhibition 2024 Chengdu in Chengdu Eastern New Area. At the event, Chengdu



invited friends from across the world to participate in TWG 2025 Chengdu under the slogan of “Boundless Sports, Countless Wonders”. IWGA President José Perurena delivered a speech through video in which he praised the effective and excellent work of TWG 2025 Chengdu LOC, and stressed his firm belief that Chengdu will present The World Games in a successful, splendid, and exceptional manner. The first batch of TWG 2025 Chengdu apparel was rolled out, including those for staff, Games volunteers, city volunteers, technical officials, security staff, and transport staff. At the end of the ceremony, DENG Yawen, a Sichuan-born Olympic champion, athletes from the National Beach Korfball Team, and the resident representatives from all walks of life invited sports enthusiasts worldwide to gather in Chengdu next August and enjoy the grand sports festival.

On 7-11 August, the 5-day TWG Carnival was held in the main venue of the International Horticultural Exhibition 2024 Chengdu for residents and tourists. It integrated sports experience for DanceSport, Floorball, Roller Sports, and Beach Korfball, and carnival events including the TWG Twelve Monthly Fairs and Themed Music Flash Mob Show, and presented these events at 17 performance and experience areas, providing all visitors with immersive experience and marching performance.

During the Paris 2024 Olympics, Chengdu worked with the International Sports Press Association (AIPS), setting up a special session for TWG 2025 Chengdu at the AIPS Centennial Celebration. At this session, the mascot of TWG 2025 Chengdu



made its debut on the international stage. AIPS President Gianni Merlo announced the official launch of The World Games 2025 Chengdu Young Reporters Programme and sending an invitation from Chengdu to the world. Meanwhile, at the Bastille Design Center in Paris, the TWG 2025 Chengdu Day under the Ode to Chinese Sports Spirit Exhibition was hosted by the Chinese Olympic Committee, with mascot photo-taking devices set up on site and small gifts such as brochures and badges of the TWG 2025 distributed to all visitors.

5

Main Media Centre

The Main Media Centre (MMC) is the headquarters for media operations, sports broadcast and press release during TWG 2025 Chengdu. It is located in the Western Financial Innovation Center, the core area of the Eastern New Area, Chengdu. This cluster is a built-up area and an office area for financial and headquarters enterprises, equipped with mature commercial service centres, starred hotels and apartments, public libraries, and art galleries.

The MMC covers an area of about 20,000 square metres, consisting of the Main Press Centre (MPC) and the International Broadcast Centre (IBC). The MPC is located in Building 1 (1F and 2F) and the Conference Centre, covering an area of about 11,000 square metres. The IBC is located in Building 7 (1F-3F), covering an area of about 6,000 square metres. In addition, there is a 2,000- square-metres space, mainly used for the construction of the City Hall, where cultural events and interactive activities can be held.



Near the MMC is the recommended media hotel, Grand Mercure Chengdu East. The proximity makes it easy for media personnel to balance work and life during their stay. In addition, the MMC is close to Tianfu International Airport, TWG Village, Eastern New Area Venue Cluster, Tianfu New Area Venue Cluster, and Hi-tech Zone Venue Cluster, and is about 6.5 kilometres away from Chengdu Second Ring Expressway. It is also adjacent to Sancha Station of Metro Line 18. People can go to the Tianfu International Airport and downtown of Chengdu by such convenient means of public transportation.

However, the EB gave the Organizing Committee till Monday 19th of August 5pm Bangkok time to inform the OCA if they can meet with all the requirements of the Host City Contract. Failing to do so will result in automatic cancellation of the Games.

Therefore, as per the decision of the OCA Executive Board the games are cancelled and the next edition of the Games will be held in Riyadh, Saudi Arabia, the dates for which will be finalized shortly and sent to all concerned.

3. General update of the IFF events

Champions Cup

Ms. Mitchell briefly informed that the invitation for the CC 2025 has been sent with last day to register 31.5.2024. The schedule will be prepared thereafter to be made ready in June.

WFC 2024

Ms. Mitchell briefly informed that the WFCQ for AOFC will be played in the Philippines (Pasig City, Manila) 21-25.05. The complete WFC schedule will be published thereafter.

Women's U19 WFC 2024

Ms. Mitchell briefly reported from the Women's U19 WFC played in Lahti, Finland 8-12.05. It was a very successful event with new spectator records being made for both overall spectators as well as the highest for a single match (SWE v FIN final).

3v3 WFC 2024

Ms. Mitchell briefly reported from the 3v3 WFC 2024 played in Lahti, Finland 11-12.05. The event went really well and the majority of feedback was very positive. The event will be reviewed but already some ideas are that the field of play might need to be a bit bigger and the physical play attended to. There were some comments regarding that extra time wasn't played in the play-offs and also that Associations could register more than one team.

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Men's U19 WFC 2025

Mr. Kratz briefly reported that he is still in discussion with organisers for the EUR qualification. The Americas qualification will be played 02-04.08.2024 in Fredericton, New Brunswick, Canada. For the AOFC qualification there are discussions on playing in the Solomon Islands from 21st – 23rd September 2024 which will most likely be confirmed by AOFC by the end of May.

Women's WFC 2025

Mr. Kratz briefly reported that he has approached three possible organisers for the EUR Qualifications. During the WFCQ AOFC, Ms Mitchell will discuss with the AOFC about their possible qualification host. USA is to host the Americas qualification and this will most likely be in Fort Worth, TX.

4. Other questions/tasks

IFF Competition calendar

Ms. Mitchell presented the calendar proposal based on the discussions in the last IFF CB meeting (Appendix 3). The main reason is to give more time between the major championships that would allow federations to focus on other development, rather than just getting their national teams from one WFC event to the next. It would give the opportunity for other events to be introduced, such as regular continental championships as well as possible international qualification events, rather than regional ones. Mrs Klabere reported that Latvia is very positive towards this 4-yr cycle. Mr Jirovsky also commented that Czech Floorball is in favour of this. Mr Vehniäinen said that it would add more prestige to a WFC event for a player as you would have less opportunity to participate in one. Ms Heini said that from a player perspective this might be a bad thing, but if there are other new major events as well then that is good. In general, the RACC members all expressed a positive attitude to a change to a 4-year cycle calendar from 2028. The RACC also saw the opportunity for the change to a 4-yr cycle to also allow for a more significant change to the WFC format which we have been looking at now for a long time. If only held every 4 years then the possibility for it to be a longer event, with more teams, held in multiple cities etc is much more feasible.

New playing format of the WFC

Mr. Klabere reported from the last CB meeting and the discussions on a new playing format for the WFC (Appendix 2 and 4). Basically the format is back to the drawing board but with the 4-yr calendar cycle proposal it gives more opportunity for future changes.

IFF Rules of the Game edition 2026

Mr. Kratz reported that the rules proposals have been sent to Associations and Committees where feedback shall be sent to IFF latest 31.5.2024. Further the Associations and Committees have been asked to send in possible proposals regarding activity rules which have been discussed for a long time but there were no such proposals handed in by the time for sending proposals of rules changes.

5. Next RACC meeting

Next meeting to be held in August, exact time and date tbd.

6. End of the meeting

Martin thanked the participants and closed the meeting at 18:40 CET.

COMPETITION REGULATIONS

NATIONAL TEAMS

Edition 2024

Decided by the IFF Central Board **08.09.2024**

Valid from **08.09.2024**

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§ 1 GENERAL

- 1.1. IFF Championships (Championship) shall be conducted in accordance with IFF Competition Regulations, IFF Juridical Regulations and the IFF Rules of the Game.
- 1.2. All IFF Member Associations are entitled to apply to organise IFF Championships.
- 1.3. The organisers of IFF Championships are appointed by the IFF Central Board (CB) upon proposal from the IFF Rules and Competition Committee (RACC).
- 1.4. The duties and responsibilities of the organisers are laid down in the IFF Organisers Regulations.
- 1.5. Those with a possibility to influence the outcome of a match may not, themselves or via another person/s, bet on the outcome of a match. This means that players, officials, secretariat, and board members may not bet on a match where their own team participates.
- 1.6. Further, their team delegates are responsible for any untrue action, or attitude aimed at altering documents, or the performance of the participating team members, or influencing or agreeing of the result of a match or competition, or the scoring or any other individual appearance at any point of a match to the advantage of its own team, opponent or any third party.
- 1.7. Referees may not bet on a match, or any match in a tournament, they are part of.
- 1.8. Participants in IFF Events are obliged to follow the rules, regulations and guidelines from the IFF and the IFF Event organiser.

§ 2 PARTICIPATION

- 2.1. IFF shall stage a World Championship for national representative teams in principle:
 - a) the final round for adults in the week involving the 2nd full weekend of December every year, in odd years for Women and in even years for Men
 - b) the qualifications for adults in the week involving the 1st full weekend of February every year, in odd years for Women and in even years for Men
 - c) the final round for juniors in the week involving the 1st full weekend of May every year, in odd years for Men Under 19 and in even years for Women Under 19
 - d) the qualifications for juniors in the week involving the 2nd full weekend of September every year, in odd years for Women Under 19 and in even years for Men Under 19
- 2.2. All IFF Member Associations which are not under suspension may apply to participate in a Championship.
- 2.3. Registration shall be made on the official IFF form. Registration and payment of the participation fee shall be submitted to the IFF as follows:

2.3.1. **Adult WFC**

- a) 7000 CHF for directly qualified and 3000 CHF for teams in the qualification shall be at the IFF Head Office not later than 31st of December two years before the year of the Championship.
- b) Further, the referee costs in the qualification shall be equally shared by all teams in the qualification, the fee is set to 1500 CHF, to be paid before the event.
- c) The teams qualifying for the WFC final round shall pay an additional fee of 2500* CHF within 30 days from having qualified to the final round.

2.3.2. **U19 WFC**

- a) 5000 CHF for directly qualified and 3000 CHF for teams in the qualification shall be at the IFF Head Office not later than the 31st of December two years before the year of the Championship
- b) Further, the referee costs in the qualification and the final round respectively shall be equally shared by all teams. The cost is set to 1500 CHF per team, and event, to be paid before the event.

- 2.4. A team that registers for a competition and then withdraws from the championship, either prior to the start of, or during competition, shall be sanctioned according to the IFF Juridical Regulations.
- 2.5. Costs for travel to and from the arrival city, board and lodging shall be borne by each participating team. The arrival city of a tournament shall be the city with the nearest harbour, railway station or international airport to the main city of the competition. The organiser shall take the cost of transport from the arrival city onwards. In case of any doubts, it is the IFF Central Board/RACC which defines the arrival city of the tournament.
- 2.6. The host shall pay for no more than 30 persons (20 players and 10 officials) per team for travelling from the airport, harbour or railway station in the arrival city to their respective accommodation. The host shall also pay for the participating teams for travelling from their accommodation to the official venues and to training sessions according to the official program and to the airport, harbour or railway station in the departure city.
- 2.7. The responsibility for the organiser to transport the teams starts two days before the first match and ceases the day after the last match of each team. The teams must use the local transport provided by the organiser.
- 2.8. Teams may select their own hotels in the competition city or the immediate vicinity, however, when accommodation not listed by the organiser or outside the designated radius is chosen, extra costs for transportation and other LOC services may be charged.
- 2.9. Participants shall be responsible for taking out the appropriate insurance to cover their delegations.

§ 3 QUALIFICATION OF PLAYERS AND OFFICIALS

- 3.1. Only players with nationality of their own nation, having not participated earlier for another adult national representative team in a Championship, shall be eligible to represent the nation in the Championship.
- 3.2. A player may represent one nation in a recognised junior (U17, U19) international match and another in a recognised adult (U23, adult) international. Once a player has

represented a nation in a recognised adult international match this rules out the possibility to play for another nation at any international level (junior or adult).

- 3.3. It is the responsibility of each National Association to ensure that all players and team officials registered to their own national representative teams &/or a Club team from their association meet all eligibility requirements.
- 3.4. Eligibility must be finalised prior to the submission of an official team list. No applications for Sporting Nationality will be processed after the team list submission.
- 3.5. Nationality can be confirmed as follows:
 - 3.5.1. **Permanent Nationality.** Any person holding a permanent nationality is eligible to play for the representative teams of the association of that country.

Proof of permanent nationality:

- The only document considered to be valid proof of a player's identity and nationality shall be a permanent international passport that explicitly, and in Latin characters, states the player's first name(s) and surname(s), as well as their day, month and year of birth
- Identity cards or other local supporting official documents shall not be accepted as a valid means of identification for the purpose of proving nationality

- 3.5.2. **Sporting Nationality.** In the case of a player who has not represented any country at international level, they can choose their sporting nationality based on fulfilling one of the following criteria:
 - i. born on the territory of the relevant association; OR
 - ii. biological mother or biological father was born on the territory of the relevant association; OR
 - iii. grandmother or grandfather was born on the territory of the relevant association; OR
 - iv. has lived on the territory of the relevant association for at least five years

Proof of sporting nationality

- Birth certificate showing the player's first name (s) and surname (s), date of birth, and place of birth; OR
- Birth certificate showing biological mother/grandmother's or biological father/grandfather's first name (s) and surname (s), date of birth, and place of birth PLUS proof of relationship to the player; OR
- Proof of having lived on the territory of the relevant association for at least five years.

- 3.6. A player may, only once, request to change the association for which they are eligible play at adult level, to the association of another country of which they hold the nationality. A request to change association may be granted only in the following circumstances:
 - The player wishes to represent an association that was admitted to federation membership after they were already assigned sporting nationality by way of participation in an international event;
 - The player never represented their current association in any international event after the association which they wish to represent was admitted to membership;
 - The player, at the time of playing their first match in an international competition (at any level) for their current association:
 - held the nationality of the association which they wish to represent; or
 - in the case of a newly recognised country, obtained the nationality of the association which they wish to represent as soon as reasonably practicable after the country was recognised by the majority of the members of the United Nations

- 3.7. All players in the WFC (qualification and/or final round) must be aged at least 15 years old before the start of the final round to be eligible to participate.
- 3.8. All players in the U19 WFC (qualification and/or final round) must be aged at least 15 years old no later than 30th June in the same year of the final round and turn 19 years old no earlier than the 1st of January in the same year of the final round to be eligible to participate.
- 3.9. All team officials must be at least 18 years old before the start of the event in which they will participate
- 3.10. Teams participating are entitled to use a maximum of 20 players and a maximum of 7 officials in the Championship.
- 3.11. 30 full days before the first match of the Championship a list of the team delegation, completed on the official IFF form and signed by the National Association concerned, shall be sent to IFF. This list may consist of up to 20 players, 7 officials, 3 extra officials, 10 emergency players and 2 Team Media Attachés. Only players included on the emergency list will be eligible to be substituted to the final team list in case of injury or other reasons.
- 3.12. Together with the list, the teams shall send a photo of each team member (players and officials) and a picture of the team jerseys showing both the front and the back.
- 3.13. Passports or other internationally accepted ID card may be checked in connection with the accreditation.
- 3.14. Every player and official must have signed the IFF Event Participant Acknowledgement & Agreement form before they will be provided with accreditation.
- 3.15. A maximum of 20 players and 5 officials are allowed to participate in a match. The signed list of players and officials taking part in a match shall be handed in to the match secretariat not later than 60 minutes before the match. At the same time the team line-up form shall be handed in. No other than those on the list are allowed to be in the substitution zone. The printed match record shall be signed by team officials after the match.

§ 4 RELEASE OF PLAYERS

- 4.1. A player officially nominated for representation in a national team for an international event and/or national team training camp is obliged to represent. The player is obliged to inform the club to which they are bound of their nomination within 3 days of notification by their National Association.
- 4.2. The club is obliged to release the player who has been officially nominated for the needs of the national team, according to 4.5, 4.6, and 4.7.
- 4.3. It is up to each National Association to set their own rules regarding the selection and informing of players of their nomination to a national team, however those rules must align with the IFF rules regarding participation in national team events.
- 4.4. It is up to each National Association to set internal rules for its own competitions to resolve any conflict from the selection of national team representatives (postponement of matches, etc.).

- 4.5. For the final round of WFC and U19 WFC players shall be freed for participation in their respective national teams starting the Saturday in advance of the event and at least one day after.
- 4.6. For the final round of multi-sport events, as well as the qualifications for WFC, U19 WFC, and multi-sport events, players shall be freed for participation in their respective national teams at least three days in advance of the event and at least one day after.
- 4.7. For Friendly Internationals and training camps during IFF International weekends (1st full weekend of February, 4th weekend of April, 1st full weekend of September, 3rd weekend of October and 2nd weekend of November) players shall be freed for participation in their respective national teams at least three days in advance of the event and at least one day after.
- 4.8. A National Association who selects a player who plays in a foreign league club (at any level) for participation in a national team in an official international event, is required to inform the foreign club's National Association of the selection, and confirm the availability of the player, prior to the submission of their official team list to the IFF.
- 4.9. A National Association who selects a player who plays in a foreign league club (at any level) for participation in a national team training camp, is required to inform the foreign club's National Association of the selection, and confirm the availability of the player, no later than 14 days prior to start of the training camp.
- 4.10. Any player who is selected by their National Association for an official international event &/or training camp and informs they are not available to play in the respective event &/or training camp, shall not be entitled to play a club match held at the corresponding time as the event &/or training camp. If the player does play for their club at this time, then the National Association of the club team for which they play shall be fined.
- 4.11. Players who have, before the submission of the official team list to the IFF, announced that they have withdrawn from the national team, in accordance with the internal rules set by each National Association, should not be included to an official team list for an IFF event.

§ 5 PLAYING SYSTEM FOR ADULT WORLD CHAMPIONSHIPS (WFC)

- 5.1. The Adult World Championships shall be played with qualifications and a final round.
- 5.2. The final round shall consist of 16 teams.
- 5.3. The WFC final round shall be played in 4 groups of 4 teams each. The forming of the groups shall be decided in a ballot based on the final rankings of the two previous Championships of the same category, where each group will be allotted two teams from each basket as follows:

Group A and B:

Basket 1: Ranking 1-4

Basket 2: Ranking 5-8

Group C and D:

Basket 3: Ranking 9-12

Basket 4: Ranking 13-16

- 5.4. Continued play after the group matches shall be as follows (the exact numbering of the matches may differ for each event depending on the order of play in the final match schedule):

- 5.5. A drawing of lots shall decide which team shall be the home team of the final and the bronze match

- 5.6. Ranking matches between 5th and 16th place shall be played as follows:

- 5.7. Qualification for the Adult World Championships is played with continental tournaments. The model of the qualifications and the number of places will be based on the number of qualifying teams per continent. The system of the qualification will be decided by the RACC.

§ 6 PLAYING SYSTEM FOR U19 WORLD CHAMPIONSHIPS (U19 WFC)

- 6.1. The U19 World Championships shall be played with qualifications and a final round.
- 6.2. The final round shall consist of 16 teams
- 6.3. The U19 WFC shall be played 4 groups of 4 teams each. The forming of the groups shall be decided in a ballot based on the final rankings of the previous Championships of the same category, where each group will be allotted two teams from each basket as follows:

- 6.5. A drawing of lots shall decide which team shall be the home team of the final and the bronze match.

- 6.6. Ranking matches for 5th to 15th place shall be played as follows:

§ 7 GENERAL REGULATIONS FOR ADULT & U19 WORLD CHAMPIONSHIPS

- 7.1. The matches within each group shall be organised so that each team play each other once.
- 7.2. In the group matches 2 points are awarded for a win, 1 point for a draw and 0 points for a loss.
- 7.3. The ranking within a group shall be decided in the following order:
- The total number of points.
 - If two or more teams have the same number of points the internal matches of the teams concerned, the internal goal difference included, if necessary, shall be decisive.
 - If the internal matches according to b) are not decisive, most scored goals internally shall be decisive.
 - If the ranking cannot be decided by the internal matches, the total goal difference of the teams concerned shall be decisive.
 - If the total goal difference is not decisive most scored goals of the teams concerned shall be decisive.
 - If most scored goals are not decisive a drawing of lot with the teams concerned shall settle the ranking unless the ranking concerns only the two teams playing a last round match deciding about promotion or relegation when extra time and, if needed, penalty shots shall decide the ranking.

The results of all matches versus a team which has missed a match or matches, and lost these by walk over 5-0, shall not have an effect on the final ranking between teams having ended up in the same amount of points, unless the team having missed the match or matches is itself involved.

- 7.4. All matches of the continued play after the group matches shall, when ending with a draw, be decided according to the IFF Rules of the Game concerning extra-time and, if necessary, penalty shots. This shall be valid also for qualifications involving two teams only playing two matches where the qualification, if a draw after two matches, shall be decided by extra time and possible penalty shots following directly after the second match.
- 7.5. The match schedule of a Championship shall be done such that there is least 2hrs 45mins between the start of matches being played on the same rink. In principle, a team that plays the last match of the day shall not play the first match the following day. A minimum of 3hrs should be allowed for matches that require a result and could be decided by extra time and penalty shots.
- 7.6. The organisers are entitled to request to the IFF RACC for changes in the timetable for reasons of television coverage. The teams shall be informed at a justified time before the start of the match concerned.
- 7.7. Teams are entitled to warm up at least 15 minutes on the rink before the start of a match.

§ 8 PLAYER'S OUTFITS

- 8.1. The player's outfit shall be according to the IFF Rules of the Game. The participating teams shall have one dark and one light coloured jersey. IFF may decide about further regulations regarding numbering, colours and advertisements on the player's outfit and equipment and the team official's outfit and equipment, to be in charge during the Championship.
- 8.2. Shirts should be the same colour on both front and back, and the main colour must be dominating. Visible parts of undershirts, undershorts, tights, and compression wear shall be of the same colour as the main colour of the match uniform shirt or the shorts. For leg wear black is also allowed.
- 8.3. In the final round of the Adult World Championships, players must have the surname written in the back of the player's shirt. The name must be written with clearly visible Latin letters, which are at least 80 mm high. Players with the same surname should be identified with the addition of the initial of their first name.
- 8.4. A player taking part of the Championship shall wear the same number throughout the whole competition. Changes due to unforeseen circumstances, such as damage to the uniform, or blood, may be allowed with the permission of the IFF / Jury.
- 8.5. If two teams have the same colour the IFF shall decide which team shall change.
- 8.6. All teams are required to present their two playing shirts (one light and one dark) for inspection at the First Technical Meeting of the event.

§ 9 ADVERTISEMENT RIGHTS

- 9.1. A team is entitled to have advertisements on the player's outfit, but shall leave space for possible IFF advertisement according to 9.2
- 9.2. IFF is entitled to have advertisements (10 x 15cm) on the player's outfit.

§ 10 PROTESTS

- 10.1. The IFF Rules and Competition Committee (RACC) shall act as the jury and decide in matters regarding protests during the Championship. Sanctions imposed by the Jury are final as far as the duration of the competition to which they apply is concerned.
- 10.2. When taking decisions, the valid IFF regulations are applicable.
- 10.3. The intention to protest shall be noted in the Match Record directly after the match and the protest shall be handed to the Jury within 60 minutes from the end of the match concerned.
- 10.4. Protests concerning qualification of players shall be handed in before the start of the match concerned.
- 10.5. A protest must be written, signed, and accompanied by the amount of 100 CHF, which will be returned only if the protest is approved.

§ 11 ANTI-DOPING

- 11.1. All players using medication that is on the Prohibited List must have a valid Therapeutic Use Exemption (TUE) to participate in an IFF Championship.
- 11.2. TUE applications must be submitted to the IFF at least 30 days prior to the start of the event. Alternatively, a player may submit, no later than a NADO-approved TUE for confirmation by the IFF.
- 11.3. All doping matters during an IFF event shall be referred to the applicable deciding body, and all decisions will be based on the valid IFF regulations and the applicable IFF Anti-Doping regulations.
- 11.4. All players registered for participation in an IFF Event agree to undergo doping control testing. Refusal of a player to submit to doping test shall be considered as equivalent to a positive result.
- 11.5. In case of a positive doping test the player concerned shall be suspended during investigation. Any decision about punishment shall be taken after the investigation is over, according to the IFF Anti-Doping regulations.

§ 12 BETTING

- 12.1. It is prohibited for any athletes, and their entourage, from participating in all forms of, or support for, betting or gambling related to their own Floorball matches and Floorball competitions
- 12.2. It is prohibited to use any Inside Information for betting purposes, including disclosing Inside Information to any person (with or without reward) where the athlete might reasonably be expected to know that its disclosure could be used in relation to betting.
- 12.3. The use of electronic equipment in relation to one's own match/es is limited according to the information in Section 14 of this document.
- 12.4. Matches may be excluded from the betting offer of organisations under investigation or subject to sanctions for manipulations.

- 12.5. It is prohibited to bet on matches for minors (under 18 years old).
- 12.6. Sponsorship by betting operators of sports teams composed of minors (athletes under 18 years old) shall be prohibited.
- 12.7. Unauthorised betting types and formulas, following annual identification by a technical group of sport and betting experts will be determined by the IFF or Association. Betting operators will be requested not to offer these bets to punters.
- 12.8. To ensure an economic fair return from the betting operators, not only for the organisers of events, but also for the development of Floorball recognition of a “betting right” of an IFF event shall be agreed upon between the betting companies and the IFF, and for a national event between the betting companies and the National Association.
- 12.9. Sanctions for breaches of the betting regulations are according to the IFF Juridical Regulations Article 8 and 9.

§ 13 REFEREES

- 13.1. All matters concerning referees in IFF National Team competitions shall be dealt with by the IFF Referee Committee according to valid regulations and decisions.
- 13.2. All International matches between two national teams (Adults, U23, U19) shall be refereed by an international referee pair who shall be appointed by the IFF Referee Committee.
- 13.3. The Referees appointed shall be included on the IFF list of International Referees. In some events, the IFF Referee Committee may appoint referees from the IFF Referee Development Group
- 13.4. Appointments of referees in IFF events shall in principle be made at the earliest the day before a match.
- 13.5. Random financial audits for referees may be carried out as well as regular scrutiny of their on-court decisions.

§ 14 USE OF ELECTRONIC DEVICES

- 14.1. Participants’ laptops, computers and similar devices and telecommunication tools including mobile phones and internet in the pre-defined restricted areas (including locker rooms) shall be turned off during the participants own matches.
- 14.2. For the purpose of statistics and player analysis only, tablets and other electronic devices may be used on team benches’.
- 14.3. Headsets may be used for communication between team staff within the competition venue. No communication connections with sources outside the competition venue are allowed during the time related to your match.

§ 15 INTEGRITY

- 15.1. The National Associations shall have regulations ensuring that they, and their clubs, fulfil their financial obligations towards their athletes and sports officials i.e. regular pay and good conditions for their professional athletes and sports officials (including referees).
- 15.2. Any person who is under prosecution for action including forgery, corruption, etc. or who has been convicted of a criminal offence within the last two years shall, to avoid conflicts of interest, not be allowed to be involved in the management of federations, clubs, associations, teams etc.
- 15.3. Random financial audits for National Associations as well as their Clubs may be carried out at any time to ensure transparency in their financial dealings.

§ 16 DISCIPLINARY MATTERS

- 16.1. The IFF Rules and Competition Committee (RACC) shall act as the jury and decide in matters regarding disciplinary matters during the Championship.
- 16.2. Sanctions imposed by the Jury are final as far as the duration of the competition to which they apply is concerned.
- 16.3. When a disciplinary matter is reported by any of the teams playing in a match or by the IFF, then the decision shall be made by the Event Disciplinary Function of the event.
- 16.4. A suspension decided by the Event Disciplinary function may not exceed 3 matches and applies only to matches in the said event.
- 16.5. When taking disciplinary decisions, the valid IFF regulations are applicable.
- 16.6. The report in a disciplinary matter shall be handed in latest 09:00 the morning after the match. The disciplinary function shall decide and inform of the decision no later than 15:00 the day after the match, or no later than 2hrs prior to the player's / team's next match in the event, whichever occurs first.
- 16.7. A disciplinary report handed in by a team must be written, signed, and accompanied by the amount of 500 CHF, which will be returned only if the decision is in favour of the reporting team. If the report refers to a video clip this shall be included in the report
- 16.8. When handling a disciplinary matter during an IFF event the IFF Disciplinary function may use video recording only if the recording is from the official filming of the event, as defined by the IFF.
- 16.9. The Disciplinary function of the event will be comprised of representatives from the Jury, Referee management and IFF staff of the event.
- 16.10. All disciplinary matters which are not in the competence of the CB or the RACC of IFF shall be dealt with by the IFF Disciplinary Bodies

§ 17 WALK OVER

- 17.1. When a Walk Over (W.O) is at hand, meaning when a team does not line up to a match, the match is forfeited, and the opponent shall be considered having won the match with the result 5-0.

§ 18 CUPS AND MEDALS IN THE WORLD CHAMPIONSHIPS

- 18.1. A challenge cup shall be presented to the winning team to hold for one year. The holder shall be responsible for the loss or damage of the cup and shall bring it to the next Championship in perfect condition. The holder shall be responsible for engraving of its name according to the guidelines laid down by IFF.
- 18.2. A replica of the cup and 30 IFF Gold medals shall be awarded to the winning team.
- 18.3. The challenge cup shall become the final property of the team which wins the trophy three times in succession or a total of five times.
- 18.4. The runner-up shall receive a cup and 30 IFF Silver medals.
- 18.5. The 3rd placed team shall receive a cup and 30 IFF Bronze medals.
- 18.6. A maximum of an additional 10 medals (gold, silver, bronze) may be produced, the cost of which is the responsibility of the respective medal winning team.
- 18.7. The referees in the final shall be presented one IFF Gold medal each. The referees in the bronze match shall be presented one IFF Silver medal each.
- 18.8. Each participating player and team official in the teams placed 4th -16th, and referee shall be presented one IFF Memory medal each.

§ 19 THE RINK

- 19.1. The rink shall be according to the IFF Rules of the Game.

§ 20 PRACTICE SESSIONS DURING WORLD CHAMPIONSHIPS

- 20.1. Teams are entitled to one practice session, of at least 45 minutes, in the competition venue, on the official training day, usually the day before their first official match in an event.
- 20.2. During the event, teams are entitled to practice for at least 60 minutes per day on a regulation playing area or a playing area of the same size as the competition arena. Where possible, the playing surface and rink should be the same as in the competition arena.
- 20.3. In Adult WFC, the cost of the official pre-event practice session plus one daily training session, including transport to/from the training, is the responsibility of the organiser.

- 20.4. In U19 WFC, the cost of the official pre-event practice session, including transport to/from the training, is the responsibility of the organiser. The costs for all other training sessions, including transport, is the responsibility of the teams.
- 20.5. Practice sessions shall be conducted according to the official practice schedule.
- 20.6. Teams shall bring their own balls and other training equipment to practice sessions.
- 20.7. The event organiser is responsible for ensuring that the training venue equipment (flooring, rink, goal cages) are prepared and in place for each training session.

§ 21 OFFICIAL MEETINGS

- 21.1. Immediately prior to the start of the tournament the Captain's & Technical meeting shall be held where the organising committee, the head of delegation of each team, the team captain, the head of referees and the IFF Jury shall be present.
- 21.2. A second technical meeting may be held after the group matches.
- 21.3. A third technical meeting may be held after the play-off matches.
- 21.4. The organisers are responsible for arranging the meeting rooms.
- 21.5. The heads of delegations shall attend other meetings scheduled by the Jury or the organising committee.
- 21.6. During an event, all meetings that IFF informs as Official Meetings, shall be compulsory for the participating teams.

§ 22 TICKETS

22.1. Participating Teams

- 22.1.1. Each participating team is entitled to, free of charge, a maximum of 30 tickets/reserved seats, in the form of accreditations, for the players and officials of the team. Only those on the Final team list will receive accreditation/reserved seats.
- 22.1.2. For Adult WFC these are valid for the time the team is playing in the Championships. The accreditation ends on the same day when the teams have played their last match in the competition.
- 22.1.3. For U19 WFC these are valid for the duration of the event.
- 22.1.4. The organiser of the Championship must reserve the needed number of reserved seats for all the participating teams for the group rounds. For the play-off rounds the organiser needs to reserve the same number of reserved seats equal to the number of teams still participating in the tournament.
- 22.1.5. For the Adult WFC, the participating teams are entitled to reserve and purchase tickets for the play-off phase of the tournament in the lowest price category, no later than three months prior to the start of the Championships. If a team, which has reserved and paid for tickets for the play-offs, would qualify for the play-offs, the organiser shall reimburse the price of the tickets.

22.2. Participating Associations

22.2.1. Each Member Association with a team participating in a Championship is entitled to a maximum of 5 tickets (2 VIP accreditations and 3 ordinary tickets) valid for the entire event, free of charge.

22.2.2. Each participating Member Association is entitled to purchase tickets.

22.2.3. The ticket quota of each participating member Association shall be fixed by IFF in consultation with the organiser, and shall be divided as follows:

- a) For their own team's matches in the group
- b) For matches played by other teams in the same group
- c) For matches in other groups
- d) For their own team's matches in continued play after group matches
- e) For other matches in continued play after group matches

22.3. Associations attending the IFF General Assembly / Associations Meeting

Each Member Association, without a team taking part in the Championship, but attending the IFF General Assembly / Associations Meeting is entitled to 2 VIP accreditations for the Championships, valid only for the time defined in the specific meeting invitation/registration information.

§ 23 UNFORESEEN CIRCUMSTANCES

23.1. The CB and/or RACC of IFF shall take decisions on all matters not provided for in these Regulations, as well as in cases of "force majeure". Such decisions shall not be subject to appeal.

ExCo approved proposal for the Competition Regulations – National teams & Friendly international matches

§ 4 RELEASE OF PLAYERS

- 4.1. A player officially nominated for representation in a national team for an international event and/or national team training camp is obliged to represent. The player is obliged to inform the club to which they are bound of their nomination within 3 days of notification by their National Association.
- 4.2. The club is obliged to release the player who has been officially nominated for the needs of the national team, according to 4.5, 4.6, and 4.7.
- 4.3. It is up to each National Association to set their own rules regarding the selection and informing of players of their nomination to a national team, however those rules must align with the IFF rules regarding participation in national team events.
- 4.4. It is up to each National Association to set internal rules for its own competitions to resolve any conflict from the selection of national team representatives (postponement of matches, etc.).
- 4.5. For the final round of WFC and U19 WFC players shall be freed for participation in their respective national teams starting the Saturday in advance of the event and at least one day after.
- 4.6. For the final round of multi-sport events, as well as the qualifications for WFC, U19 WFC, and multi-sport events, players shall be freed for participation in their respective national teams at least three days in advance of the event and at least one day after.
- 4.7. For Friendly Internationals and training camps during IFF International weekends (1st full weekend of February, 4th weekend of April, 1st full weekend of September, 3rd weekend of October and 2nd weekend of November) players shall be freed for participation in their respective national teams at least three days in advance of the event and at least one day after.
- 4.8. A National Association who selects a player who plays in a foreign league club (at any level) for participation in a national team in an official international event, is required to inform the foreign club's National Association of the selection, and confirm the availability of the player, prior to the submission of their official team list to the IFF.
- 4.9. A National Association who selects a player who plays in a foreign league club (at any level) for participation in a national team training camp, is required to inform the foreign club's National Association of the selection, and confirm the availability of the player, no later than 14 days prior to start of the training camp.
- 4.10. Any player who is selected by their National Association for an official international event &/or training camp and informs they are not available to play in the respective event &/or training camp, shall not be entitled to play a club match held at the corresponding time as the event &/or training camp. If the player does play for their club at this time, then the National Association of the club team for which they play shall be fined.

- 4.11. Players who have, before the submission of the official team list to the IFF, announced that they have withdrawn from the national team, in accordance with the internal rules set by each National Association, should not be included to an official team list for an IFF event.



COMPETITION REGULATIONS

FRIENDLY INTERNATIONAL MATCHES

National & Club teams

Edition 2024

Decided by the IFF Central Board **08.09.2024**

Valid from **08.09.2024**

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§ 1 GENERAL

- 1.1. Friendly International matches are either:
 - a) Internationals played between national teams of the Member Associations of IFF;
 - b) Any other match where a national team plays against a Club or regional team from another country;
 - c) Club matches played between club teams representing the highest league from at least two different nations;
 - d) National League matches played abroad
- 1.2. Friendly International matches shall be conducted in accordance with IFF Competition Regulations, IFF Juridical Regulations and the IFF Rules of the Game.
- 1.3. All IFF Member Associations shall inform the IFF when organising friendly international matches. The organiser of internationals shall use the IFF form “Information form for International Matches and Request of Referees”. The information form shall be sent to IFF no later than sixty (60) days prior to the match / start of the event. Forms received after this time will be subject to monetary sanctions.
- 1.4. The organiser may use the guidelines of the IFF Organisers Regulations, when organising Friendly International Matches.
- 1.5. In Internationals the official match record of IFF shall be used. The Match Record shall be signed by the organiser, the referees and the teams and sent, along with other match secretariat papers, to the IFF Office by the organiser no later than seven (7) days after the last match.
- 1.6. Matches between a national team and a club or regional team from a different country may be played without any official record of the match, however, the National Association of the participating national team should inform the IFF with the IFF form “Information form for International Club Tournament” at least thirty (30) days in advance.
- 1.7. Club tournaments, involving club teams from the highest division of at least two Member Associations, are International Elite Club Tournaments. These tournaments shall be informed to IFF by the organiser / Member Association of the organiser with the IFF form “Information form for International Club Tournament” at least thirty (30) days in advance.
- 1.8. For National league matches played abroad, an open application letter should be made by the participating Member Association to the IFF at least sixty (60) days in advance. Once approved, the Member Association hosting the foreign National league match/es should inform the IFF with the IFF form “Information form for International Club Tournament” at least thirty (30) days in advance.
- 1.9. All International matches (tournaments) between two national teams shall be included in the IFF list of International matches. All International Elite Club Tournaments shall be included in the IFF list of International Club Tournaments
- 1.10. Those with a possibility to influence the outcome of a match may not, themselves or via other person/s, bet on the outcome of a match. This means that i.e. players, officials, secretariat, and board members may not bet on a match where the own team participates. Further, their team delegates are responsible for any untrue action, or attitude aimed at altering documents, or the performance of the participating team members, or influencing or agreeing of the result of a match or competition, or the scoring or any other individual appearance at any point of a match to the advantage of its own team, opponent or any third party.
- 1.11. Referees may not bet on a match, or any match in a tournament, they are part of.

§ 2 PARTICIPATION

- 2.1. All IFF Member Associations or club teams which are not under suspension may play friendly internationals or send club teams to International Club tournaments.
- 2.2. Participation in an elite level International Club tournament (as mentioned in § 1.8) in another country requires the approval from the respective National Floorball Association.
- 2.3. Participation of National teams in club competitions is possible when:
 - a) the organiser mentions in the invitation the possibility of a national team/s participation in the tournament regulations;
 - b) the organiser receives official approval from the respective Association and also confirmation that the individual players participation corresponds with the national legislation
- 2.4. The National Association shall report the participation of one of their national teams in a club competition to the IFF.
- 2.5. The organiser shall ensure that a potential match between two national teams within the tournament would be refereed by international referees.
- 2.6. Participation of a national team in a match against a club or regional team from another country is possible when the organiser receives official approval from the Association in which the match shall be played
- 2.7. Further, the National Association of the national team participating in such matches shall report the participation of their team to the IFF (as mentioned in § 1.6) and provide the confirmation from the hosting association when submitting the information form

§ 3 QUALIFICATION OF PLAYERS AND OFFICIALS

- 3.1. Only players with nationality of their own nation, having not participated earlier for another adult national representative team in a Championship, shall be eligible to represent the nation in the Championship.
- 3.2. A player may represent one nation in a recognised junior (U17, U19) international match and another in a recognised adult (U23, adult) international. Once a player has represented a nation in a recognised adult international match this rules out the possibility to play for another nation at any international level (junior or adult).
- 3.3. It is the responsibility of each National Association to ensure that all players and team officials registered to their own national representative teams &/or a Club team from their association meet all eligibility requirements.
- 3.4. Eligibility must be finalised prior to the submission of an official team list. No applications for Sporting Nationality will be processed after the team list submission.
- 3.5. Nationality can be confirmed as follows:
 - 3.5.1. **Permanent Nationality**. Any person holding a permanent nationality is eligible to play for the representative teams of the association of that country.

Proof of permanent nationality:

- The only document considered to be valid proof of a player's identity and nationality shall be a permanent international passport that explicitly, and in Latin characters, states the player's first name(s) and surname(s), as well as their day, month and year of birth
- Identity cards or other local supporting official documents shall not be accepted as a valid means of identification for the purpose of proving nationality

3.5.2. Sporting Nationality. In the case of a player who has not represented any country at international level, they can choose their sporting nationality based on fulfilling one of the following criteria:

- i. born on the territory of the relevant association; OR
- ii. biological mother or biological father was born on the territory of the relevant association; OR
- iii. grandmother or grandfather was born on the territory of the relevant association; OR
- iv. has lived on the territory of the relevant association for at least five years

Proof of sporting nationality

- Birth certificate showing the player's first name (s) and surname (s), date of birth, and place of birth; OR
- Birth certificate showing biological mother/grandmother's or biological father/grandfather's first name (s) and surname (s), date of birth, and place of birth PLUS proof of relationship to the player; OR
- Proof of having lived on the territory of the relevant association for at least five years.

3.4. A player may, only once, request to change the association for which they are eligible play at adult level, to the association of another country of which they hold the nationality. A request to change association may be granted only in the following circumstances:

- The player wishes to represent an association that was admitted to federation membership after they were already assigned sporting nationality by way of participation in an international event;
- The player never represented their current association in any international event after the association which they wish to represent was admitted to membership;
- The player, at the time of playing their first match in an international competition (at any level) for their current association:
 - held the nationality of the association which they wish to represent; or
 - in the case of a newly recognised country, obtained the nationality of the association which they wish to represent as soon as reasonably practicable after the country was recognised by the majority of the members of the United Nations

3.5. Friendly Internationals can be played in the age categories of U17, U19, U23, and Adult. It is allowed, upon agreement, between the participating countries, that different age category teams compete against each other in the same event.

3.6. In the case of an event with different age categories playing against each other, the event will be classified according to the oldest age category.

3.7. A team shall be classified according to the age of the oldest player in the team.

3.8. All players must be aged as follows to be eligible to participate in each age category:

- a) **U17:** players shall be aged at least 14 years old at the start of the event and turn 17 years no earlier than the 1st of January in the same year as the event
- b) **U19:** players shall be aged at least 15 years old at the start of the event and turn 19 years no earlier than the 1st of January in the same year as the event (see 3.9 for exceptions)

- c) **U23:** players shall be aged at least 15 years old at the start of the event and turn 23 no earlier than the 1st of January in the same year as the event
- d) **Adults:** players shall be aged at least 15 years old at the start of the event (see 3.9 for exceptions)

- 3.9. For events involving teams that are preparing for an upcoming WFC or U19 WFC, the ages of the players in the respective adult or U19 team can be the same as the official age eligibility for the final round event. This only applies for Friendly International matches held after the WFC or U19 WFC qualifications and before the WFC or U19 WFC final rounds.
- 3.10. All team officials must be at least 18 years old before the start of the event in which they will participate
- 3.11. Only players being licensed for a club taking part in an international club match or tournament shall be eligible to play for the club concerned. A Club may grant their players, who are under contractual basis, an exemption (Temporary Play) from this regulation for participation with another Club in a specified friendly international tournament. The tournament shall be played between the first of May and the last of August and the tournament shall allow such participation. The player shall not be under suspension and shall not have participated in the EFCh.
- 3.12. Such an exemption shall be informed to the National Association of the Club giving the exemption and to the organiser of the tournaments 21 days in advance of the tournament by filling in the Temporary Play form. All Temporary Plays shall be published on the IFF web pages. A maximum of two Temporary Plays per player and year is allowed.
- 3.13. At least 10 days prior to the start of the match / tournament a list of the team delegation, completed on the official IFF form and signed by the National Association concerned, shall be sent to IFF. This list may consist of up to 30 players and 10 officials.
- 3.14. Every player and team official included on the team list shall also be included on the published team list visible in the IFF Media Platform and online statistics.
- 3.15. After submission of the team list to the IFF, no changes, except to shirt numbers, may be made to the team list.
- 3.16. A maximum of 20 players and 5 officials are allowed to participate in a match. These players and officials may only be selected from the official team list of 30 players and 10 officials that has been submitted to the IFF.
- 3.17. A list of players and officials who are taking part in a match shall be handed in to the match secretariat no later than 30 minutes before the start of the match. No other than those on the list are allowed to be in the substitution zone.

§ 4 RELEASE OF PLAYERS

- 4.1. A player officially nominated for representation in a national team for an international event and/or national team training camp is obliged to represent. The player is obliged to inform the club to which they are bound of their nomination within 3 days of notification by their National Association.
- 4.2. The club is obliged to release the player who has been officially nominated for the needs of the national team, according to 4.5, 4.6, and 4.7.

- 4.3. It is up to each National Association to set their own rules regarding the selection and informing of players of their nomination to a national team, however those rules must align with the IFF rules regarding participation in national team events.
- 4.4. It is up to each National Association to set internal rules for its own competitions to resolve any conflict from the selection of national team representatives (postponement of matches, etc.).

- 4.9. A National Association who selects a player who plays in a foreign league club (at any level) for participation in a national team training camp, is required to inform the foreign club's National Association of the selection, and confirm the availability of the player, no later than 14 days prior to start of the training camp.
- 4.10. Any player who is selected by their National Association for an official international event &/or training camp and informs they are not available to play in the respective event &/or training camp, shall not be entitled to play a club match held at the corresponding time as the event &/or training camp. If the player does play for their club at this time, then the National Association of the club team for which they play shall be fined.
- 4.11. Players who have, before the submission of the official team list to the IFF, announced that they have withdrawn from the national team, in accordance with the internal rules set by each National Association, should not be included to an official team list for an IFF event.

§ 5 PLAYING SYSTEM FOR FRIENDLY INTERNATIONALS

- 5.1. Friendly International Matches shall be organised in accordance with the guidelines of the IFF Organisers Regulations. Exceptions may only be made by a mutual agreement between the participants concerned.
- 5.2. For National League matches played abroad and for matches played between a national team and a club or regional team from another country, the respective rules of the National Association should be followed.

§ 6 PLAYER'S OUTFITS

- 6.1. The player's outfit shall be according to the IFF Rules of the Game.
- 6.2. IFF may decide about further regulations for friendly international matches regarding numbering, colours and advertisements on the player's outfit and equipment, and the team official's outfit and equipment.

§ 7 VENUE

- 7.1. For Friendly International Matches the venue shall be chosen in accordance with the requirements of the IFF Organisers Regulations. Exceptions may only be made by a mutual agreement between the participants concerned.

§ 8 ADVERTISEMENTS

- 8.1. A team is entitled to have advertisements on the player's outfit.
- 8.2. IFF shall have the possibility to ask for advertisements on the player's outfit, based on an agreement with the National Associations.

§ 9 ANTI-DOPING

- 9.1. For all Friendly International Matches the valid IFF regulations and the WADA Anti-Doping Regulations are applicable.
- 9.2. All players using medication that is on the Prohibited List should have a valid Therapeutic Use Exemption (TUE) when participating in a Friendly International Match. A valid TUE issued by either the IFF or a NADO is allowed.
- 9.3. For player's participating in Friendly International Matches, all TUE applications must be made with the player's own National Anti-Doping Organisation.
- 9.4. All players registered for participation in Friendly International Matches agree to undergo doping control testing. Refusal of a player to submit to a doping test shall be considered as equivalent to a positive result.
- 9.5. In case of a positive doping test the player concerned shall be suspended during investigation. Any decision about punishment shall be taken after the investigation is over, according to the applicable Anti-Doping regulations.

§ 10 BETTING

- 10.1. It is prohibited for any athletes, and their entourage, from participating in all forms of, or support for, betting or gambling related to their own Floorball matches and Floorball competitions
- 10.2. It is prohibited to use any Inside Information for betting purposes, including disclosing Inside Information to any person (with or without reward) where the athlete might reasonably be

expected to know that its disclosure could be used in relation to betting

- 10.3. The use of electronic equipment in relation to one's own match/es is limited according to the information in Section 11 of this document
- 10.4. Matches may be excluded from the betting offer of organisations under investigation or subject to sanctions for manipulations.
- 10.5. It is prohibited to bet on matches for minors (under 18 years old).
- 10.6. Sponsorship by betting operators of sports teams composed of minors (athletes under 18 years old) shall be prohibited.
- 10.7. Unauthorised betting types and formulas, following annual identification by a technical group of sport and betting experts will be determined by the IFF or Association. Betting operators will be requested not to offer these bets to punters.
- 10.8. To ensure an economic fair return from the betting operators, not only for the organisers of events, but also for the development of Floorball recognition of a "betting right" of an IFF event shall be agreed upon between the betting companies and the IFF, and for a national event between the betting companies and the National Association.
- 10.9. Sanctions for breaches of the betting regulations are according to the IFF Juridical Regulations Article 8 and 9.

§ 11 USE OF ELECTRONIC DEVICES

- 11.1. Participants' laptops, computers and similar devices and telecommunication tools including mobile phones and internet in the pre-defined restricted areas (including locker rooms) shall be turned off during the participants own matches.
- 11.2. For the purpose of statistics and player analysis only, tablets and other electronic devices may be used on team benches
- 11.3. Headsets may be used for communication between team staff within the competition venue. No communication connections with sources outside the competition venue are allowed during the time related to your match.

§ 12 REFEREES

- 12.1. All matters concerning referees in IFF Friendly International Matches shall be dealt with by the IFF Referee Committee according to valid regulations and decisions.
- 12.2. All International matches between two national teams (Adults, U23, U19) shall be refereed by an international referee pair who shall be appointed by the IFF Referee Committee. The organiser may propose preferred referee pairs, but the final decision is at the discretion of the IFF Referee Committee
- 12.3. The Referees appointed shall be included on the IFF list of International Referees. In some events, the IFF Referee Committee may appoint referees from the IFF Referee Development Group
- 12.4. The organiser of the Friendly International Matches is responsible for all costs related to the appointment of international referees, including travel, accommodation, daily allowance and insurance
- 12.5. The costs of the appointment of referees for an international club match, a national league match abroad or any other match where a national team plays versus a club or regional team from another country, shall be agreed upon by the participating teams.
- 12.6. Any breaches or infringements that occur in Friendly International Matches shall be sanctioned according to the IFF Regulations.
- 12.7. The organiser of an international club match, a national league match abroad or any other match where a national team plays versus a club or regional team from another country shall follow the respective rules of their National Association when appointing referees for these matches.
- 12.8. The hosting National Association of an international club match, a national league match abroad or any other match where a national team plays versus a club or regional team from another country, reserves the right to directly appoint referees to the matches
- 12.9. Matches involving two U17 teams do not require the appointment of international referees. The hosting National Association reserves the right to appoint referees for these matches.
- 12.10. Appointments of referees in IFF events shall in principle be made at the earliest the day before a match.
- 12.11. Random financial audits for referees may be carried out as well as regular scrutiny of their on-court decisions.

§ 13 INTEGRITY

- 13.1. The National Associations shall have regulations ensuring that they, and their clubs, fulfil their financial obligations towards their athletes and sports officials i.e. regular pay and good conditions for their professional athletes and sports officials (including referees).
- 13.2. Any person who is under prosecution for action including forgery, corruption, etc. or who has been convicted of a criminal offence within the last two years shall, to avoid conflicts of interest, not be allowed to be involved in the management of federations, clubs, associations, teams etc.

- 13.3. Random financial audits for National Associations as well as their Clubs may be carried out at any time to ensure transparency in their financial dealings.

§ 14 DISCIPLINARY MATTERS

- 14.1. The organiser of the Friendly International Match may appoint a jury to act as disciplinary function for the event
- 14.2. All sanctions imposed by referees and/or the jury shall be informed to the National Associations of the player or of the official, and to the IFF.
- 14.3. A disciplinary matter reported of any of the playing teams in a Friendly International Match shall be decided by the disciplinary function of the event.
- 14.4. A suspension decided by the event disciplinary function may not exceed 3 matches.
- 14.5. Sanctions imposed by the Jury are final as far as the duration of the competition to which they apply is concerned.

§ 15 UNFORESEEN CIRCUMSTANCES

- 15.1. In case of any unforeseen circumstance, the organiser can contact the IFF Office for assistance to solve the issue.

403.3 The goalkeeper may use any kind of protective equipment, but this shall not include parts intended to cover the goal.

Helmet and thin gloves are allowed. All forms of adhesives or friction checking substances are prohibited. No objects must be kept on or in the goal cage. The goalkeeper may not use any kind of protective equipment which covers more than the body of the goalkeeper. This includes oversized clothes, shoulder pads, etc. Zippers, pockets, straps, velcros, etc. shall be closed and tightened.

605.23 > When a player, despite summons from the referees, omits to correct their personal equipment. (no offence sign)

This includes when the administrating authority has decided that protective goggles are mandatory and a player despite summons from the referees omits to wear them correctly. This also includes when a player omits to pick up lost personal equipment at the next interruption.

In case a bench penalty is imposed the personal equipment shall be corrected before serving the bench penalty.

→ Definition of tampering to be made in 406.2

409.2 > *The team captain may request control of a hook, approval mark on a stick or face mask grill, shaft/blade combination or any tampering with the stick or blade.*

605.7 > When a team captain requests *control of a hook, approval mark on a stick or face mask grill, shaft/blade combination or any tampering with the stick or blade* and the controlled equipment is correct. (no offence sign)

The team captain will serve the penalty.

406.2 > The blade shall not be sharp, and its hook shall not exceed 30 mm.

All tampering with the blade, *except bending in longitudinal direction*, is prohibited. *Tampering includes grinding, melting or any other modification of the blade structure or its concavity.*

The hook shall be measured as the distance between the highest point of the blade's inner side and an even surface on which the stick is lying. Changing the blade is allowed if the blade is approved with the shaft and being of the same brand, but the new blade shall not be weakened. Taping the joint between the blade and the shaft is allowed, but no more than 10 mm of the visible part of the blade shall be covered

If more than one penalty is imposed simultaneously on a team, the referees decide which of the new penalties shall be measured first. TEST RULES

301.1 Players and coaches in the substitution zone

→ use 605.16 (feet on the board) and 605.21 (standing in substitution zone) to solve it

301.1 Each team is allowed to use a maximum of 20 players. These shall be noted in the match record.

*Players may be field players or goalkeepers. No other players than those noted in the match record are allowed to participate in the match or be in their own substitution zone. **Players in the substitution zone shall sit down on the players' benches unless in connection with a substitution or if clearly necessary for other reasons.***

305.1 Each team shall note, at the most, five members of the team staff in the match record. No other persons than those noted in the match record are allowed to be in their own substitution zone. With the exception of a time out a member of the team staff shall not enter the rink without the referees' permission. All coaching shall take place from the team's own substitution zone where the team staff shall be situated during the match.

Team staff shall, except when giving tactical instructions to players or when clearly necessary for other reasons, stand behind the players' benches. The referees may grant exceptions if there's not enough space in the substitution zone. Team staff is not allowed to stand in an elevated position, for example on a chair or a bench.

605.16 When a team plays with too many players on the rink. (922)

This includes when a player in the substitution zone or in the penalty bench zone places a foot on the board or in any other way passes the vertical plane from the board with any part of the body or equipment regardless of whether play is affected or not.

The team should be made aware of this before any actions are taken. Only one player shall be penalised.

605.21 When a player or a member of the team staff protests against the referees' decisions, or when coaching is performed in a disturbing or otherwise incorrect way. (925)

This includes when a member of the team staff places a foot on the board or in any other way passes the vertical plane from the board with any part of the body or equipment regardless of whether play is affected or not.

This also includes when a member of the team staff repeatedly omits to stand behind the players' benches when not giving tactical instructions to players or when it's clearly necessary for other reasons or when a member of the team staff is standing in an elevated position. The member of the team staff should be made aware of this before any actions are taken.

This also includes when a player stands up in the substitution zone except in connection with a substitution or when it's clearly necessary for other reasons. The team should be made aware of this before any actions are taken. Only one player shall be penalised.

→ to become active in SWE and SUI (testing nations) by September 2024

ZORRO

508.4 The player taking the penalty shot may play the ball an unlimited number of times and shall follow a continuous movement towards the goal cage.

Continuous implies that the player and the ball are not allowed to come to a full stop or change direction away from the goal cage simultaneously.

A zorro type move where the ball remains stationary on the blade and the ball changes direction in the air more than once is not permitted.

As soon as the goalkeeper has touched the ball or the ball has touched the front face of the goal cage, the player must not touch the ball again during the penalty shot.

If the ball hits the front face of the goal and without passing the imaginary extended goal line passes the goal line from the front, the goal shall be allowed. If the ball crosses the imaginary extended goal line, the penalty shot is over.

Game time shall be stopped during the entire penalty shot.

Report

1. Opening

Mr. Liljelund opened the meeting and welcomed all members, concluding that Ms. Mitchell is on vacation and Ms. Siriwat has not informed anything about not participating in the meeting. Mr. Klabere was asked to act as the chair for the group.

2. Making a SWOT analysis for the Calendar proposal

Mr. Liljelund informed that the IFF Office has made their own SWOT analysis of the Calendar proposal during the IFF Office Summer summit, which has been sent to the participants in advance.

The Calendar Working Group (CWG) analysed the proposal and made an SWOT analysis, in addition to the one made by the IFF Office.

It was agreed that Mr. Liljelund will collocate the two SWOT analysis into one to have a better picture of the effects of the proposal. This combined Swot is an appendix to this report.

The SWOT analysis is a living document and additions or alterations can be done during the process, so if any CWG member wants to add anything, please provide these to the Office.

The CWG also discussed some initial ideas for the implementation of the new International Calendar:

- To play the European Championships for two years 2026 Women and 2027 Men

- If the Euro is not played in 2028 or 2029, it makes it easier to enlarge the tournament for 2030 to 12 or 16 teams. This would also make it possible to be part of the Euro Championships, if Floorball is included for 2030 in Switzerland.
- When to start the implementation of the new calendar, the CWG felt that 2028 would be the easiest

3. Working plan for the CWG

The CWG discussed the road forward and agreed on the following actions to be taken and the timetable for the work. As there are a number of questions and qualification details that can't be decided prior to the Big picture decisions have been made, it will be imperative to present the Big picture proposal first and make a decision of the start of implementation before the IFF General Assembly in December. In the proposal there will be a list of decisions that will need to be taken after Big Picture decision.

The CWG decided to organise a webinar for the member federations about the proposed Calendar proposal in the end of August. Ms. Mitchell and Mr. Liljelund were given the task to prepare a summary document prior to the next CWG meeting of the proposal on general level and focusing on why the changes are proposed and what the benefits are. The proposal shall be circulated prior to the CWG meeting.

Mr. King and Mr. Liljelund will in the end of August validate that the proposal is in-line with the IFF Strategy 2021-2032 targets.

The CWG members are to think of what questions shall be given to the member federations to give feedback on prior to the next CWG meeting. The questions will be given to the members after the webinar. The webinar will also be recorded.

AGENDA

1. Opening

Mr. Liljelund opened the meeting at 14:00 CET and welcomed all members, concluding that Mr. Klabere had been named the chair of the working group in the previous meeting. Mr. Klabere started to run the meeting.

Mr. King and Mr. Karlsson were unable to participate in the meeting.

2. Possible additions to the SWOT analysis done by the CWG and the IFF office

Mr. Liljelund informed that the updated Calendar proposal SWOT has been sent to the CWG members after the previous meeting. The decision was that the SWOT analysis is a living document that can be edited accordingly. The CWG felt that we need to discuss the Calendar proposal and the Event structure first, before looking into the need to have additions made to the SWOT-analysis.

In the previous meeting the CWG also discussed some initial ideas for the implementation of the new International Calendar:

- To play the European Championships for two years 2026 Women and 2027 Men
- If the Euro is not played in 2028 or 2029, it makes it easier to enlarge the tournament for 2030 to 12 or 16 teams. This would also make it possible to be part of the Euro Championships, if Floorball is included for 2030 in Switzerland.
- When to start the implementation of the new calendar, the CWG felt that 2028 or 2030 would be the easiest

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3. Discussion on the proposed Calendar proposal Information sheet

Ms. Mitchell presented the proposal for the Calendar proposal Information sheet and explained how it has been built and the reasons for including a broader information and the WFC 4-year proposal. Ms. Pakkamol asked if the proposal will make us avoiding other global events. Ms. Mitchell and Mr. Klabere explained that we need to build the best possible calendar for Floorball, as there always will be challenges with other events. Especially as also the big events tend to change their term, making it very difficult.

4. Updated Calendar proposal

Ms. Mitchell explained that there have been some modifications made to the original Calendar proposal to better make it possible to fit in all qualifications and not to play the World Floorball Championships and logically the Euro Floorball Championships back-to-back, after the change has been introduced.

The CWG discussed the issue that with the present proposal the Women's teams from the top-ranked countries will play a WFC in 2032, Regional championships and TWG in 2033 and the next main event in 2036, creating a two-year empty time period. Mr. Suman proposed to create an empty space in the years when The World Games are played. The issue with the two-year gap is biggest for the top players, where drop-out by ending of careers could be a major issue. Ms. Mitchell will provide an alternative 4-yr timeline with the proposal documents for the CB so that there is more than one option to consider.

The logic to expand the number of teams in the WFC is to have more teams participating and a bigger interest to participate in the global qualifications if there are more spots to play for, if we move to having the WFC only every four years. Ms. Vuori felt that the enlargement of the WFC we should still wait. The CWG discussed the possibility of enlarging both the Euro Floorball Championships and the WFC. Mr. Liljelund pointed out that when the Euro Floorball Championships were decided, it was stated that an evaluation would be made after the first two events are played.

Mr. Suman felt that the creation of the global WFC qualifications, number of 20 teams in the WFC and the Regional championships every fourth year are all very interesting proposals and will bring a lot of additional values. Mr. Suman asked how the global qualification groups are drawn, Ms. Mitchell felt that it has to be done by a ballot with the pot groups divided by continent to ensure a continental mix in the qualification events.

Mr. Suman proposed that we should start to speak about the Competition structure first, even before starting to talk about the Calendar proposal. Ms. Vuori asked if the ideas to profit more from the WFC are coinciding with the Calendar proposal. Mr. Suman and Mr. Liljelund explained that there is a possibility to have more revenues and save some competitions for the members.

The CWG agreed that we should be careful in referring to the changes with different terminology. There are several different areas now being discussed: 1) Competition structure (2yr or 4yr cycle); 2) Competition calendar (when will the IFF events are played); 3) Competition formats (number of teams, qualification numbers, regional quotas etc).

The CWG discussed the Competition/Event structure in detail.

5. Preparation of the CB Calendar workshop

Mr. Liljelund concluded that the Calendar workshop will be built around the Competition structure for the future and have a decision upon that we can move forward based on this. Ms. Mitchell will prepare the material.

Ms. Mitchell will additionally prepare a WFC Timeline with the WFC and Continental championships each gender every second year.

The discussion can then continue on the Calendar proposal as there are still some interim calendar changes that should be implemented before any possible change to a 4-yr system, such as the moving of the U19 WFC to February, the adult WFC to October, and the adult WFCQ events to the latter part of the year prior to the WFC (instead of Jan/Feb).

6. Date of the Calendar webinar and duties

Ms. Mitchell felt and the CWG agreed that we need to have the webinar after CB meeting to explain about the changes. The date for the webinar will be decided in the CB.

7. Working plan for the CWG

The CWG discussed in the previous meeting about the road forward and agreed on the following actions to be taken and the timetable for the work. The CWG members were to think of what questions shall be given to the member federations to give feedback on prior to the next CWG meeting. The questions will be given to the members after the webinar. The webinar will also be recorded.

Mr. King and Mr. Liljelund will in the end of August validate that the proposal is in-line with the IFF Strategy 2021-2032 targets.

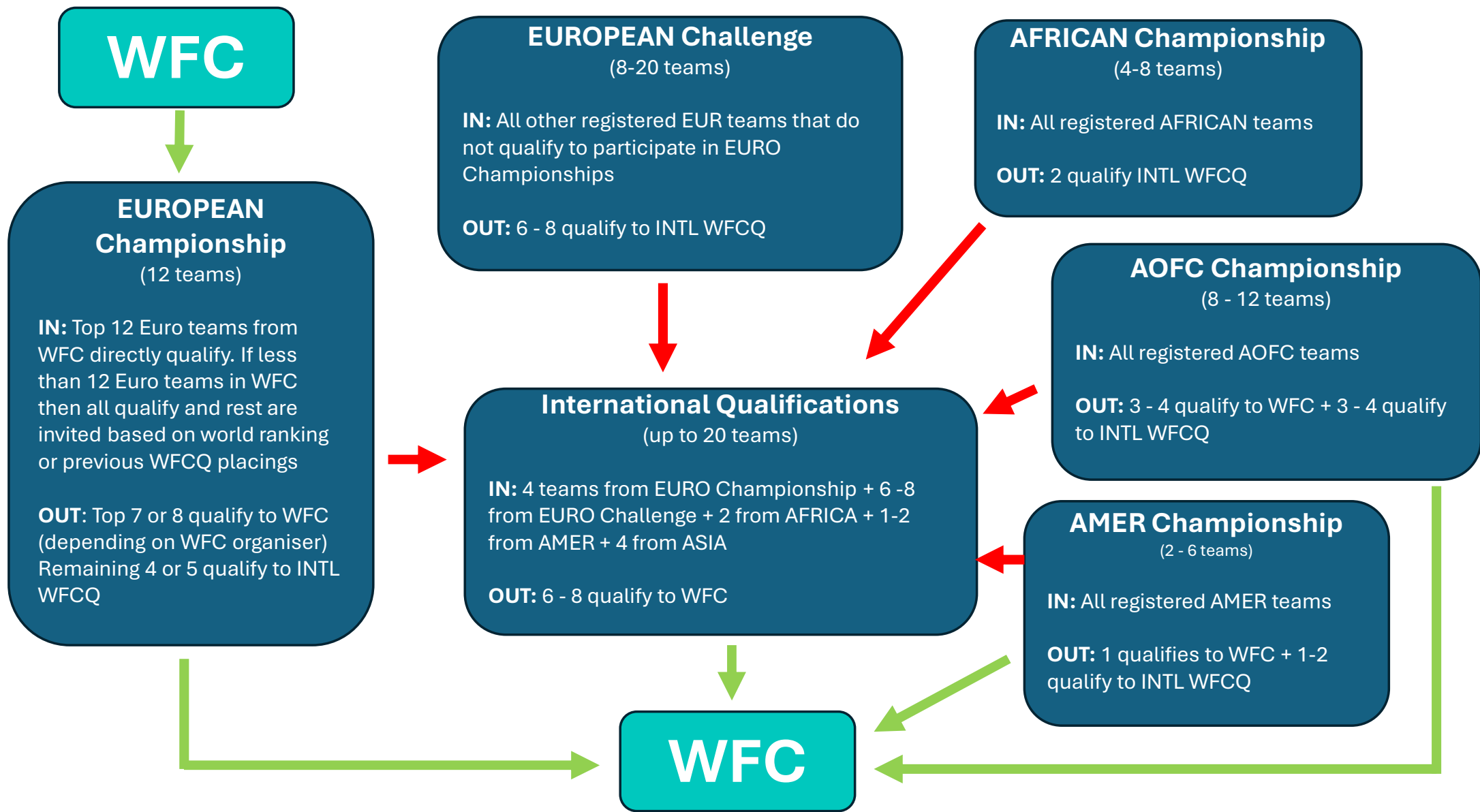

IFF Office report regarding the use of non-IFF referees for international matches

2nd July 2024

Atte Ronkanen, Sports Director of Floorball Germany, contacted Monika Kraus, IFF Competition Coordinator, via WhatsApp, advising that they had the possibility of playing some games with their Men's U19 team against a Czech club team and the national team of Slovenia. His questions included what the process was for this? Would there be a sanction for them advising of the matches so late? Was there any way to avoid the sanction? Would they be able to use their own referees?

Ms Kraus informed that there would be a sanction, the amount of which would depend on when we received the official notification of the matches, and that they could propose referees for the matches but the referees must be confirmed by the IFF and that they would need to be international referees. Mr Ronkanen replied that he would pass this information on and they would discuss further.

10th July 2024

The official request for approval of the matches between GER MU17, GER MU19 & SLO MU19 to be played on 22nd & 23rd July was received by the IFF via email from Mr Ronkanen.

(Notification received within 15 days of the matches incurs a sanction of 1000 CHF, according to the IFF Juridical Regulations.)

11th July 2024

The IFF replied that they would look into the availability of IFF international referees, but that the late notice of the match information would make it very difficult. They were asked to provide the names of the GER referees that they would like to officiate the matches as it was not included on the form.

At the same time, they were reminded of an outstanding invoice (1000 CHF) issued in April 2024 for an earlier sanction for late submission of information of international matches for their Men's U17 & U19 teams played in April against Netherlands.

Mr Veli Halonen, IFF Operations Manager, responsible for managing the nomination of international referees, replied that if they wished to use local referees then the only pair (who are recognised international referees) was Oliver Hoffmann & Toni Schnelle.

18th July 2024

Having not heard anything back from Floorball Germany, IFF sent a follow-up email asking whether they had been able to secure Hoffmann & Schnelle to referee the matches, again advising that these were the only German pair who were able to officiate the games.

19th July 2024

Mr Ronkanen advised Ms Kraus, via WhatsApp, that those referees were not available and could they not use their own referees for the games. Ms Kraus said this was not for her to decide and that she would check with Mr Halonen and Ms Sarah Mitchell, IFF Event Manager. She also informed that with such short notice that IFF would not be able to organise the referees.

22nd July 2024

Ms Kraus informed Mr Ronkanen, via WhatsApp, that if they went ahead with the matches using the German non-international pair, then there would be a fine, the amount of which would be determined by the RACC. In addition, she informed that there would be the fine for the late information of the matches (12 days prior to the games).

Mr Ronkanen confirmed that they would play the games.

Ms Kraus confirmed that a fine for the late submission would be sent to them and that the issue of the use of the non-international referees would be referred to the Referee Committee to decide on the penalty.

The IFF sent an invoice for the 1000 CHF, as well as a reminder of an outstanding invoice from May (300 CHF) again for the late submission of information of international matches of their Men's U19 team playing matches against Denmark.

SUMMARY & RECOMMENDATION

While the IFF Competition office appreciate that the possibility to play these matches with the junior teams did come quite late for the team management and the association representatives, and that everyone involved was focussed on giving their young players the opportunity of international experience, it was clearly informed on several occasions that both the late informing of the matches, as well as the use of non-international referees would come with a sanction, according to the IFF Juridical Regulations.

Mr Halonen had made some informal inquiries for the availability of other international referees in central Europe but nobody that he spoke to was available at such short notice. Athlete to Athlete mentorship covers a broad range of sports and has demonstrated a high retention rate, emphasising its effectiveness in filling a void in the market and creating meaningful mentor-mentee relationships in the athletic community.

Recruitment of Mentees: (not for the testing phase)

1. The recruitment of Mentees will begin immediately after its announcement of the program, which will state the period it will cover.
2. During the recruitment period, interested candidates must declare their interest by sending their declaration of interest and required documents to the provided email address.
3. Additionally, the IFF ATC can invite athletes it considers suitable for the Mentees profile.

Language Skills:

- English proficiency
- Alternatively, IFF ATC will match Mentors with Mentees sharing the same native language.

Operation of ATC Buddy Program:

1. Mentoring officially starts when the IFF ATC notifies the Mentee of their assigned Mentor. The Participants should meet shortly after to determine the Mentoring's specific operations and get to know each other.
2. Both Mentor and Mentee would receive topics of their meetings before the first get to know each other online meeting.
3. Contact between the Mentor and Mentee will be digital with the frequency of 1 per month.
4. Participation in the Program is voluntary, and Participants are not remunerated for their work.
5. Mentors, and Mentees must treat all data received and information shared during the Mentoring confidentially.

Guiding principle:

Despite the responsibilities outlined in this document, the Program is based on a principle of procedural flexibility, meaning decisions agreed upon by the Mentor and Mentee take precedence over the regulation in these matters.

The IFF Athletes' Commission will support the Mentoring processes, assisting participants as needed via check-ins, email, text messages, short calls.

proposal:

Testing Period:

- Maximum of 8 pairs (16 athletes in total: 8 buddies and 8 future stars)
- Initial selection of players by the IFF ATC, with potential for the program to become open for everyone to sign up in the future.
- ATC members to oversee monthly check-ins, addressing any challenges and ensuring meetings occur, pair each ATC member with one pair Mentor-Mentee
- Introduce the idea to the athletes picked by ATC, share topics to discuss in each of the meetings and invite them to the program.
- Possible start at the beginning of the 2024/25 season

Buddy (Mentor) Toolkit:

- Technical requirements: stable internet connection, computer
- Knowledge of Teams or Google Meetings usage
- Ability to cover eight suggested topics, dedicating 1-2 hours each month from September 2024 to April 2025

Suggested Monthly Topics:

1. Introduction:

- Get to know each other: share how and why you started playing floorball.
- Discuss favourite positions on the field, equipment preferences (what stick do you use? why?), and ask simple questions to build athlete to athlete connection

2. Daily Routine of a Top Floorball Player:

- Discuss sleep, nutrition, mental preparation, special rituals, games, training, and balancing free time with friends and family.

3. Overcoming Challenges:

- Share experiences of overcoming difficult moments in your career (excluding injuries, which is a separate topic).

4. Inspiring Moments:

- Talk about the most inspiring moment of your floorball career.

5. Balancing School and Floorball:

- Discuss time management strategies for balancing school and training effectively.

6. Dealing with Injuries:

- Share personal stories or experiences of teammates overcoming serious injuries and the support they or you received.
- How was it to come back to the floorball field?

7. Handling Mistakes:

- Discuss how to cope with mistakes during the game, such as missing a goal or a penalty shot, or receiving a penalty yourself.

8. Dealing with Coaching Decisions:

- Discuss how to handle being benched during a game or not being selected for the national team.

End of testing period:

After 8 meetings of each pair.

- Online check in with ATC members and all participants of the program to share their experience and feedback.
- Future decisions on how to proceed.

1. Summary of the meeting discussions on various topics

- Meeting with John Liljelund - Secretary General - discussion on the ATC contributions, rules, the decisions making process. In the future ATC to be invited to the CB workshops.
- Meeting with Mr. Thomas Eriksson - IFF president - ATC had a chance to meet with IFF President and have very active discussion on the ongoing matters within IFF, rules of the game and important for players topics
- Discussion about Activity Rule: At first, as ATC wanted to come up with our own version of the Activity Rule, but it was a bit difficult honestly speaking, so we discussed a bit more of what the approach should be.

We looked at the below rule that already exists: 5.21

21) When a team delays play. (924) This includes when a team plays in a systematically passive way behind their own goal cage. The team should, if possible, be made aware of this before any actions are taken. **We think that this rule could be expanded into something that would be an activity rule. How: for example to extend the area, going from *behind their own goal cage* to *half of the field*.** We are not in favor of introducing anything that would require additional lines on the field of play or anything that is related to fixed time (amount of seconds counting down like in basketball). In general, we think that something similar to the activity rule in handball could be beneficial for testing in floorball, but unfortunately we do not have a full proposal ready from our side. Of course the referee sign would have to be something to discuss here as well, to make it simple and visible as what they do in handball we already use for other kinds of situations.

2. Rules change discussion and future plans:

We went through the process of rules changes with Sergio explaining what happened during the Reference Group meeting. The official finalised list will be shared at the end of May and we decided to meet then to go through the list. During that meeting we will also take a look at the existing rules to deliver our feedback to IFF on which rules are not needed in the book.

Agata will send doodle to find the date for meeting beginning of June, so we can go through the rules list.

3. International Calendar discussion:

We shortly touched upon needs of big updated to the international calendar.

We understand need for changes, although, there was not much support from the Asian part of ATC with the biggest argument being that it would be challenging for Asian teams to meet European teams as the level of AOFC cup is lower than WFC.

On a positive note, we believe this could keep players active for a longer time? Difficult to say, but the argument was that you usually want to play WFC to retire after, so it would keep some players around for longer. But the effect can also be opposite.

We also believe that this decision might not be supported by European countries ranked 5 - 10? as they have less international games than top4 and many of them are not part of the bigger tournaments such as World Games and would be in favor of playing WFC every second year.

But again, we understand the need for this change and we will support it.

4. Player of the Year

We took a look at the current proposal(s) for the player of the year award and came with a couple of comments/feedback to the idea in general:

- We think it could be great opportunity to show top10 players of the year - announcement could take place throughout time period (use 1-2 weeks and make an announcement each day, every second day?). We think that this could give visibility to players from other countries than top4, for example Latvia
- Innebandymagazinet player of the year is being announcement in January - shall IFF focus on player of the season and the voting + announcement could take place when season ends?
- Would IFF player of the year be totally separated from what Innebandymagazinet is doing, or shall we work together?

5. Social media

Unfortunately, there was not time to catch up with IFF social team during the tournament, but we managed to have some individual conversations with the IFF social media crew we decided to:

- Invite IFF social media to one of our meetings to create closer connection with ATC
- Plan in advance activities and ATC presence on IFF social media during the events

- Who are our buddies? To start with we would like to reach to players and pick them, until we could let it run by itself - ATC members to take lead on checkups with players if monthly catch up took place. Buddy target group: national teams players, top leagues, both male and female
- Have an amount of spots available for testing period. Depending on how many players would like to test this.
- Possible start: beginning of the next season 24/25
- Buddy toolkit: list of topics - to cover 1 topic per meeting: 1. what is 24/7 of a top floorball player 2. How did you go through a difficult moment of your career? 3. The most inspiring moment 4. How are/did you combining school with floorball & training 5. How do you pass through a serious injury (how do you come back?) - if applicable 6. how to handle it if you make mistake in the game? 7. What if your coach decide to put you on the bench? 8. How you should react when national team coach doesn't choose you?

Next steps:

Agata to finalize the idea based on the group discussion we had in Lahti, gather feedback from the office and the next step would be to present the idea to some of the players from our network we would reach out to. Hoping they would sign up to test this project.

Elite vs Fun & Future

- More teams from one country = fun, but not serious
- SSL players vs leisure players = not serious, and felt a bit unclear if serious or not
- 47 Goals in 2x 10 min = not serious
- LAT won, SWE W with a close game against LAT in ¼ final. New Z winning against CZE, SWE not winning etc.=> it was closer, exactly what we needed
- Countries that never could play a WFC (Spain, Burkina Faso...) have the chance to participate and play against big nations
- Countries that don't have people or money to come to a 5 vs 5 WFC can do it here, amazing!
- Challenging for federations, how much to focus on this tournament. Again, question of how serious this WFC should be.
- If we want to grow, it might be the right thing to do (our new beach volleyball)
- A, B even C division with final of each of them granting qualification to higher division
- For the future, I would strongly suggest mixed games as it is a trend in sports and this can aim at the Youth Olympic Games.
- To avoid the conflict between elite and fun, the IFF should create some kind of clear rules for player's nomination into the national team, which all nations will follow; the image of 3 vs.3 WFC cannot be destroyed by freedom of sending groups of friends into this event.
- From the Spaniards players, fun to play against big nations.
- An agreement among IFF and Federations to set the rules to participate in the tournament once they decide what direction to take (elite, fun, A-B-C divisions..)
- Maybe it will be nice to have "divisioning" in this kind of tournament. This is an idea from the Special Olympics. If we do divisioning the small nations can play against big nations in the group stage, then we can also have serious play-offs. Let's read the link about divisioning.
- Speed is one of core attractions for floorball, meaning that we do not need more speed in floorball, but simpler rules are needed to attract more spectators.

Referees

- 1 difficult, would be better with 2
- Good that in the finals there were 2 refs
- Need education but was quite good for the first time
- More things are allowed on the other side of the refs position
- Some refs were clearly communicating team's jerseys colours + showing which goalkeeper shout do the throw (it was very helpful, considering this is very new rule)
- Referees developed their work during the tournament, what was positive- it will be important to educate them a bit earlier before next WFC about speed of the game, how to keep the flow and clear advices for players and also for scoreboard, because they do also hell of the job during those crazy fast games.
- It was nice to have a woman ref for the men's games
- For me, the game was too fast to follow. Referees seem not to call many fouls because of the speed of the game. Too many calls will ruin the speed of the game, but too few calls will ruin the game as the game might become too aggressive and too violent. It will also be good for spectators to understand the game a bit better with some poses after the whistle.

Infrastructure:

- Cool under 1 roof, great to have all fields so close, but better space to warm up needed
- Centre court, could have a bit more space to watch the game
- Nice to also have U19 under 1 roof. In an ideal case (bigger U19 arena) it could be for free to watch U19 for the participants of 3vs3
- Music during final was unnecessary, but there were some comments that music was great to have
- Lockers facilities could have been located inside the building, not to shower, but just change clothes + storage space
- Small tribunes around each field, smaller than around rink1, but still giving a chance for spectators to have good view, there were some exciting games on other rink than 1 when many people gathered to watch
- The pilot and very first time project "survived" very well. small fields next to each others were cool, under one roof perfect
- Other comments about music, great to have, but not in final games
- More stands to watch the 3vs3 around all fields.
- During the finals many people stood around.
- More 3vs3 games streamed

- Talked to many players and they said 10 min was just about right, shorter would be more lucky winners (around 20 players)

- It would have been appreciated to have some more time between the games (10 min) so that you have some time on the field
- Some comments that it would have been nice to play a sudden death instead of directly penalty shoots for playoffs
- Proposal for sudden death: 3 min (no golden goal)

Team size

- Comments on that one more field player in the team roster will work, so they can have 3 lines of 3
- 8 and 2 were good (most of the players), 1 said it was too many games or more people would be needed

Rules

- Faster thanks to the ball pack on the goal and the goalie starting, I was sceptical about this but I liked it! Also almost all comments were positive about that!!
- Ball bags can be hard to reach if almost empty for small goalkeepers! Also 2 others said this could be improved. What was good was that even if the goal fell down, not all balls were falling out. In some of the games goalkeepers really had to do a lot of squats to reach the ball many times.
- It was on the edge of being dangerous, it was a lot allowed with the body and should maybe be reduced a bit.
- Penalty, good solution
- Should a goalie really be able to score?
- How early can you take a ball as a goalkeeper?
- If these are the new rules, should CH and FIN adjust it or do we have 2 rules
- Free Shots in the middle: here I got diverse feedback, some said the physical game was really hard and you only got a free shot in the middle, others said that this is too big of a chance there free shots in the middle
- Got some comments about that it is tricky with the running time, you can systematically change with free shots
- Idea to have effective time in the last minute of the game, some teams were really playing passive in the last minute
- Shall 2 min penalty be 1 min with this short playing time?
- Idea to allow goalkeeper throw the ball without the rule that it needs to touch the floor before middle line
- There was a running discussion already during the first games about the distance of the penalty spot: most of the answers were about putting the spot a bit further from the goal (maybe to the middle-spot of the ring?).
- Many hard faults without penalty min
- 2 refs for all the games, not just the final or final rounds.
- Complaints about some teams losing time because of the running time.
- From the spectators' view, it can be hard to understand that goalies throw the ball when the ball is out. Also, they can think about why a player starts the ball from the middle line when a foul happens somewhere else.

- Too many games in one day. Some teams played their first game at 8:00am and the last one at 21:00 pm.
- One more day of competition. More time to rest, watch other games, visit the host city

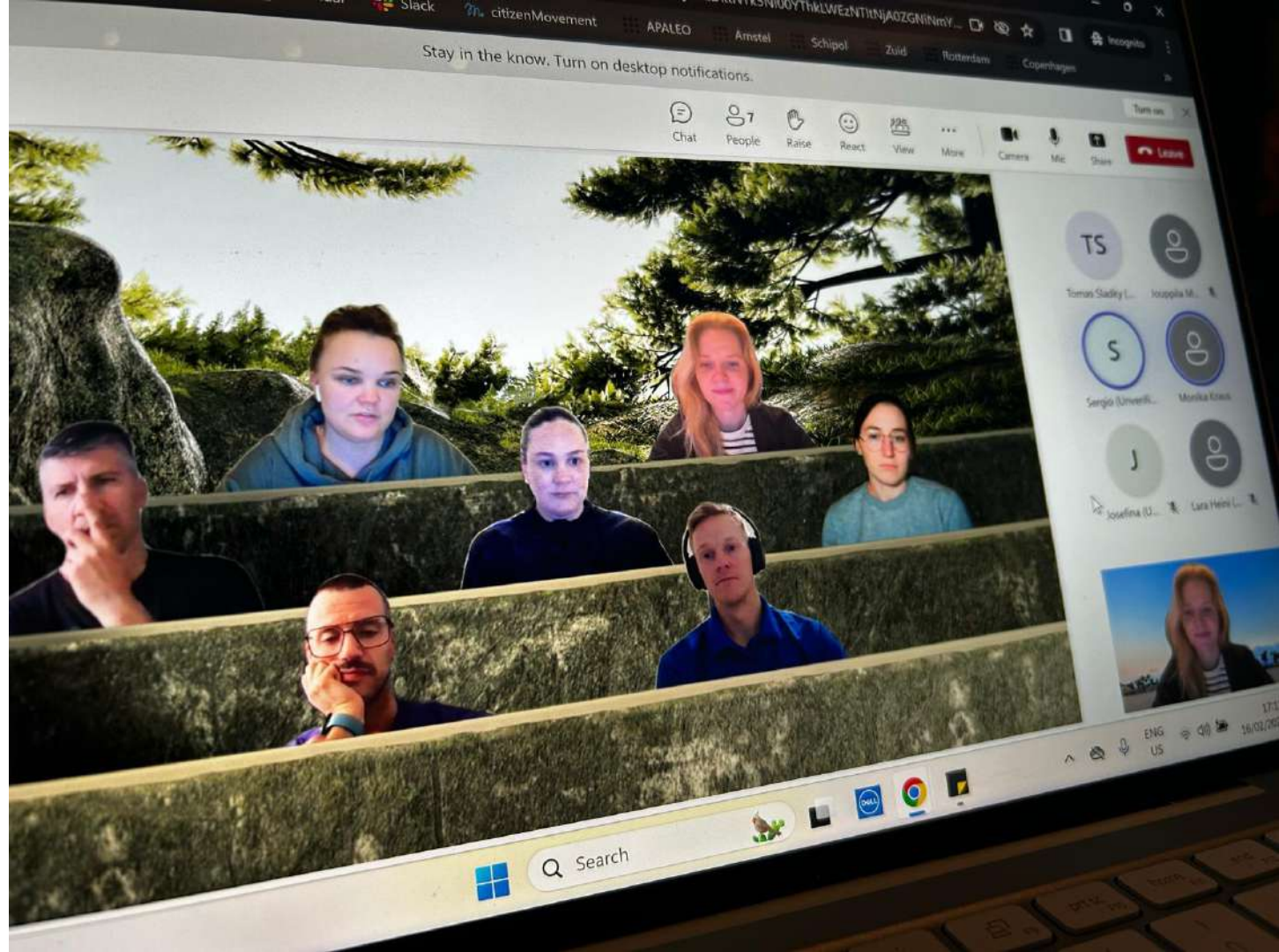



- Provide a reflection on the process, its quality, and usefulness at the end of the Program.

Recruitment of Mentees: *(not for the testing phase)**

1. The recruitment of Mentees will begin immediately after its announcement of the program, which will state the period it will cover.
2. During the recruitment period, interested candidates must declare their interest by sending their declaration of interest and required documents to the provided email address.
3. Additionally, the IFF ATC can invite athletes it considers suitable for the Mentees profile.

Language Skills:

- English proficiency
- Alternatively, IFF ATC will match Mentors with Mentees sharing the same native language.

Operation of ATC Buddy Program:

1. Mentoring officially starts when the IFF ATC notifies the Mentee of their assigned Mentor. The Participants should meet shortly after to determine the Mentoring's specific operations and get to know each other.
2. Both Mentor and Mentee would receive topics of their meetings before the first get to know each other online meeting.
3. Contact between the Mentor and Mentee will be digital with the frequency of 1 per month.
4. Participation in the Program is voluntary, and Participants are not remunerated for their work.
5. Mentors, and Mentees must treat all data received and information shared during the Mentoring confidentially.

Guiding principle:

2. Daily Routine of a Top Floorball Player:

- Discuss sleep, nutrition, mental preparation, special rituals, games, training, and balancing free time with friends and family.

3. Overcoming Challenges:

- Share experiences of overcoming difficult moments in your career (excluding injuries, which is a separate topic).

4. Inspiring Moments:

- Talk about the most inspiring moment of your floorball career.

5. Balancing School and Floorball:

- Discuss time management strategies for balancing school and training effectively.

6. Dealing with Injuries:

- Share personal stories or experiences of teammates overcoming serious injuries and the support they or you received.
- How was it to come back to the floorball field?

7. Handling Mistakes:

- Discuss how to cope with mistakes during the game, such as missing a goal or a penalty shot, or receiving a penalty yourself.

8. Dealing with Coaching Decisions:

- Discuss how to handle being benched during a game or not being selected for the national team.

End of testing phase:

After 8 meetings of each pair.

- Online check in with ATC members and all participants of the program to share their experience and feedback.
- Future decisions on how to proceed.

Start and end of testing phase:

September 2024 – April 2025

Next steps:

Evaluation of testing phase, decisions for the future and next steps to be taken.

Abstract:
The project aims to bridge the gap between larger, well-established floorball federations and smaller, financially constrained ones. It focuses on sharing knowledge and experiences to enhance diversity, participation, and inclusion in coach education and player development. The collaboration involves top floorball federations, Eerikkilä Sport Institute, and the International Floorball Federation. Smaller and mid-sized countries (Denmark, Germany, Poland, Slovakia, Italy, Ukraine, Spain, Austria, Belgium) play a crucial role in providing practical insights and addressing challenges unique to their environments. The goal is to create a concrete action plan for coach education and new game formats, with an emphasis on implementation in countries where floorball is less developed. The project recognizes the potential for growth in floorball, especially in schools and NGOs, and aims to tailor solutions to the specific needs of smaller nations.

The project is highly relevant as it addresses a few horizontal as well as sport-specific priorities of the action. The project will contribute to equality and is relevant for the further development of shared EU values. The profiles of all participating organizations are well suited and relevant for the topic of the proposal.

The project outlines the needs of the participating associations as well as the overall needs of the Floorball community. The proposed work plan is complementary to other initiatives already conducted by the consortium members. Given the large dispersion of the participating countries, the project will undoubtedly provide a unique platform to enable EU added value. Nevertheless, the need analysis is poorly developed and lacking a sound description of the educational situation of coaches in the participant countries. In particular, it is not clear from the proposal if the participant countries really need the results of the project. Additionally, considering the presented responsibility of coaching concept, it has not been explained which specific problems are present in the participant countries.

Criterion 2.1 QUALITY — PROJECT DESIGN AND IMPLEMENTATION

Score: **21.00** (Threshold: 15 / 30.00 , Weight: -)

The detailed criteria are set out in the call conditions (see Call document).

The objectives are generally well defined and clearly address the needs of the national as well as international association. The proposed work plan is clear, effective and implements appropriate project phases. The project includes appropriate plans for control and evaluation measures to ensure the successful attainment of its objectives. Nevertheless, the project does not demonstrate adequately the project cost-efficiency and the presence of budget monitoring and financial measures are very generic.

The inclusion aspects are not sufficiently developed and the digital aspect remain underdeveloped. The proposal fails to identify useful digital tools available, for instance in the Erasmus+ online platforms. It does not identify the appropriate strategies to ensure that project will be conducted in an eco-friendly manner. While the learning platform development is appropriate, the arrangements for the recognition and validation of participants' learning outcomes is not defined well.

Criterion 2.2 QUALITY — PARTNERSHIP AND COOPERATION ARRANGEMENTS

Score: **18.50** (Threshold: 10 / 20.00 , Weight: -)

The detailed criteria are set out in the call conditions (see Call document).

The project consortia represent an excellent team and will ensure the dissemination of the project results among the grass-roots organization in Europe and their coaches. Overall, the project consortium is excellently developed, it includes relevant stakeholders from numerous countries including participating organization from a third country that undoubtedly adds value to the present proposal. The budget and task allocation ensures effective contribution from the consortium members. The coordination and communication strategies are well developed and appropriate to the scale and aims of the project. The proposal nevertheless fails to clearly demonstrate the participation of newcomers and less experienced organization to the action.

Criterion 3 - IMPACT

Score: **25.00** (Threshold: 13 / 25.00 , Weight: -)

The detailed criteria are set out in the call conditions (see Call document).

The proposal includes appropriate and logical steps to integrate the project results into daily workflow of all participating national organisations. Based on the envisaged and well developed outcomes, the project will undoubtedly positively affect participants as well as the wider community. The developed curricula and other educational material is beneficial for the implementation of floorball into school systems and will also be used in competitive and recreational domains to enhance participation and improve the work quality in the sport. The dissemination strategy is well developed and the established outputs will be made available acknowledging the European Union funding. The project sustainability beyond the project funding phase is optimal.

Marketing Function Report/Tero Kalsta 8.9.2024

Sales Overview

The challenging market situation remains unchanged with economic uncertainty, but the decreasing inflation and interest rates are positive signs. Local organisers have proven that floorball events can produce good results, and this trend remains with new partnerships for the WFC 2024 and 2025. The IFF has also been able to start and keep up negotiations however the number of cases is not that high, and closing is hard.

Sales Status

Good cooperation with the Swedish Federation continues, we have some potential companies to offer visibility elements which belong to the IFF. Early summer there have been further conversations with Red Carpet Brand Alliance (RCBA) as not much has happened so far. They indicated that the 2026 and 2027 events taking place in Finland creates a good base for sales activities towards Nordic companies and said to create a top potential list of 20 companies. RCBA were submitted updated IFF materials however not much activity.

The IFF is continuously in contact with companies that have been sponsors in past events (Dachser and Fisherman's Friend (repeat the referee wear for 2026/27)) and pushing for new ones (e.g. iFolor). During summer we have had good meetings for example with Vitamin Well (drink) and Kuusakoski (recycling company) and have submitted suggestions for ways to collaborate. The sustainability angle is an on-going approach and further discussions have been held with Swappie, (serviced 2nd hand phones) and Oatly (oat-based products). We are also still trying to create smaller income sources with offering targeted campaigns (country-specific) for the IFF App (tested for WFC 2023 / Fleurop).

As sponsorship revenue has been limited and the financial structure for the IFF will change (headquarter set up with the Finnish Federation and the financial support that will most likely decrease) there is a need evaluate alternative models to create revenue. Going forward at least three options can be considered:

- Based on good local sales results, increase the ad space the LOC receives (with a IFF commission)
- Create a combined sales model with EFT countries where we could include added visibility in other IFF events (which could attract brands to operate on multiple markets / revenue share model)
- Investigate new possible (European) Sports Marketing Agencies as sales agents. A few agencies have been contacted and an inquiry to the European Sponsorship Association has been sent (they have a tens of agencies as members).

Over the summer IFF has discussed with Protocol Sports, in good spirits, about the future of the TV and streaming rights distribution agreement. We have expressed the possibility to renew the agreement but with different terms (most importantly the agreement period and termination). The

IFF requested a proposal based on these wishes. A month later we received a memo which to our surprise referred to the renewal clause in the agreement and insists that the agreement has been renewed for further five years based on the accrued gross revenue. Further, they suggest to also include our existing top country TV agreements into the agreement. This makes no sense to the IFF as in our perception there would be no room to negotiate better terms, and we would then also need to pay commission from these deals that we have made ourselves. As they also had not considered our wishes on new agreement terms the IFF, after legal consultation, has decided to terminate the contract. Mr Liljelund has mapped other distribution agencies, so we have alternative solutions.

In the future IFF will offer the national federations the possibility to include national sponsors in the IFF App visible for country-specific users (based on user's phone prefix) on a 50/50 revenue share basis. Further IFF will offer non-IFF event organisers the possibility to stream matches on the IFF App. It has proven to be a good model to offer organisers access to a floorball audience, increases the content offering and generates some revenue for both parties.

The Champions Cup is not generating interest for partnerships. The numbers for the events in terms of spectators and stream visibility (in general) are not convincing. And there is still the possible conflict of competing brands as the regulations define the use of local flooring and rinks (and possible exclusive agreements of clubs e.g. Storvreta/Nike). Furthermore, it has also become clear that creating material for all events, especially in the early stages with many matches and different venues is quite time-consuming.

Based on the idea to create new revenue streams for the IFF the first organiser agreements with a commission on ticket sale income have been negotiated (U19 WFC 2025 / WFC 2025). Further clauses are also introduced whereby the IFF is entitled to a commission of sponsorship revenue above a certain target amount.

Marketing Status

Cooperation with the existing IFF sponsors is continuing well. In 2024 all events are already played according to plan on the new dark blue floor. The Gerflor LinkedIn post series on floorball has so far had one post but more should be coming. We are pushing them material now when the WFC 2024 approaches. PUMA Nordic is going to propose to deliver some additional material for the WFC 2024 referees e.g. shoes. Further, depending on WFC schedules in Malmö there would be the opportunity for stakeholders to visit the PUMA Nordic facilities in Helsingborg. PUMA is still thinking of creating selected IFF-products as an own "product line" which might also be partially connected to the 40th IFF anniversary in 2026. There is also a preliminary discussion of a possible web shop integration into the IFF website (white label web shop solution with selected referee and IFF items). This platform could also serve for distribution of the customised IFF-products from PUMA. The IFF also continues to assist PUMA to find leads within the floorball community.

The next CCMNG meeting is in Malmö 29th of August. The agenda will consist of sales and marketing related topics, success cases and development ideas/possibilities. The possible new sales models (for example combines sales) will also be discussed.

The idea of connecting national federation sponsors via a networking event has moved forward. This will take place on the 12th of December at the Malmö Arena (Appendix: WFC 2024 Federation Sponsor Networking invitation_v1.0_external). We expect to have 40-50 people attending. First there will be official programme ensued with networking in the VIP area (and possibility to watch the quarter-final match).

The IFF has actively been in contact with the clubs participating in the Champions Cup 2025 to make sure the venues have good presentation of the CC2025 image. The material is predominantly for digital surfaces (screens / LED panes) and the IFF has tried to accommodate the varying material needs in the venues. Further teams / clubs have been reminded of existing templates for social media purposes. Working with several organisers (compared to one final event / LOC) clearly creates a lot of extra work, not only for marketing, but all IFF departments.

The IFF media team has been active in promoting the Champions Cup and it has been nice to see that teams have been somewhat active. Due to active measures from IFF media on CC Instagram it received almost 800k views in the period between 19.-27.8 with 16% being followers and 84% non-followers (!!!).

The launch of the 3V3 WFC was a success, brand and logo included. The plan is to use the same logo also for future 3v3 events but leave some room for the LOC to adapt the colour. A guideline for LOCs is ready and has been submitted to the next organising committee. After further investigation of the existing IFF sponsor agreements the rights are covered for PUMA, but other branches create opportunities for next partners. Big potential for floorball brands and we need to discuss this with the existing partner and then with others to map the full picture.

Report on present issues

1. Opening and short presentation (JB)

Mr. Beer opened the meeting and welcomed the members to the second meeting of 2024, thanking the Swedish federation and Magnus Nilsson for making it possible for us to be here.

2. Approval of the agenda (JB)

The agenda was approved with some additions to be discussed during the Country reports.

3. Minutes from the previous meeting (JB)

The minutes of the previous meeting were sent on the 25.1.2024., and as there has not been any comments they are therefore approved.

4. IFF Sales situation, Quick review (IFF/TK)

Mr. Kalsta reported the sales of IFF commercial rights. There have been no new sales unfortunately.

There are ongoing discussions with a number of companies, but it has been very difficult to get closure of any agreements. Mr. Beer asked what the main reason is for not reaching agreement. Mr. Kalsta explained that companies don't want to start anything new, but just staying with the ones they have. Apart from the negotiations, the most difficult thing is to open the door to the companies.

The cooperation with RCBA has not produced any results, which is a quite big disappointment. In the summer there has been made a shortlist of 20 companies, but there has been no response so far.

Mr. Kalsta has reached out to the European Sponsorship Association, to ask them to connect with their member agencies and Sales Rights.

Mr. Kalsta introduced a few ideas of how the IFF could gain some more sponsorship revenue

- To look over the sales system together with the Event organisers
- Provide additional inventory from the IFF's and give it to the LOC
- Change the system of the WFC agreements.

Mr. Liljelund explained the need for additional sponsorship revenue for IFF.

Mr. Urbar explained that it is often so that the headquarters of the potential companies are not familiar with Floorball. Floorball is also going towards the youth and the digital inventory, especially talking about activation and spread.

Mr. Liljelund asked if IFF should work with different channels to raise the awareness among the Sports market.

Mr. Urbar felt that we need to build on the activation, when we are striving for more visibility and awareness. Mr. Kihm asked what the sponsors want. Mr. Ubrar answered brand exposure, content creation/activation on social media (work done by CF), CSR or create some special product. CF is making a player value system for the club with KFC, which could be used for the WFC.

Mr. Toivonen felt it would be a positive idea to open up for the national federations to sell together with the IFF. Mr. Winberg felt that in Denmark the issue is that the companies think Floorball is too small.

5. New IFF media platform /(IFF/TK)

Mr. Kalsta presented the current situation of the IFF App, which has 66.997 register users now and the sales has been 40 k/2022, 128 l/2023 and YTD 75k

- National league content on the IFF app (Match of the Week/Month)
- Experiences from national streaming platforms

Mr. Wangnet felt that the IFF should have some kind of interaction with the audience before, during and after the match. The German have found that the audience stays on if there is more content in between the periods. Also, the idea of activation Apparel Sponsor with creating new activation models during the events.

Mr. Beer felt that the idea Mr. Wangnet' idea is very good and IFF needs to actively seek for these kind of initiatives. as none of the companies will come to ask for this.

Mr. Kihm presented the possibilities for the national federations to use the IFF App for their sponsors visibility based on a shared revenue (50/50 or 60/40). The team sponsor is shown to everyone and a video only for the App users for from the Teams country. Mr. Beer felt that we should have the offer from the IFF for the national associations for this opportunity. There should be no basic required fee for participation and the revenue split would be 60/40 for the National Association.

6. New Champions Cup concept (TK/JL)

Mr. Kalsta gave a shot report on the Champions Cup 2014-2025. The visibility has been quite positive for the first weekend in the Northern Conference.

The sales of sponsorship have been difficult, as the number of spectators, followers on social media creates the problem of too little visibility for the Event.

Mr. Kihm asked what number of spectators we could reach with playing just one Champions Cup game in each stage in a third country, as for example the female game Pixbo – TPS had 182 spectators. Both Mr. Wangnet and Mr. Winberg felt a solution like this would be possible, being profitable for the club, not the Federation.

The CCMNG discussed the different aspects of the Champions Cup and the need and reasons for it, but also the challenges of the Champions Cup format.

7. The World Games 2025

Mr. Kalsta gave the recent development of TWG 2025 and how the promotion is progressing. Mr. Liljelund urged the member federations to promote The World Games in connection to the promotion of the upcoming WFC 2024, which is the qualification

tournament for the men. The IFF will deliver the TWG 2025 promotion material to federations. In 2029 TWG returns to Europe (Karlsruhe) and will be huge opportunity for floorball.

Mr Liljelund also highlighted that each country should seek information from their respective National Olympic Committees as participation in the TWG qualification might create eligibility for financial support.

8. World Floorball Championships / content and co-communication (TK)

How can we leverage our events together in favour of floorball in general? (past events / road towards upcoming events)

We are approaching the anniversaries of the first WFC (30th) and IFF (40th) in 2026. For this the IFF will collect old material and national federation archives will certainly be useful. A separate contact will be made to the media department / persons.

Experience from the 3v3 WFC

Mr. Urbar feels that there should be an agreement for the national rules for qualifications, whether the top players can participate or not. Mr. Beer feels that we need to have clearer rules from IFF who can play in the 3v3.

It was brought forward how important it is for the IFF to define the long-term goal for the targets with 3v3, which will help the federations to develop.

9. IFF Marketing and Sustainability (TK)

Mr Kalsta reported the current focus areas in sustainability,

The WFC 2024 has created a Sustainability Policy for the Event in Malmö. The LOC is encouraging ticket buyers about sustainability aspects already when buying the tickets. The ticket holders will not be able to have the access to the collective traffic in Malmö, as the price for this will be too high.

The Erasmus+ GAMES project will organise a its final conference during the Event and there are ideas to promote the work done by the GAMES project during the Event

10. Quantum Consultancy: Review on the event studies (TK)

Mr. Kalsta made a short presentation of the key takeaways from the WFC 2023 Event report made by Quantum Consultancy.

- Cumulative TV audience was really good 5,4M (this was very good regarding the time-zone difference)
- TV takers from non-participating countries (CAN, CHN, INA, SLO)
- Unfortunately, spectator numbers low 21,628 (lack of marketing)
- Social media (impressions / engagements) close to WFC 2021
- Event made a deficit of ~550k€
 - Revenue from ticketing just 8,5% / sponsorship 33%

11. Country updates (ALL)

Each country can present a best practise case or a success case (knowledge sharing)

Denmark (Floorball Danmark)

- Has made a five-year contract with Unihoc for the Sport Apparel and will make an agreement about shoes with Mizuno or Kempe
- The FD is creating a local sponsor team, built-up by Floorball people from different companies.
- FD has joined a project of DIF, called a Business Club, which helps with looking for sponsors.
- Working with Sportway for Floorball TV and making a campaign to get more visibility
- Looking to host an international event for 2027 or later in Arena Nord in Frederikshavn.
- There are some Danish companies that have put some money for a “second chance”

- program, Floorball is part of this in four cities, working with people with special needs.
- The IIHF World Championships is played in Denmark in 2025, there will be a legend game between the best Danish Floorball and former NHL players.
 - The events in Denmark doesn't are not profitable for the federation, so the FD has now started profit sharing with the clubs.
 - FD has hired admin and referee persons from other federations, from Badminton and Handball,
 - FD will participate with the 3v3 championship (IFF format) in the DIF National Championships in Århus. The Event consist of 40 sports and over 2000 athletes. Possible visibility on national tv.

Germany (Floorball Germany)

- The Street Floorball tour was played for the third time and the last event was played in the Austrian city of Salzburg. The event was sold out and now planning to expand the series, going to France and maybe Netherlands in the future
- FG has a new employee for sponsorship, coming from Puma. She works 50/50 for FG and Hyrox (www.hyrox.com)
- The National Team player Flemming Kühl organised an event, which was a huge success, which FG will support this for the coming years
- The opening of the Czech Super League (Tatran – Bohemians) will be played in Chemnitz, Germany.

Switzerland

- SUHV is running a cooperation with the company Funduu, where people can donate for example 5 CHF, for each point the club gains during the season. The club gets the money after the season. Expectations that this will work better this year, as there was issues last year with high administration fees.
- SUHV will start to introduce the Live Stream Pro for the streaming, with Pay per View for yearly, monthly and day passes for the National league. It will be run on the Sportwik platform.
- The Lidl deal is up for renegotiation for the season 2025-2026 and SUHV has to be able to convince the Lidl management to continue with Floorball, as Lidl is sponsoring football in Germany.
- Record spectator numbers for Superfinal 2024 in Fribourg so they will return to the same venue in 2025 (and maybe also 2026)

Sweden

- Today there are just 100 days to go for the start of the WFC
- There are less than 4.000 tickets to be sold for the final and just 10 sky boxes left to sell
- Most of the tickets are bought from Sweden and then from Switzerland and most coming direct from the Ticketmaster site, not the Floorball sites.
- There are still rooms available in the LOC hotels, which needs to be booked soon, as demand is high
- The mascot Älgvis, has the target to entertain the audience.
- There will be a Fun Zone in the basement of the venue, with a Pantamera obstacle course and speed shooting among other things. The City of Malmö will build a festival area next to the Baltic Hall
- There will also be a cooperation with the Swedish fan group Gula väggen
- New floorball spectator record (18.000) for the Superfinal in the Friends (football) Arena

Norway

- Sander has been employed to work with marketing and communication.
- There was an All-Star game organised for a league player having got cancer, with artists and other people played. The match was broadcasted on TV2 and generated some 15.000 EUR for the player.
- MyGame is producing live matches in the venues, now installing cameras in the venues.

Czechia

- Some issues with the 02 Arena and Ice hockey matches colliding with the SuperFinal dates. The plan is to publish the SuperFinal weekend and later the exact date.
- The preparation for the Women's WFC is ongoing with the legacy issues for Women's floorball.
- There is a new contract for CEZ (energy company), which will be the Title sponsor for the Women's Superleague and the the main sponsor for the WFC2025
- Cooperation has started with SportyTV with some additional TV matches, helping with the sponsors.
- Cecky Floorball TV had over 4.000 matches and 700 matches from the 1st and 2nd Mens and 1st women's. First year there was 18 k registrants, but now there are over 20k. A total of over 7 k unique users have paid.
- Cooperate with LiveSport on news and producing a TV-magazine together with the SportyTV.
- The WFC 2025 is planning on hosting a Women's Sport Conference to create more attention and visibility for the event (target to include also athletes from other sports as speakers)

Finland

- New Executive Director will start mid-October
- EFT organised mid-October
- Planned to launch WFC 2026/27 venues and image however regarding the brand /logo nothing has been proposed or discussed with IFF yet)
- 50k registered users in Salibandy.tv (85% of the revenue flows back to clubs). F-League and I-division tv/streaming right are excluded from this streaming platform.

12. Any other questions (JB/TK)

Other topics that national federations would like to discuss.

The men's Lidl Unihockey Prime League a unified flooring is introduced for all teams. This will provide better circumstances for players and also creates a coherent product. It will also offer good visibility space for potential sponsors and looks good on TV/stream.

Surprising news was that Lidl has built a very strong cloud service for their own logistics, which they are now selling also for 3rd parties (Schwarz Digits)

Mr Kalsta presented the TikTok vs YouTube charity matches (TikTube) in Finland as an example which creates a lot of visibility for floorball on social media. The concept has been initiated by a social media influencer who also plays and coaches floorball.

WFC 2024 National federation partner/sponsor networking event at 14:30 on the 12th of December. Invitations will be sent out shortly, after the timetable will be checked (the starting time of the Swedish quarter-final match has changed)

The idea was brought forward, inspired by other international federations for example UEFA, to print the IFF logo on the national team jerseys:

- The CCMNG discussed the different options for including the logo. The consensus was that it could primarily be just the IFF logo (placement to be discussed)
- Both the Czech and the Finnish are printing the Event logo already on the jerseys and this of course can be done but a individual decision for each national federation
- This would only be for the Adult WFC's

For Cesky Florbal a single sign-on is developed to manage all licensed player data regardless of used service may it be app, ticketing, fan shop, web, OTT, etc. This will be launched mid-September and serves for the purpose to have data and better use it to the federation benefit. The plan is also to integrate this for WFC 2025 ticket sales.

IFF – CCMNG Meeting 2/2024 proposed REPORT

Creation of a generic Picture and Video Media Hub/archive with the National Associations and IFF.

- The CCMNG discussed the possibility to create a generic pictures and video materials from the national series and the International Events. It was agreed that we should look into a combined solution, as it would make it much easier for the sharing and even monetising.
- Mr. Urbar will continue the discussion with a potential solution and IFF will come with a study from the Aalto Business university of a Best Practice sharing platform during the Autumn.

Promotion of Sport for All

- Mr. Winberg stressed that we need to talk about the low entry level of Floorball and the safety of the sport, trying to get more visibility for the sport.

13. Next CCMNG meeting (JB)

Mr Beer proposed the next meeting to be held on the 22nd of January 2025 with arrival on the afternoon 21st for informal dinner. Location would be Copenhagen and Mr Winberg promised to check for a suitable meeting location.

14. Closing of the Meeting (JB)

Mr Beer once more warmly thanked Mr Nilsson and the Swedish Federation for their organisation help and hospitality. Further he thanked for the good, active conversation and contributions. Mr Beer closed the meeting at 16:15.

APPENDIX 45

Player of the Year

This document is to serve as background for the IFF Central Board to discuss the potential IFF Player of the Year award concept.

This will be a new IFF award, and a logical follow up on the launch of the IFF Hall of Fame in 2021. This is also a typical form of acknowledgement for athletes by the governing organisations of sports such as FIFA and the IHF (International Handball Federation). In many sports their respective media (newspapers / magazines) have also been choosing best players often with longer traditions than the governing body themselves (e.g. motorsports). This is also the case in floorball while Innebandymagazinet has selected best male and female players since 2005 (men) and 2007 (women). In some years the integrity of this voting has been questioned. The IFF will be in contact with Innebandymagazinet about IFF also launching the concept to discuss the topic. Worth mentioning that the IIHF (International Ice-Hockey Federation) did not launch their annual player award until 2023.

Period of the voting

Based on the workshop discussion of the CB meeting 6th of September the following was decided of the procedure. The length of the procedure was shortened significantly to emphasize the relevance of the award close to the end of the season. This also creates good distance to the Innebandymagazinet publications in late January.

The proposed option:

- Nomination of candidates by the end of April
- Voting period till end of May
- Result evaluation and publication of winners by early June
- Winner award handed out in December at WFC

Sidenote: a new international calendar would affect this if we would have a four-year WFC cycle (but then could include the EuroChamps as an awarding event)

The awarding is during the World Floorball Championships when we have most attention from media. Most likely we will also have one of the players already present at the event (the other player (gender) would have to be invited to the championships).

Nomination of candidates

The national federations that have registered for the World Floorball Championships in that year are eligible for nominating (and voting) for candidates. Floorball manufacturers would also be allowed to nominate players. This should create added motivation to promote the concept and the nominees. Noteworthy that the nationality of the player is the decisive factor for the nomination not the country they are playing in.

The nomination criteria for candidates

- Performance in national team (overall performance, scoring points / save %)
- Performance in domestic league (overall performance, scoring points / save% / +- rating would be great but not necessarily available)
- Nominations to the WFC All-Star team

The federations and manufacturers should in their nomination include a good picture, player facts and performance data of each nominee.

Each eligible federation could nominate three players for each gender. Floorball manufacturers could each nominate two players for each gender. The suggestion is to include a minimum of 15 and maximum of 30 players per gender as candidates for the final voting list. The IFF has the right to narrow down the candidates to create the final list.

Voting and procedure

The IFF believes the most representative result will come with participation from as many parties as possible. Hence there would be the professional opinion from the coaches, captains, and media (federations, floorball media/bloggers/podcasts / broadcasters / sports journalists).

- All eligible national Team Coaches one vote => email with unique link
- All eligible national team captains one vote => email with unique link
- Every eligible federation one vote (media department) => email with unique link
- Selected media (sports reporters that cover our major events) => email with unique link
- Selected floorball Media, which will be invited separately (e.g. Innebandymagazinet, Pääkallo, Unihockey.ch, + some individual bloggers and pods max 3/country) => email with unique link
- Selected TV companies that broadcast IFF events => email with unique link

For voting we can utilize the Webropol platform which the IFF has used already several years for surveys and in the recent years also for the WFC All-Star and MVP voting (respondents can be controlled by email recipient addresses).

The top ten lists of each gender will be published.

For the voting, candidates need to be presented in a compelling way (picture / bio with achievements (past season + national team) which will require a webpage (hence the material requirements in connection with the nomination). The best website solution for this still needs to be investigated closer.

The Player of the Year concept can be introduced earliest for 2025

Once the Player of the Year voting has been established, the concept of regional player voting can also be evaluated. The nomination and voting system / eligibility must be evaluated separately. The option for public voting and fan favourite will also be evaluated separately. This requires a financially viable, reliable system. Further, the results are very much linked to player nominations and from which country they are (population / social media behaviour).

Evaluation logic

The scoring system will be based on a 5-3-1 system where the voters choose a player which receive the respective number of points.

In the case of a draw between top candidates first the number of 3-point choices will be considered, then 2 points and further 1 point. In the unlikely draw situation after this the decision be submitted for the IFF ExCo.

Award

A specific, floorball-themed award will be produced for the winner(s). The award also creates a possibility to attract a possible sponsor (visibility through-out the journey from voting start to publication of winners).

Preliminary Agenda:

1) Welcome and opening of the Meeting

Mr. Liljelund opened the meeting at 09:00 CET and made the Roll Call

Principles of the IFF Material Board

Mr Liljelund explained that the IFF Material Board is an advisory board to discuss and propose how to deal with issues with-in the Material questions in the IFF. The decisions of the MB will be given as advice to the IFF Central Board.

Activities of the IFF during the previous season

Mr. Liljelund made a short recap of the present IFF Activities

- The WFC played in Singapore gathered a very good TV crowd, even if the event had very little spectators in the beginning of the Event
- The IFF introduced a new 3v3 WFC in Lahti in May 2024, in connection with the U19 WFC. The event was a success with 31 Men's +14 Women's teams participating. IFF is presently making an evaluation of the event and a feedback form has been published on Social Media and on other IFF media platforms
- IFF has moved into using its own Media platform, containing an own OTT, match centre and the underlying match statistical system. The platform also gives possibilities to be used for fan engagement. After the first full season use of the IFF App, the new statistical features are in place and the development of the monetisation of the App and more games streaming is underway.
- IFF has been granted participation for both Men and Women in the Chengdu 2025 World Games, with 8 teams in both categories.

- The IFF is looking over the International Calendar, as the number of events is growing and starts to make it financially problematic for the National federations and the players. The idea is to move to a four-year cycle for the World Championships and play continental championships in the in-between years.
- IFF has approved one new member Benin and now has 80 members.
- IFF has nine employees and one intern at the moment.
- IFF is negotiating with Protocol Sports Marketing for a continued deal for the sales of IFF TV rights outside the core countries.
- The Men's WFC will be played in Malmö, Sweden from the 7th to the 15th of December.
- Mr. Liljelund also informed that the project Future of Floorball will continue to develop Floorball to even more attractive direction.

2) General update

Mr. Liljelund reported on the *Material Approval system financial outcome 2023*

The result for 2023 was a little better than the bad result in 2022, but still quite far from the pre covid numbers.

3) Approval of the Material Regulation 2024

Mr. Henriksson reported that RISE has sent out the final version of the IFF Material Regulation, edition 2024 in a Newsletter to the manufacturers. The process for the preparation of the Material Regulations MR 2026 has not been started yet, as the discussions with RISE on how the whole Material Approval system will run after the retirement of Mr. Lars-Åke Henriksson. IFF will have a meeting with RISE on the 18th of June.

4) MB Support Projects for 2023

Mr. Liljelund reported that the Material Board had decided to support the development of the Canada Floorball Federation through the Material Board support. Floorball Canada was given support for a three-year development project for 2023 – 2025 to help with the re-organisation of the Canadian Floorball federation, with a total of 10.000 CHF for 2023.

Floorball Canada has reported the following achievements and use of the project funding for 2023:

- Support for clubs and provinces that show potential for growth with improved floorball quality (with boards, nets, etc.)
- Provided volunteers, referee handbooks/training, referee equipment, awards. FC has provided support for the creation of provincial organizations as well. 2 provincial organizations have incorporated in the past 6 months.
- Much progress has been made with the debut of floorball in schools in the past year, but more focus on high school floorball is needed in the next year to achieve these goals.
- FC already has 420 members this year and counting (until Sept. 1st). This has exceeded expectations and the official target set by FC (400) already. FC looks to keep growing these numbers next season.
- The Toronto Floorball League's inaugural season was a big success. Ottawa is kickstarting its league in the Fall of 2024. Looking to start one more league in another municipality in Nova Scotia next season. Provincial leagues have remained a resounding success considering Canada's spread out geography.
- Youth summer programs are up and running in Ottawa and Nova Scotia, where minor hockey associations have been helpful in recruitment. Looking to expand this to other municipalities – still looking at which floorball clubs have the capacity to set up these programs (with FC support).
- Only 1 high-school tournament was hosted last season, however this is simply due to focus on setting up the first national tournament in Canada. 1 tournament with high-school division is already taking place this summer. More effort will be directed to this in the upcoming year.
- Equipment sales and extracurricular programs have been facilitated/set up by FC through loans and FC's volunteering network. Looking to expand to more schools by next season learning from this past year's successes and shortcomings.
- FC hosted and organized the first coast-to-coast national tournament in its history with teams from British Columbia to Nova Scotia making the trip and competing for the championship. The success of the tournament means that this tournament will be repeated on a yearly basis, which ensures that the entire country has an opportunity to communicate with FC representatives in person to grow the game throughout the country.

The Material Board approved the continuation of the Canada Floorball development program for 2024, with a sum of 12.000 CHF

The Material Board also decided to support the development of the IFF FairFloorball campaign, with 9.000 CHF. The Fair Floorball campaign was enlarged to contain also social and economical sustainability. The Campaign materials and Social Media videos were produced.

Mr. Liljelund also reported that in the present sports world the Good Governance is very important topic and is on the agenda of the IOC and almost all international sports federations.

The Material Board also decided to support the updating and creation of the new IFF Education structure Floorball Development materials Levels 0 and 1, with a sum of 12.000 CHF

The Material Board approved the reports and the proposed actions.

5) Organisation of the collection of Materials for the RISE Surveillance Tests

Mr. Henriksson gave a short report of the collection of the materials for surveillance tests and that have worked quite well in most cases. There have however been some small issues with some of the companies, due to the lack of newer products.

As decided that the IFF and RISE will collect the materials for the surveillance tests directly from the wear-houses. IFF/RISE proposes that we will continue the collection of the materials from the manufacturer's warehouses and/or from the special stores also during this year in 2023.

6) Possible solutions if cooperation with RISE doesn't continue in 2025

Mr. Liljelund reported that discussions have started with different parties on how the retirement of Mr. Henriksson will affect the IFF Material Approval system. IFF will have a meeting with RISE on the 18th of June, to hear their view on the situation.

IFF has also started a process to simplify, certain parts of the Material regulations, to make the system more easy and cheaper to handle.

Separately from this the RISE changes of the CE marking rules for face masks have created huge issues for the Floorball manufacturers, as the new test is made with an Ice Hockey puck making the helmets extremely heavy and the cost for the new tests for the face masks are very expensive, which should not be the case.

It was decided that the Material Board will hold an extra meeting in September/October to further discuss the situation and the next steps in the process

7) Other issues

Mr. Liljelund informed that the IFF will continue the process with the possibility for players 190 cm or longer to play with oversized sticks. There are now 220 players using this option.

Social Media:

It is important to embed and share the IFF videos, as we need to show the sports community that we are bringing added value as a sport and through its fans. There have been some issues with the crediting of the IFF for use of video material from the IFF Events and with the correct #hashtags. The IFF rules needs to be followed, as IFF owns all social media rights of its Events.

The IFF would like to collect and present all the Sustainability projects the different Floorball material producers have introduced and therefore would like to ask for a short report of this by the end of August. All the sustainability campaigns are very important to the IFF regardless of the manufacturer, so please report those.

Mr. Liljelund reported about the situation with Exel, after the bankruptcy of E-Sports Group Oy, is still a bit unclear as Exel has not yet finalised the list of products for which they would move the certification to the new company. To be able to do this they need to fulfil the Material Regulation Rules and make the outstanding payments and the payment for the move of the certificates. Before IFF will give the approval for the move of the certificates, Exel needs to provide a new payment plan for the old debts to IFF and provide a guarantee for these.

Mr. Bergström asked about the possibility and plans of Floorball regarding the Olympic Games. Mr. Liljelund answered that it seems that Floorball has bigger changes to make it to the Youth Olympic Games with 3v3 format before the actual Olympic Games. 2028 seems to be out of the question, but we might have some changes for 2032 in Brisbane Australia, but that remains to be seen.

8) Next meeting

The Extra Material Board meeting will take place in September-October and the next ordinary meeting will be held latest in May-June 2025, IFF will call the meeting at a later stage.

9) Closing of the meeting

Mr. Liljelund thanked the members for a good meeting and closed the meeting at 10.42

If the conditions of this agreement are not met then the IFF will utilize the guarantee in full to the outstanding debt.

4. Sanctions

If B4G fails to follow the payment plan, IFF will then in accordance with the IFF Material Regulation be forced to take the following sanctions towards B4G/the Exel Floorball brand.

- for two consecutive missed payments or more than three delayed or missed payments in total B4G (Exel Floorball brands) will not be able to approve new materials for certifications, before the missed payments have been paid and

- for more than 5 missed payments IFF will have to look over for further sanctions, in accordance with the IFF Material Regulation.

When delayed or missed payment(s) has/have been paid, the testing sanction will be lifted.

5. Time line and payment

B4G is to make the monthly payments directly to IFF's bank account in Switzerland, if needed based on original invoices provided by IFF for all debts mentioned in this agreement and occurring during the contract period time, have to be paid no later than 31.05.2026.

6. Effect of agreement

The agreement will only take full effect after this agreement has been signed and IFF has received the valid bank guarantee.

This Contract is signed, in two identical copies and takes precedence automatically when both parties have signed the agreement.

Position of swiss unihockey on the proposed Changes to the Rules of the Game eff. 2024/25

IFF Central Board Meeting 3/2024, Agenda Item §9 a)

Dear members & colleagues of the IFF CB

swiss unihockey is deeply concerned about the process and timelines followed to implement Rules of the Game changes to become effective already for the upcoming season 2024/25 and hence opposes to adopt the proposal as set forth in Appendix 36b of our meeting.

After the proposals for changing the Rules of the Games within the 2024 cycle had been sent out to the member associations, the IFF RC, the IFF RACC and the ATC in mid-spring this year, there has not been any follow-up on the process as foreseen in the official rule change process. Hence, neither the RACC, the RC nor the ATC were informed about the feedback of the member associations, nor were they notified about the non-ordinary process/intention of changing some rules by September 2024 already.

Further to this, the final approval of the Reference Group's proposal for immediate changes was not given by the RACC since they have not been informed and/or consulted for.

The consistency with the processes within the IFF is a core value for the cooperation between the different stakeholders and shall be followed. This has not been the case in this matter.

Apart the lack of compliance with the process, swiss unihockey sees a risk due to the short time remaining to implement such changes until the start of the season 2024/2025. The consequences caused by these changes are quite numerous, substantial and require sufficient lead time to be adopted (e.g. rule books need to be updated, interpretations and example cases developed, clubs and referees to be informed - where the latter's education period has already been fully completed and everyone is in the starting blocks). Without proper communication and especially referee instructions incl. guidance material, there is a significant risk of inconsistent rule application by the referees which negatively impacts the sport, the fairness of our competitions and moreover its recognition by the spectators.

We therefore recommend to the Central Board to reject the proposal for changing the valid Rules of the Game at this stage and to postpone the potential go-live of the proposed rule changes until May 2025, following a proper review & approval process by the respective above-mentioned stakeholders as foreseen in the respective IFF regulations. The already well-developed proposals as detailed in Appendix 36b should serve as solid base for such review.
